Joy in Lockdown

Philippians 2: 1-11: Part of the Team

26th July



Paul begins this chapter by using the formula of what we call 'the grace'. We receive encouragement in Christ, we receive the love of God, and we share in the fellowship and the work of the Holy Spirit (v1).

In verse 3 and 4 of chapter 1 Paul says that he prays for the Philippians individually with joy and in verse 2 of chapter 2 he asks them to make his joy complete. In other words, Paul is asking that they become the answer to his prayers, and as we read on Paul's prayer for them is revealed (verses 2-4).

His prayer is for them to come together like a team.

In a recent interview after the death of Jack Charlton, Mick McCarthy was asked what Jack Charlton did when he became the manager of the Ireland football team, a team that he led to the World Cup for the first time in their history. He answered that Jack Charlton had taken a group of good individual footballers and moulded them into a great team.

Keeping with the football theme, Ronaldo is a great footballer, but who is the best between Ronaldo and David de Gea? They would never try to swap positions because they each regard the other as being better than themselves in the positions they play. Paul says (v4) that each of us should look not to our own interests but to the interests of others. To understand what this means, he points us to Christ. He shows us how Christ, motivated by obedience to God, was able put the interests of humanity first (v 6-8).

Paul describes the extent of Christ's humility and obedience from the heights of heaven to being born as a weak and helpless baby in a stable. His humility and obedience was a lifelong service to God. He preached about the kingdom of heaven, and brought forgiveness, healing. His final act of obedience and humility brings salvation to the world as he died an unjust death, a cursed death on the cross.

Then in verse 9 we have a 'therefore'. Paul is saying because of all that Christ has done God has highly exalted him and given him the 'name which is above every other name'.

Of all the names there have ever been, including the names for God, there is only one name which brings salvation: the name of Jesus.

And every knee will bow, not in protest or support but in obeisance and humility for all that Jesus has done.

It is from this position, on our knees before Jesus, that we can become the answer to Paul's prayer, to complete his joy by being of one mind and having the mind of Christ, the mind of obedience and service. Working together as part of his team, members of the same body of Christ.
