This month I wanted to write about blue curls, blazing star, or rattle box, all of which are blooming early in October, but my Internet went down and I couldn't do any detailed research. So? I'll write a little about each.

Blue Curl (Trichostena) are growing near the north side of

the path as you walk towards the Intercoastal, just before the path turns towards the sidewalk. They are annuals and biennials, which explains why there are more this year than last year. They like dry soil and sun to partial shade. Their stamens protrude past the petals which give the flowers their unique look. Blazing star (Liatris) are blooming between the path and the woods and in the lower meadow the flowers of *flat* top golden rod (Euthamia Tenufolia) are about ready to explode. By the way, these are not true golden rod; and if they were, neither are allergens. The rattle

box (Crotalaria spectabilis) are not native but are related to those that are. They grew in meadow on their own and we're letting them be as they are.. Then there are swamp sun flowers (Helianthus Angustifolius), which are finally spreading. Golden aster (Pityopsis graminifolia) is another fall bloomer and soon bushy aster (Aster dumosis) will join in the fall display.

At the October monthly meeting we all worked, again, pulling out lawn grasses to make more room for the wildflowers, and I learned something else about a meadow. The individuals in our group have diverse backgrounds and political differences, but we see the beauty of a meadow and believe in the value of nurturing and preserving it. Oh, that there would be more wildflower meadows! By the way, again, the tall grasses growing in the meadow are NOT lawn grasses. They are native blue stems.

We hope you will join us at our next meeting the first Saturday of the month. We meet at the meadow near the Riverview clubhouse at about 8:30. About once a month we drive to local parks or on back country roads looking for wildflowers, identifying, and photographing them. We're an informal group without officers or dues. The Florida Legislature passed House Bill 409, which allows for electronic wills and electronic signatures starting January 1, 2020. Like a traditional will, an electronic will must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses. An electronic signature is defined as "an electronic mark visibly manifested in a record as a signature and executed or adopted by a person with the intent to sign the record.'

Audio-Video technology is defined as "technology in compliance with applicable law which enables real two-way communication time. using electronic means in which participants are able to see, hear, and communicate with one another. Florida is leading the way in stipulations including the supervision of a notary public and special protections for "vulnerable adults." Additionally, the new law provides for electronic wills to be made selfproved by providing for safe keeping of the will by a qualified custodian. A qualified custodian is a wholly new concept the bill introduces as a means of protecting and ensuring the integrity of the will. Florida is one of only a handful of states to embrace technology in this manner and it will be very exciting to see how these changes improve our current system.

Agressive Driving

All of us have been driving somewhere minding our own business when another motorist cuts us off in traffic or drives slowly in the left hand lane impeding our travel. The natural reaction to these behaviors is anger and frustration. Far too often this frustration is manifested in what we refer to as "road rage." Here are a few facts that we know about "road rage." First, as traffic increases in a particular area, there is a corresponding increase in "road rage" events. Obviously, there is no question that the volume of traffic in St. Johns County has and will continue to increase with the tremendous growth we are experiencing. Secondly, most people that engage in "road rage" events are everyday law abiding citizens who, under normal circumstances, would never enter into a confrontation with a stranger. Thirdly, "road rage" events usually involves young and middle age drivers. Finally, serious injury or death is always a potential outcome of a "road rage" event. Did you know that about half of all drivers who are subjected to aggressive driving behavior on the road respond with aggression of their own.

From the American Safety Council, the following statistics compiled from the NHTSA and the Auto Vantage auto club show that aggressive driving and road rage are causing serious problems on our roads. 66% of traffic fatalities are caused by aggressive driving. 37% of aggressive driving incidents involve a firearm. Males under the age of 19 are the most likely to exhibit road rage. Half of drivers who are on the receiving end of an aggressive behavior, such as horn honking, a rude gesture, or tailgating admit to responding with aggressive behavior themselves.

Over a seven year period, 218 murders and 12,610 injuries were attributed to road rage. A recent national survey revealed that 34% of those drivers who are confronted with an aggressive driver honk their horn at the subject. Another 27% yell, 19% give a hand gesture back and 17% flash their lights. Even 2% of those questioned stated that they attempted to run the aggressor off the road. Road rage is a two-way street.

If you are subjected to aggressive driving, often times the best way to ensure it does not get worse is to just ignore it.

not get worse is to just ignore it. The prevention of "road rage" events is everyone's responsibility. If you see an event of this type unfolding before you, do not hesitate to call law enforcement. The best method of prevention is not to become personally involved in a "road rage" event, but in the event that you are cut off in traffic or the victim of someone else's driving that may infuriate you, think before you act. Oftentimes just pulling off the road and out of traffic will calm you down. Here are some tips from the NHTSA if you should become confronted by an aggressive driver: Make every attempt to get out of their way. Do not challenge them by speeding up or attempting to hold-your-own in your travel lane. Avoid eye contact and ignore gestures. Report aggressive drivers to the appropriate authorities by providing a good vehicle description, license number, location and direction of travel. These high risk drivers climb into the anonymity of an automobile and take out their frustrations on anybody at any time.

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office is committed to enhancing the safety on our roadways for our motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists. Our Traffic Unit continues to engage in the monitoring of "aggressive driving" and enforcing applicable traffic laws when indicated.

Please remember that law enforcement cannot solve the problem of "road rage" alone, this issue requires a commitment by all of our citizens. If you feel you are in danger or you witness aggressive driving, report the offender to your nearest law enforcement office or by calling 911.

Thinking of a New Computer?

Be Creative When Withdrawing from Retirement Accounts

Like many people, you may spend decades putting money into your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. But eventually you will want to take this money out – if you must start withdrawing some of it. How can you make the best use of these funds?

To begin with, here's some background: When you turn 70 $\frac{1}{2}$, you need to start withdrawals – called required minimum distributions, or RMDs – from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan, such as a 457(b) or 403(b). (A Roth IRA is not subject to these rules; you can essentially keep your account intact for as long as you like.) You can take more than the RMD, but if you don't take at least the minimum (which is based on your account balance and your life expectancy), you'll generally be taxed at 50% of the amount you should have taken – so don't forget these withdrawals.

Here, then, is the question: What should you do with the RMDs? If you need the entire amount to help support your lifestyle, there's no issue – you take the money and use it. But what if you don't need it all? Keeping in mind that the withdrawals are generally fully taxable at your personal income tax rate, are there some particularly smart ways in which you can use the money to help your family or, possibly, a charitable organization?

Here are a few suggestions:

• Help your grown children with their retirement accounts. Your grown children may not always be able to afford to "max out" on their IRAs. You might want to help them with any excess funds from your own retirement accounts. You can give \$15,000 per year, per



recipient, without incurring any gift taxes – an amount far higher than the current annual IRA contribution limit of \$6,000 (or \$7,000 for individuals 50 or older).

• Help your grandchildren pay for college. You might want to contribute to an investment specifically designed to build assets for college. A financial professional can help you choose which investments might be most appropriate. Of course, if your grandchildren are already in college, you are free to simply write a check to the school to help cover tuition and other expenses.

• Help support a charitable organization. Due to recent changes in tax laws, many individuals now claim a standard deduction, rather than itemizing. As a result, there's less of an incentive, from a tax standpoint, for people to contribute to charitable organizations.

• But if you'd still like to support a charitable group and gain potential tax benefits, you might want to consider moving some, or all, of your required distributions from your IRA to a charity. You can transfer up to \$100,000 from your IRA in this type of qualified charitable distribution, thus meeting your RMD requirements without adding to your taxable income. Furthermore, this move might keep you in a lower tax bracket. (Before making this transfer, though, you will need to consult with your tax advisor.)

Your RMDs can contribute greatly to your retirement income, but, as we've seen, they can do even more than that - so use them wisely.
