## "The Breastfeeding Bill"

Breastfeeding isn't a lifestyle choice. It's a medical imperative.



**Bi-Partisan Support:** US Senator Kelly Ayotte, R from NH applauded the work on this bill and recommends state-level legislation for better breastfeeding protections. Her staff is tracking our work and reporting back to her. As the former Attorney General for NH, Ayotte breastfed in the workplace and is an advocate for mothers and breastfeeding. **The Supreme Court of the United States**: March 25, 2015 – ruled that employers are required to provide reasonable accommodations in most circumstances under Title VII Civil Rights Act – Pregnancy Discrimination Act. State Legislation Affects Breastfeeding Rates (Maternal and Child Health Journal, The Association of State Law to Breastfeeding Practices in the US)

- 225 % greater in states with enforcement provisions
- **43** % greater in states with laws requiring a private area
- **81 %** greater in states with exemptions from jury duty
