Buckhorn Wash Pictograph panel is Barrier Canyon style rock art that was vandalized over many years. It is in Emery County near the San Rafael River East of highway 10 near Castle Dale, north of highway 70 and south of Price along a dirt road. The Restoration project was in 1995 and Reed Martin was one of the organizers who worked with the BLM and several public groups to complete the cleanup. He will show before and after photos and bring samples of the equipment used to remove the graffiti from the panels.

Matt Zwieful discussed "A Brief Prehistory of he Grand Staircase - Escalante National Monument". Matt is an archaeologist with the Monument. His talk discussed the region from the Paleo-Indian period through the per-historic period. #### Archaeology in the News

Greg Woodall has identified another possible site for an "archaeology park". This on is in Hurricane, called Grandpa's Fishing Pond.





A unique opportunity has presented itself to the City of Hurricane. The lava bluff overlooking the south end of the Grandpa's Fishing Pond Park is a 5-acre archaeological site where numerous prehistoric room outlines and walls are readily visible on the surface. Artifacts suggest the location was occupied by corn farmers 1000-1500 years ago.

The site would be an ideal location for an open air museum for the public, and classroom for local school classes. The obvious room walls make it easy for anyone to visualize families living in homes there, and interpretative signs (with digital codes) could provide a wealth of information about the prehistory of the area, as well as regarding the geology, natural history, and the Virgin River. Information for the signs could be developed in partnership with Hurricane High School, Dixie State, Southern Utah University, and the Virgin River Program.

Using the lava bluff as an education park, with trails for access, would also serve to keep the open space feel and unique riverside setting of the Grandpa's Fishing Pond Park intact. The planned facilities at Grandpa's Pond would provide parking and restroom facilities for visitors to the archaeology site. In addition to school groups, local resort visitors, retirees, and tourists could be directed to the park as an added amenity to their time in Hurricane.

#### Of Local Interest

The St. George Art Museum is currently hosting an exhibit of contemporary Navajo basket weaving that is outstanding. This exhibit combines native traditions with contemporary art.

There is a book, "Weaving a Revolution – A Celebration of Contemporary Navajo Baskets", by the Natural History Museum of Utah, 2013, that accompanies the exhibition.

This rates as a "must see"!
