A Few Words from the President

HARRY KELLAR was the world's most famous magician of his time. Being famous throughout the world isn't an easy job. Harder still, was being well respected and put high upon a pedestal by his peers. That being said, Kellar was a humble man, and I'm sure felt the weight being lifted as he "passed the mantle" to the next great magician the world has known, Howard Thurston. Below is an excerpt of the introduction that Harry Kellar inscribed in the forward of Ottokar Fischer's book, "Illustrated Magic" (1945). Most all of what he says can be held true today.

"The most successful professional magicians have been those who could read human nature and correctly estimate the character of their spectators, and so modify their discourse and sometimes their illusions as to fit the different kinds of people that they might confront.

In this, never make the mistake of belittling the intelligence of those who watch your work. Always there is someone keen, alert, and quick to apprehend and you must never play below his or her level. Indeed, you never can afford to hold your spectators lightly. It is better to let them make the mistake of holding you too lightly.

So, in summing up these few remarks which occur to me as the result of a lifetime spent in the practice of magic for my own amusement and the entertainment of others, I would say to all beginners, Keep three things in mind – these three:

Second – Make your work artistic by clothing each illusion with all the glamor and shadows of fairyland, and the suggestions of incantations and supernatural powers in order to prepare the observer's mind for a mystery though there be no mystery.

Third – Study your spectators and seek to put them under your control even as the mesmerist does his subjects, so that their minds should be receptive to theories of the occult, and their eyes be shut to the obviously simple explanations of your prestidigitation.

Finally, I need not say that the end of all magic is to feed with mystery the human mind, which dearly loves mystery.

So, leave every mystery forever unexplained!

And in the hope that you may, by thus entertaining others, find enjoyment for yourselves, as I did for many years, I tender you my best wishes for your success, and the hope that through you the magician's art may have new masters to perpetuate it."

Nashville House of Cards

A magic-themed underground entertainment complex has opened in Nashville's lower Broadway honky-tonk district. House of Cards, located beneath the Johnny Cash museum at the end of a secret tunnel, is described in a press release as celebrating "the art of magic, classic American cuisine and fine hand-crafted cocktails." The project is the brainchild of Bill Miller, who owns the Johnny Cash Museum, as well as Skull's Rainbow Room in Printer's Alley. The 9,500 square foot space boasts a multi-million-dollar collection of fine art. House of Cards opened April 9. "Guests are encouraged to explore the dining room to enjoy the rare collections and be entertained by some of America's top magicians, who are stationed throughout the venue to provide mind boggling illusions and tricks all evening," according to a media release announcing House of Cards. Reservations are required and will include tickets to the magic performances. House of Cards has a dress code and a policy of no photography. The project's interior design took four years to plan and implement, and creates the feel of an authentic 1930s speakeasy. House of Cards will be located at 119 3rd Avenue South in Nashville.
