AUTISM FACT SHEET

Autism Spectrum Disorder ASD is a term to classify a range of Pervasive Developmental Disorders PDD which include Autism, Asperger's, PDD-Nos Not otherwise specified or Atypical Autism

ASD is a lifelong neurologically based developmental disorder. It is extremely complex and can present in many different ways. This is why it is a "spectrum disorder". For this reason it can be difficult to diagnose.

There are 3 main characteristics: significant delays/impairments to social development; delayed and/or unusual communication; repetitive ritualistic behavior.

The causes are unknown but a family has a 5-10% chance of having a second child with Autism. It is 3:1 more common in boys.

I have heard the rate to be from 1 in 165 to 1 in 105. It is becoming more common and the occurrences are growing. Many people think there are multiple issues, bio-chemical, environmental like pollutions, inability to naturally detox the body, unusual sensitivities, inability to absorb nutrients, PANDAS, Lymses disease, ... Most families have tried a gluten or wheat free, milk or casein free diet.

Children with Autism may have no apparent physical abnormalities. Their behaviours however differ from the norm.

Examples of Social Impairments;

- poor eye contact,
- treats people as objects;
- -will not initiate social interaction; has difficulty reading others facial expressions, body language and gestures;
- prefers to play alone or will only parallel play
- -doesn't share objects
- -aloof behaviour, appears socially awkward
- -may react negatively to affection, or may be overly affectionate to people they don't even know
- -may not want comforting when hurt
- -lack awareness of others, their feelings, their personal space

Communication Impairments:

- -delayed development or no speech
- -echolalia, or parroting speech
- -speaks using memorized clips from movies
- -speaks in a monotone without rhythm or change in pitch

- -limited use and understanding of jesters
- -poor language comprehension
- -fails to initiate or maintain conversation
- -takes speech for literal meaning

Repetitive, ritualistic behavior:

- -attachments to unusual objects
- -preoccupation with objects, or certain subjects of interest
- -stereotypical motor behavior as hand flapping, or clenching, spinning or rocking
- -lining up objects
- -need to sameness, routine, rituals
- -marked distress over changes to trivial things
- -self injurious behavior

Other features include:

- -unusual or disturbed sleep pattern
- -very restrictive diet
- -odd responses to sensory input
- -may be over or under stimulated to all 5 senses
- -difficulty toilet training
- -may be overactive or very passive
- -may show aggression and have tantrums
- -may have extreme or unusual fears
- -may hold objects close to eyes or use peripheral vision to view things.

Autism ONTARIO key focus areas are Awareness, Advocacy and Support

- -Research
- -Identifying best practices
- -government relations (initiated the RDSP program for families)
