Letter from Head of School

January 2022

Dear Parents / Carers:

We wish all students, parents, and staff a healthy, happy, and meaningful year of learning, growth, and development. The start of 2022 again continues to bring us change, new challenges and a focus on health and safety. Unfortunately, we find ourselves in a new fifth wave of the Covid-19 pandemic and the Omicron variant. We will do all we can to help protect the well-being of our amazing school community. I thank all our students and staff in advance or following our Covid Safety Guidelines and doing everything you can to stay safe and healthy.

I am very excited to have introduced the concept of WONDER TIME AT WINDSOR HALL! I feel that this innovative homework will greatly prepare our students for their International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme Personal Project years before they must tackle this task. Please ask your child about it! Many schools have already commented on what a great idea it is! I am so happy that we are the first to create WONDER TIME!

All schools have been instructed to plan for the possibility of a functional closure. A functional closure is when, due to low staffing numbers, a school cannot adequately supervise or instruct students. Schools often direct children home during snow days, power outages, water main breaks, and other unique circumstances. In this case, the situation could arise that due

to staff illness, schools have insufficient staff to provide safe supervision of children, or to provide instruction for an extended duration.

If this happens, students will need to move to a period of learning from home. This period is intended to be seven days and materials and support for this time will be provided by the classroom teachers.

We recognize that any closure is stressful for our school community, and we appreciate the fact that any change in routines will cause disruption and inconvenience for many. We will aim to communicate the potential for a move to remote learning as quickly as we can so families can plan accordingly. Our hope is that we do not need to move to a place where students need to be learning from home, but we want to be prepared. Please ensure that we have your updated contact information, including your phone and email to ensure you receive all communications.

As COVID-19 continues to circulate in our communities, we encourage everyone to follow public health guidance to help reduce the risk of COVID-19 in our school. This includes:

- Completing a daily health check before you come to school. You can use the BC COVID-19 Self-Assessment tool. (https://bc.thrive.health/covid19/en)
- Monitoring yourself regularly for symptoms of illness. If you are sick, stay home. Seek testing when recommended.
- Following the provincial restrictions that are in place. The BCCD continues to provide trusted information about COVID-19, including how to protect yourself, your family, and your community and what to do if you suspect you have the virus. (http://www.bccdc.ca)

While we all continue to navigate disrupted routines and changes as the pandemic continues, it's important we look after our mental health and well-being.

ART


Art class has been filled with emotion as we explore our thoughts and feelings through art. Our students have generated some great pieces especially in watercolor!


