


Come to a "50s-60s Oldies Dance Party with the "Reministyx"





St. Augustine Shores Service Corporation July 14th Board Meeting Summary

The St. Augustine Shores Service Corporation's Board of Directors meeting was called to order by President James Priester at 7:00 P.M. Present: Treasurer Claire Lorbeer, Director Philip Van Tiem via telephone, Director Winston Burrell, Secretary Sue Chitwood. Absent Vice President James O'Such and Director Janet Cassford. Quorum Established. President Priester addressed the membership and discussed the points of order to be followed during the meeting.

Minutes of June 8, 2016 approved Unanimous. Treasurers Report Read by Treasurer Lorbeer accepted for audit. General Manager Smith explained the decrease in the operating fund and the increase in the reserve fund.

Managers' Report - Joseph H. Smith III

Old Business: Progress on Board Goals

Curb Appeal – General Manager Smith reported that Shaw's Tree Service will be pruning the palm trees on the common grounds in the Shores on July 16. They will raise the canopy on the oaks along Santa Maria Boulevard the following week

Tree Guys has been cutting back the overgrowth from the greenbelt areas along Christina Drive and Shores Boulevard.

Safety and Security – A heavy duty door has been installed at the office.

New brackets have been ordered to secure the fence posts at the pool.

Operations - General Manager Smith explained that he and President Priester will be inspecting the Community after hours to help facilitate compliance with Deed Restrictions.

Committee Reports

ADC Committee – General Manager Smith: The ADC Committee held one meeting in the month of June. They approved 23 applications. 1 retaining wall, 10 fences, 1 pergola, 1 new home, 1 patio cover, 2 pool enclosures, 3 pool repairs, 1 screen room, 3 sheds. Total approved YTD 234. Smith informed the membership that the ADC Committee is looking for volunteers to serve on the Committee.

Variance request (821 Valnera Court) - Gary Hartshorne requests a variance on a fence erected at his residence. The fence is forward of the rear of the house and is 7 feet tall. He has also erected a fence around his trash cans in the front of the property. He did not apply for a permit prior to erecting the fence. Mr. Hartshorne presented his case. Secretary Chitwood made a motion to table the variance request citing multiple violations and the need to inspect the property. Seconded by Treasurer Lorbeer. 4 yes votes 1 no vote Director Burrell. The motion carried.

Riverview Building and Grounds Committee - General Manager Smith: Smith reported that the Memory Enhancement Group will continue through August. Pole walking will continue in the Riverview Facility during the warm summer months.

Boat/RV Storage Committee - Secretary Chitwood: She discussed a short list of violations to be addressed. We are currently renewing leases and issuing ID stickers. All lessees are being charged for each vehicle stored in there space.

Janitorial Services Agreement - President Priester discussed some issues with our current contractor. Three bids were presented: 1. SMA Gemilang Solutions - \$497.00 per week. Steaming carpet \$430.00 per service. Strip and wax Ballroom floor \$1435.20 per service. 2. Sea Breeze Cleaning Services - \$600 per week. Their liability insurance coverage will not allow them to strip and wax the floors. 3. Professional Services -\$2375.00 per month or \$594 per week all inclusive. Director Burrell made a motion that we award the bid to Professional Services. Seconded by Treasurer Lorbeer. The membership inquired about the number of services provided and the monthly charges. They commented on the reliability of Professional Services. There was comment on the viability of the bids. There was inquiry about insurance requirements. There was discussion on the 24 hour on call services specification. There was discussion on the recent improvement of the service. There was comment on hiring the current contractor on a monthly basis. 2 yes votes 2 no votes and 1 abstention. Motion fails.

New Business

Architectural Service Proposal for Riverview Addition: General Manager Smith read a proposal submitted by Dave Mancino, Architect, for preliminary schematic design to assist in establishing the program for a new porch addition on the east side of the Riverview Facility. President Priester and General Manager Smith will meet with Dave Mancino to discuss the plan. The membership commented on the project. President Priester explained the Boards responsibility to move the Community forward. He discussed the Riverview Building and Grounds Committee and he invited the membership to serve on the Committee. President Priester discussed renovation of the restrooms and the kitchen in the Riverview Facility. We are currently soliciting bids for an outdoor service venue at the Pavilion.

HOA Fees: President Priester discussed changing the way our HOA fees are structured. He discussed the need to raise the \$30 cap on the HOA fees. This will take a majority vote of the membership. The membership commented on restructuring the HOA fees.

Board & Member Comments

Director Van Tiem thanked those in attendance and suggested block captains to collect more input for the meetings. Secretary Chitwood thanked all in attendance. She asked everyone to continue participating and to get involved. Treasurer Lorbeer thanked all in attendance. She asked for people to sign a list to get involved with Committees and the Board. She commented on the plan to renovate the restrooms in the Riverview Facility. President Priester commented on implementing a fining system for Deed Restriction violations. He explained the process. President Priester commented on the joint Board Meeting with the ADC scheduled for July 25th at 3:00 p.m. at the Riverview Facility.



As I write early in August the horsemint is having its turn in the sun, at least in the upper meadow where there's shade early in the

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

St. Johns County Sheriff's Corner

Best Practices

If you are stopped by a law enforcement officer

Every day many citizens and visitors come in contact with Deputy Sheriffs' for a variety of reasons. From a routine traffic stop to an active investigation we must engage citizens continually during the course of our duties. Our deputies and other law enforcement officers are trained to do so safely, efficiently as well as effectively. Problems could occur, however, when citizens are not sure how to react and respond when approached by an officer. This lack of knowledge could result in fear, nervousness, anger, or even aggressive behavior on the part of the citizen, as well as the officer. The response of many folks who have never had any contact with a law enforcement officer is often predicated upon what they had seen in the movies or on television. The response could also be based on word-of-mouth rumors from friends, co-workers, or family members. It is my hope that the information gained here will assist you when dealing with any law enforcement officer.

Let's begin by asking the question why would an officer want to stop and speak with me? There may be many reasons. The officer or deputy could be checking out a complaint that was phoned in by another citizen. There could be a report of some criminal activity which occurred in the area. You may have witnessed something that could provide valuable information in an investigation. Or your actions could cause the deputy to think you are having trouble and need assistance. The best way to clarify the situation is to ask questions. Remember that some of their conversations is not necessarily investigative, but a potential conflict could be alleviated by your cooperative dialogue.

Sometimes problems arise when it seems that you have been stopped for what you feel is no reason at all. A crime may have occurred nearby and we only have a minimal description of a possible suspect that may resemble you. Maybe your actions appear to the officer to be suspicious, for example: running from an area where a crime had just occurred. Another witness may have pointed you out as a suspect. If a deputy does stop and ask questions, your honest responses will usually resolve the situation quickly. If the officer hasn't told you why you have been stopped, you have every right to inquire. If despite these considerations, you feel that you do not want to respond, the deputy must respect your right not to answer. Remember though, your cooperation could be most helpful in aiding in a criminal investigation.

Another common occurrence is the traffic stop. Officers make many traffic stops for a variety of reasons during each shift. Many times the traffic stop is for an infraction, for a safety violation, or the vehicle or driver matches a description





of a suspect of a recent crime. Here are some suggestions that could alleviate some concerns of an officer at a traffic stop. When signaled by a deputy, slow down and safely pull over to a place out of the traffic flow. Sit calmly, with your hands visible on the steering wheel. If you have any passengers, ask them to sit quietly with their hands visible. Avoid sudden movements or ducking in the seat; these actions could unnecessarily alarm the officer. If the stop is at night, turn on your inside light after pulling over and roll down any tinted windows. For safety reasons, the officer would want to see inside and ensure no threats are present. Do not get out of your car unless the officer or deputy asks that you step out. If you are asked to do so, comply in a calm manner. A sure way to put a deputy at ease is to communicate your actions in advance by telling him or her what you will be doing before you move. If requested, you must give the deputy your driver's license and vehicle registration. Be sure to tell the officer where it is before reaching for it, especially if you have it tucked away in a glove box or some unusual place

Finally, if you are issued a citation, you will be asked to sign it. Remember, signing the citation is not an admission of guilt, but an acknowledgement that you have received the citation. While you may wish to contest the ticket, keep in mind that your guilt or innocence can only be determined in court. Arguments over or protests about the situation cannot be resolved in the street.

During your working years, your primary investment goal is generally growth – you need your money to grow so that you can eventually afford the comfortable retirement lifestyle you've envisioned. But when you retire, should you change course and adjust your investment strategy from "offense" to "defense"?

Actually, it's not quite that simple. To begin with, even while you are working, you don't want your portfolio to be completely filled with growth-oriented investments, such as stocks. If it were, you would likely be taking on a degree of investment risk that's too high, because, as you may know, stocks will fluctuate in price - sometimes significantly. And if you only own stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. That's why you need to have an array of investments - stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. By spreading your investment dollars this way, you can give yourself more opportunities for success while reducing the impact of volatility on your portfolio. (Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

Now, let's fast-forward to your retirement date. Once you retire, you may need to look at your investment portfolio somewhat differently – instead of "building it up," you may now want to think of "making it last." So, your first impression might be that instead of maintaining the diversified portfolio you had when you were working, you need to switch to predominantly "safe" investments, such as CDs and Treasury bonds, to reduce the risk of losing principal.

And such a strategy might indeed be effective – if your retirement were only

going to last a year or so. But the chances are reasonably good that you could be retired for two, or possibly even three, decades. If that's the case, then you will have to deal with a threat to your lifestyle that you might not have considered: inflation. We've had low inflation for several years, but that could change in the future. Consider this: Even at a relatively low 3% inflation rate, prices double roughly every 25 years. And depending on your personal needs and spending patterns, your personal inflation rate might be even higher.

To protect yourself against inflation, you will find that investments such as CDs and Treasury bonds are typically not much help. In fact, in a low-rate environment, your returns on these investments may not even keep up with inflation, much less keep you ahead of it. That's not to say they have no value – they can provide you with an income stream and help lower your overall investment risk.

But to defend your purchasing power, you will still need some growth potential in your investment portfolio during your retirement years. Your exact percentage of stocks and other growth-oriented investments will depend on a variety of factors – your projected longevity, other sources of income, family situation, risk tolerance and so on. You may want to consult with a financial professional to ensure that your portfolio mix is suitable for your needs.

Many things may change in your life when you retire – but the need for investment diversification is not one of them.

Cupping

They may have concluded by the time this is printed but while I sit here, the Olympics are going on. There have been many injuries – no more than years past – but injuries nonetheless. All high end athletes push their bodies to the limits both in training and healing to stay the best.

With this comes a variety of treatment techniques, some better known than others. In years past we saw Kinesiotaping appear on the shoulders and legs of volleyball players. This year we see the evidence of one treatment not widely known, but has been used at First Coast Rehabilitation for years. It is called cupping.

What is cupping? Cupping has been used for many years, by many cultures to treat a variety of diseases and injuries but physical therapists use cupping to manipulation soft tissue. This can be done by either by leaving the cups in place for a period of time or gently moving them around. If left in place it can cause circular bruises. It looks like a hickey from an octopus. But although they are not very attractive, they are not painful and go away quickly. As a form of soft tissue manipulation it is frequently used to improve the tissue mobility of scares.

One way it is thought to help is to "unload" the tissue by using suction and improve blood flow to allow healing. Since tight tissue



restricts blood flow, improving mobility will increase blood flow and thought to increase healing. A second way it is thought to help is to impart a mechanical stimulus to cells call fibroblast, which trigger a chain reaction and cause the tissues to heal.

The most common Olympic injury is no different than you and I experience - overuse. The tissues are taken through a pattern over and over. It develops a strain or tendonitis and even sore ligaments. The types of treatment for Olympic athletes is pretty much the same, even in St. Augustine.

If you have experienced soft tissue injuries recently or in the past never improved, perhaps cupping will help. We've been doing it for years. What can it hurt? The worst it can do is leave a few circular bruises.

THE JEWISH NEW YEAR HOLY DAYS

The Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashana, falls on Monday, October 3rd this year. Locally and world-wide, Jews mark the start of the year 5777 on the Hebrew calendar, a hybrid solar-lunar calendar with fixed Hebrew dates, but dates that shift on the secular calendar.

Why a New Year in the Fall? Originally it was tied to the upcoming agricultural harvest, and what better time for ancient peoples dependent on a good crop to pray and celebrate? Leviticus 23:24 reads: 'In the seventh month, in the first day of the month, shall be a solemn rest unto you, a memorial proclaimed with the blast of horns, a holy convocation.' Israelites then [and now] cease work and bring an offering to God.

Today, Rosh Hashana is a time to celebrate with family and friends the beginning of a new life opportunity, the chance to improve the quality of our religious and spiritual self through prayer, charity, and self-introspection, cheshbon ha-nefesh. The purpose is to literally take stock of our failings and identify ways to do better in the coming year. This is an act between the individual and God in the context of the congregation. That is why most of the prayers are in the plural: We have sinned...We ask for atonement...We seek return / reconciliation. We celebrate with festive meals, sending New Year greeting cards, and often wearing a new outfit. Rosh Hashana is serious, but not solemn. Yom Kippor [October 12th] is solemn. Again, Leviticus 23:27ff- 'On the tenth day of

this seventh month is the Day of Atonement; there shall be a holy convocation unto you, and ye shall afflict your souls; ... It shall be unto you a Sabbath of solemn rest.' All year at worship and in private devotion we ask for forgiveness-from God, from others, and even from ourselves. But Yom Kippor is a 24 hour "marathon" of ritual, prayer, Torah readings, fasting, religious music and sermons to help us focus in depth on atonement, renewal and self-change; a 'retreat', so to speak. And we pray not just for the Jewish people, but for all peoples too.
