## A Christmas Present for St. Peter's

Three times every year, at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas, parishioners receive a special giving's envelope and are asked to make an extra donation to the church. The envelope is a reminder that the church really can use the extra dollars that come from this initiative.

St. Peter's is also in great need of another type of special giving this year and every year - the gift of volunteering. In many ways, it is so much easier to write a cheque or slip some money into the special envelope than it is to volunteer, but we would like to suggest a different way of looking at volunteering at the church you love.

Certainly St. Peter's needs people who can volunteer on a committee on a regular basis, to attend meetings and do work for that committee, and we know that this type of volunteering is not for everyone. We understand very clearly that many people who attend St. Peter's are engaged in full-time work, and also, many retired parishioners have family duties and activities that make it difficult to make a commitment to an on-going volunteer activity. People are understandably worried about using up their tiny amounts of free time volunteering at the church. Still others think they are too old, too tired or not physically able to volunteer.

Instead of committing to a volunteer position that could take up hours of your time on a regular basis, could you see yourself volunteering for an hour or so only once every year? For example, do you think you could commit to thirty minutes once a year to vacuum the chancel or to dust the choir stalls? Do you have twenty minutes to set the table once a year for the community lunch? Could you devote an afternoon once a year to decorate the church for Christmas? Could you spend an hour or so baking a batch of cookies to bring to one of our fund-raising bake sales, or could you help out at a one of our sales? If you would like to volunteer, but do not think you could do any physical work, do you think you could hand out service leaflets or verbally direct visitors who come for our sales or other events?

If the answer to any of these questions is "yes", then St. Peter's would be very happy to have your help. Any group leader would be happy to have your help and would gladly give you a volunteer activity to do for that one time. These positions would not be ongoing at all, and with the exception of helping out at a sale, would likely only take twenty to forty minutes to do.

Every parochial group at St. Peter's - The Altar Guild, The Outreach Committee, the Fundraising & Planning Committee, etc, has a definite need for volunteers. Look into your heart to see if you could commit a small amount of time to St. Peter's. If you think you would be able to do this, what an amazing Christmas gift to St. Peter's this would be!

### The Birth of Jesus Christ

Almost 2,000 years ago, a young woman from the town of Nazareth named Mary was visited by an angel named Gabriel.
