## St. Johns County Offers Free "Reach the Beach" Shuttle Service during **Summer Holiday Weekends**

St. Johns County, Fl – With the demand of off-beach parking expected to exceed capacity during the holidays this summer, St. Johns County is offering a free shuttle service to Mickler's Beachfront Park and the St. Johns County Ocean and Fishing Pier from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m Independence Day: July 2-4 Labor Day: September 3-5

The Mickler's Beachfront Park shuttle will transport beach visitors between Cornerstone Park, 1046 A1A North, and Mickler's Beachfront Park, which provides direct access to the beach. The Pier shuttle will transport beach visitors between St. Augustine Beach City Hall, 2200 A1A South, and the Pier parking lot, which provides direct access to Pier amenities and the beach. The shuttles will run every 20 minutes with the final shuttles departing at 4 p.m.

Both shuttle service routes will be provided by the St. Johns County Council on Aging, Inc. DBA Coastal Transportation and will be subject to inclement weather. Service updates will be provided via the St. Johns County Reach the Beach mobile website, Twitter feed, and Facebook page. St. Johns County and the Tourist Development Council provide the Reach the Beach shuttles to relieve congestion at the Mickler's Beachfront Park and the St. Johns County Ocean and Fishing Pier, and to give St. Johns County residents and visitors a more safe and convenient beach experience. 

The St. Augustine Shores Service Corporation's Board of Directors meeting was called to order by President James Priester at 7:00 P.M. Present: Director Winston Burrell Director Sue Chitwood, Director James O'Such, Treasurer Claire Lorbeer, Secretary Rachel Diamond. Absent Vice President Jerry Zinn. Approval of the Minutes – March 10, 2016: Director Burrell made a motion to accept the minutes

as presented. Seconded By Secretary Diamond. Unanimous. The motion carried. Treasurers Report: Read by Treasurer Lorbeer accepted for audit. General Manager Smith explained

the increase in operating and reserve funds.

**Delinquent Accounts:** General Manager Smith presented three proposed payment plans on delinquent accounts. Director Burrell made a motion to accept the payment plan for case # 1 as presented. Seconded by Treasurer Lorbeer. Unanimous. The motion carried. Director Burrell made a motion to accept the payment plan for case # 2 as presented. Seconded by Treasurer Lorbeer. Unanimous. The motion carried. Treasurer Lorbeer made a motion to accept the payment plan for case #3 as presented. Seconded by Director O'Such. Unanimous. The motion carried. General Manager Smith presented two collection issues for authority to proceed up to and including foreclosure as case #4 and case # 5. Treasurer Lorbeer made a motion to proceed with collections on case # 4 and case # 5. Seconded by Secretary Diamond. Unanimous. The motion carried.

#### Progress on Board Goals

**Curb Appeal** – General Manager Smith updated the Board on projects completed at the Boat/RV Storage Facility. Landscaping. Spaces re-marked. A letter was mailed to all lessee's to ask them to assist and police their spaces. A new lake fountain was installed in South Holiday Lake. All entrance signs have been painted.

**Old Business:** 

**Safety and Security** – The Card Access System for the Riverview office, the pier, the storage compound and the pool will be engaged April 18, 2016.

**Operations** – The Internal Audit Committee has held two meetings with the Treasurer and the General Manager. Philip Van Tiem provided minutes.

Action Status List Update - Secretary Diamond presented a revised report summarizing the projects that have been completed and those in progress.

#### Committee Reports

ACC Committee (General Manager Smith) - The ACC Committee held one meeting in the month of March. They approved 19 applications: 1 dumpster enclosure, 7 fences, 1 pergola, 3 new homes, 3 pool enclosures, 1 pools/pool repair, 2 screen rooms, 1 shed. Total approved YTD 190.

**Riverview Building and Grounds Committee** - Secretary Diamond updated the Board on the Activities Club. She informed the Board that the Art Group has asked for a discounted rate on the room rental for the summer months. Secretary Diamond made a motion that we decline any additional discounts. Seconded by Director O'Such. Member Jeremy Duncan commented on precedence. Unanimous. The motion carried. September 15, 2016 Robert Groleau will hold a 4 week course on Parenting/Grand parenting. There will be a Decluttering Workshop on May 20, 2016 at 1:00 p.m. Director Chitwood made a motion that we allow the Decluttering workshop to proceed. Seconded by Director Burrell. Board Discussion. Unanimous. The motion carried. A Bricks4Kidz program is being considered. Our current volunteer Yoga instructor, Nancy Willis, would like to be paid the same as our certified evening instructor at \$30 per hour. Certification is required at other venues. Nancy is not certified. Insurance is required. Director Burrell made a motion to pay Nancy Willis \$30 per hour. Seconded by Treasurer Lorbeer. The membership supported Nancy Willis. 3 yes votes 3 no votes. The motion failed. General Manager Smith will check with our insurance broker to see if our liability increases hiring an instructor with no certification.

**Boat/RV Storage Committee -** We are mapping out an aerial of the compound for office use. We will revise the Lease Agreement to address compliance issues.

#### New Business

**Management Review -** General Manager Smith review. The Board and the Membership present unanimously approved extending the General Managers Contract another year through June 30, 2018 after a favorable review.

**Rosa Court Drainage Issue** - General Manager Smith discussed a drainage issue and an issue involving the Advanced Disposal trash truck. The truck issue was addressed previously. St. Johns County Road and Bridge will address the drainage issue and will repave if we remove some shrubbery. Member Mr. McCranie, Rosa Court, commented on the issues. President Priester will contact an acquaintance at Advanced Disposal and set up a meeting to discuss the truck issue.

**Discussion on Deed Violation Fines** - President Priester informed the Board that he and General Manager Smith met with legal counsel to discuss our legal parameters on fining Deed Restriction Violators. We will meet with the ACC to ask them to serve as Liaisons for the Board and Management in implementing a fining program where we inform the residents that in 6 months we will start fining violators after notification. We will fine \$100 per day up to \$1000 and back this up with a lien on the property.

**Home Office Application -** Cindy Lewis 970 Escobar Ave. for the purpose of bookkeeping for her nephew's lawn service. They have read and agree to abide by County Ordinance 95-9. Secretary Diamond made a motion to approve the home office application. Seconded by Director Burrell. Unanimous. The motion carried.

**Deed Restriction Report -** The report was presented to the Board Meeting Adjourned.

## Wild Flower Meadow Group

As of early May the mimosa strigillosa are putting on their show. Sometimes called powder puff or sunshine mimosa, they're a perennial ground cover that, according to Wikipedia, is native to all fifty states. The pink, spherical flowers rise above their creeping vines and spread rapidly. The leaves fold quickly upon being touched but are resilient to foot traffic and mowing. The flowers are host to larvae of Sulphur butterflies.

Last year I remember seeing lots of non-aggressive bees flying in and about the mimosa strigillosa. In the National Recourses Conservation Service website, Melinda Brock wrote

the powder puff is an important source of pollen for the honey bee and poses no environmental problems. There is a similar flower called mimosa buttallii or sensitive briar, but it has prickly stems and those in our meadow don't.





Blooming early in May are also Indian plantain, wild petunia, gaillardia, spiderwort, field sorrel, coreopsis, coral honeysuckle vine, fleabane, southern plantain, coral bean, false dandelion, prickly pear, and a few moss verbena. If you want help learning the names of these flowers, look at the fliers in the box attached to the fence at the upper end of the meadow. Please return the fliers when done.

Our group meets the first Saturday of each month at 8:30 by the Riverview Club House. Our goal is to preserve the wild flower meadow, learn about native plants, and ones that grow in this location. We occasionally visit state and county parks and welcome newcomers, even if you want only to come on the outings. We're an informal group without officers or dues and hope you will join us. 

## Spring fishing report for Saint Augustine

Spring is coming early this year. Temperatures are in the 70s and it is sunny out. This weather is the reason millions of

people move to Florida each year. It is also why so many species of fish call Florida their home.

As the water warms up the fish will become very active. The mullet already started to show up in the inshore waters. The big predator fish will be showing up right behind them.

We have some amazing coastal fishing during the spring. We have Cobia and Tripple tail starting to show up off of our beaches in April. They are following the manta rays which are following the warmer water. They love hanging around the 72° mark. Cobia are a very fun fish to target off of the beaches. They are usually 1 to 2 miles off of our coast as they are migrating to the north. They can grow over

50 pounds and are exceptional fighters. They are usually site fished hanging out on the backs of the giant manta rays. A well placed Z man heroz bait will usually not get refused. You can also target them fly fishing. Make sure you have a 10 to 12 weight fly rod because they put up a great fight. Also while you are out there keep an eye out for Tripple tail. These are brown flat looking fish that have big fins that look like they have three tails. They are usually hanging out near structure such as a crab trap float or trash floating. They are easy fish to get to bite once located. I love throwing a Z man shrimpz on a popping cork as well as shrimp patterns if I am flyfishing. We usually have a month or so to target these two fish and then the Tarpon, Spanish mackerel , sharks and Bonita will roll right behind them.

Moving to the inshore seen our main species for March will be redfish. They are still partly schooled up from their winter patterns. The water is also still clear so there are great opportunities for site fishing. As the water warms up it will lose its clarity. The redfish will also break up into smaller groups of fish. They will continue to bite aggressively through the spring. A live mud minnow on a jig head or a Z man minnowz on an 1/8 ounce jig are my bait of choice. My favorite color is the deal. Just throw it out and do a steady retrieve back in. Search near the oyster



mounds that are close to the flats as well as the deep holes. As the water gets into the 70s a top water lure such as a Zara spook Jr will be a great way to catch them.

As April approaches be ready for a monster trout to hit your Zara spook as well. April and May are the two best months for targeting trout over 25 inches. I prefer to fish in depth from 2 to 10 feet and do a very slow walk the dog retrieve with some long pauses in between. Just remember to keep working your lure until the line comes tight. Trout are known to miss the majority of their strikes. Once you have the fish on the line do not horse the fish in. They have very soft mouths and you will pull the hook. Once the sun comes up put away your top water and switch to a Z man diesel minnowz on a quarter ounce jig head and do slow bumps towards the bottom. This should continue your bite for a while.

March through May are great times to fish in Saint Augustine. The thunder storms haven't arrived yet and there are plenty of fish to be caught. Feel free to call me at (904)687-9498to book a charter. 

They are repotted in the winter during dormancy or in early spring as new growth emerges but not watered until that new growth is 4 or 5 inches tall. Simple!

#### **Be Safe on the Beach this Summer**

As our schools close for the summer it is time for summer vacations for many of our residents. One thing is certain, that many of our residents as well as visitors will enjoy the 42 miles of beaches St. Johns County has to offer. I would like to pass along some tips in this month's column. When at the beach never swim alone and if possible swim near a Lifeguard. If you or a family member doesn't know how to swim, take lessons. Swim lessons are offered through the St. Johns County Recreation Department or the local YMCA. By only knowing how to float in the water may compromise your safety during an emergency.

Many swimmers panic if they get caught in a rip current. If you or a fellow swimmer finds yourself in a rip current, don't fight it. Swim parallel with the beach until you are out of the current and then swim towards the shore. Be sure to watch your young children constantly and don't become distracted by talking on your cell phone, reading or taking a nap. Your attention should be focused on your children at all times. Children as well as teenagers should always be aware of their surroundings and if someone tries to take you somewhere, quickly get away while yelling and screaming. Children should try to stay in a group, remember there is safety in numbers. Because our youngsters cannot always lookout for themselves, it becomes our responsibility to teach them how

Pay attention to the posted signs on the beach. They are designed for our safety as well as to protect the environment. Remember drinking alcohol is not permitted on all St. Johns County Beaches. To protect your head and neck, never dive headfirst into the ocean. Many beaches in this area have coquina rock buried in the water and serious injuries could occur when diving.

The American Red Cross adds some additional tips for beach safety. Protect your skin: Sunlight contains two kinds of UV rays -- UVA increases the risk of skin cancer, skin aging, and other skin diseases. UVB causes sunburn and can lead to skin cancer. Limit the amount of direct sunlight you receive between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and wear a sunscreen with a sun protection factor of at least 15. Drink plenty of water regularly and often, even if you do not feel thirsty. Your body needs water to keep cool. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine in them. They can make you feel good briefly but make the heat's effects on your body worse. This is especially true with beer, which dehydrates the body.

Watch for signs of heat stroke: Heat stroke is life-threatening. A person's temperature control system, which produces sweating to cool the body, stops working. The body temperature can rise so high that brain damage and death may result if the body is not cooled quickly. Signals of heat stroke include –Hot, red. and usually dry skin, but in some cases such as during athletic activity while wearing a helmet, the skin may be moist. Changes in consciousness. rapid weak pulse, and rapid shallow breathing. Call 9-1-1 and move the person to a cooler place. Quickly cool the body by wrapping wet sheets around the body and fan it. If you have ice packs or cold packs, place them on each of the victim's wrists and ankles, in the armpits and on the neck to cool the large blood vessels. Watch for signals of breathing problems and make sure the airway is clear and keep the person lying down.

Wear eye protection. Sunglasses are like sunscreen for your eyes and protect against damage that can occur from UV rays. Be sure to wear sunglasses with labels that indicate that they absorb at least 90 percent of UV sunlight. Finally, wear foot protection. Many times, people's feet can get burned from the sand or cut from glass in the sand.

During the summer months, we have a tendency to be complacent by leaving our vehicle doors unlocked and windows open. This is an obvious invitation to criminals to steal our personal items from the inside of the vehicle, especially when using the parking area's near the beach. Remember to always close your windows and lock your doors when you go to the beach. Always remove loose change and valuables from your vehicle. This includes purses, wallets, cell-phones, laptop computers and briefcases. Some of these items could be locked in your trunk and out of sight. Also park in an area that is heavily populated and has people coming to and from the beach. The average criminal does not want to be seen. Remember if you see something suspicious please contact your local law enforcement agency immediately

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## **Muscle Myths**

This time of year, as the weather warms, we usually commit to diet change, exercise and a healthier life style. Like me, I'm sure most realize when the pants are getting a little tight and breathing becomes a little more difficult after chasing a child, dog or postman. I interpret such signs as telling me it's time to get back on the bandwagon.

Instead I thought I'd attempt to dispel muscle and exercise myths I often hear in the clinic.

#### 1. No pain - No gain

False: It is true you might feel fatigue and even a little "burn" in the muscle if you are lifting heavy weights or doing high repetitions, but any discomfort should go away afterwards. If you feel soreness 1-2 days after your work-out that is normal – called DOMS (delayed onset muscle soreness). The best thing to do for DOMS is to repeat your workout with a slight intensity reduction. Muscle and tissues respond to forces placed on our bodies. Too much force can cause damage and pain. Appropriate forces cause the tissues to build and become stronger.

2. I'm too old and/or too out of shape to start exercising

False: As long as you are medically stable you can benefit from exercise and even build muscle - but start slow. Exercising with light weights performing high repetitions (30-50) is usually prescribed for endurance. Exercising with high weights, performing low repetitions (5-7) is usually prescribed for increasing strength. Exercising with moderate weights (those you can lift 10-15 times) is usually prescribed for tone, endurance and moderate strengthening.

**3. If I work-out I'll get bulky and muscle bound** 

False: Rarely is this a male complaint. I can't promise the men they will "buff up" but I can say with reasonable certainty it won't happen to the women unless "supplements" are taken. In either case, resistance



training will produce results of increased tone and moderate muscle mass, depending on the type of routine. As your body changes it may indirectly lead to a new wardrobe.

#### 4. I can't work-out. I have osteoporosis

False: The fact is weight-bearing and resistance exercises such as walking and resistance training are ideal for osteoporosis. I've helped a number of women develop training programs who have seen their bone density scan improve or at least remain constant. The key is to start slowly.

#### 5. I tried before. It never sticks


False: Although success rests solely on the individual there are things that can help. First find an activity you enjoy. Find someone who knows something about exercise and who will listen to you not someone who gets in your face like on The Biggest Loser. Try to make your exercise routine social. Most of us prefer not to eat alone, go to the movies alone, or even work alone. Why do we think we must exercise alone? There is strength in numbers. Lastly, start but start slowly. Reward yourself for your success ("I exercised twice this week. I'm doing great!). And, don't beat yourself up if you miss or skip - just jump back on at the next opportunity.

Although space limits the number of myths I can address, these are the ones I most commonly hear. It should go without saying, if you plan to start or modify an exercise routine, consult your physician or physical therapist. They can provide direction and even act as your advocate, adding to the likelihood of success.

## Windows 10 Update Caution

Greetings from Computer Professor Writing to you today from the Woods of Maine. In hopes to keep you all (or as we say it in Maine "you guys") safe while I am away. I have pulled together a list of the most common, frustrating, and serious user computer mistakes to avoid. All these stories have happened.

You correct a mistype but now "they" have locked you out thinking someone is trying to break into your account.







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## **Meet the Culinary Characters Behind Cheezees Grill**

For Joe Hishmeh and Jesse Ihrig, co-owners of Cheezees Grill, their fresh take on a grab-and-go American favorite is a blend of inspiration and ingredients. Recently celebrating its one-year anniversary, the small sandwich shop is located on Santa Maria Boulevard, just off US 1 South.

#### THE BACKSTORY

Stepping into the role of restaurant owner was a little about timing and a lot about chance. Following a divorce in the late 90s, Hishmeh began searching for a new career venture and fell back on his love of cooking and food. He opened his first café in South

Florida before moving on to Cape Coral, where he opened a new spot called Joe's Big Bite. It wasn't long before the economy took a hit and Hishmeh had to close shop.

It was during this time fate stepped in and Hishmeh's ex-wife met her future husband. His name was Jesse Ihrig. He worked as a kitchen manager and together they moved to St. Augustine for a change of pace. With the closure of Hishmeh's restaurant, he too decided to move to St. Augustine, and began



brainstorming a new idea for a local restaurant with Ihrig. They started with the idea of creating a deli that served homemade grilled cheese sandwiches and then expanded upon this vision. Hishmeh and Ihrig immediately began researching locations. They looked near downtown, but thought the space was a little overcrowded. After repeatedly driving by an open space for lease off US 1, they finally stopped in. "I was hesitant at first because I wanted to find a location that would be convenient for

customers, but I finally came down to check out this space and it grew on me," Hishmeh said. "It took a couple weeks to hammer out the lease. The gamble paid off. We get great traffic through here and lunchtime is always slammed.

As for the menu, they wanted to create something special and different. "We didn't want to blend in with other sandwich shops," Hishmeh explained. "We do things different."





Hishmeh was referring to their emphasis on using only fresh ingredients, such as homemade sauces and spreads, slow roasted meat and fresh bread delivered daily from Georgia. They arrived at a number of sandwiches and salads and began naming them after friends and family to add a personal touch. To ensure quality, Ihrig brings more than 30 years of professional experience to the stove.

'Jesse has always been in the kitchen. He's a master. It's his play land and it's best to let him work his magic," joked Hishmeh. Popular menu items include The Back It Up

Reuben, made with homemade corned beef, aged Swiss cheese and homemade sauerkraut and Joe's Big Bite BLT, hand woven bacon, with lettuce, tomato and mayo, served on thick white bread.

Another hot item is The Mr. Raulerson Turkey Sandwich, named after a local Science teacher from Gamble Rogers Middle School. We take these original sandwiches and add a lot of flavor and freshness to each bite," said Hishmeh. Among the heartier selections at Cheezees is this loaded mac n' cheese sandwich.

They also offer a range of vegetarian menu items, including a fresh Hummus and Tabouli spread that is made daily. And they have a selection of decadent sweet treats for dessert.
