Successful Shelling

by Peggy Williams At the end of October I led a group to Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico (on the Sea of Cortez). There were eight of us, and I wrestled a 15-passenger van for a week.

The shells were so abundant that the group decided they didn't have room for any more in the luggage and we shouldn't go shelling on the last day!

The day we landed we visited a bay near Hermosillo in the afternoon. We got about 15 species of shells there, most of them dead. This is an area that shell fishermen use for their boat storage, so some of the species fell off the boats and have been reproducing ever since; others are native to that environment.

After a rather long drive to San Carlos, a suburb of Guaymas, we registered at our hotel, a Best Western, and fell into bed.

The next day we visited a beach popular during the weekends but nearly deserted on weekdays. A few people live there, but most of the buildings are weekend getaway homes and restaurants. There was no one else on the beach and our group walked along, happily finding sundial shells, turret shells, big yellow cockle shells, coquinas, and many other species.

Later we met other shellers, two of whom have a home in San Carlos, and another visiting them, to join them going to an isolated beach on a long, winding and rutted dirt road. This beach had been changed during the hurricane that brushed the area in the fall, so there wasn't much on it, but I got to talking to a guy who lives there and has a clever solar panel arrangement that powers his music, refrigerator, lighting and TV. He's just a fisherman, but quite a hard worker, it seems!

He told me about a pile of black murex down another dirt road (left by fishermen), so we went there and got several nice, 5-7" specimens, plus large crown conchs. There was also a turtle carapace, which of course we left there. We drove back squinting into the sun as it set over a beautiful sea and mountains. We had a wonderful meal (mine was fresh caught shrimp) to celebrate.

The next day we went to a village (down another dirt road) where I have bought a few shells in the past. To my delight, there were at least six tables set up selling shells, including Tent Olives (which are the largest olives in the world), Grinning Tuns, Three species of Strombus (conch), Pacific Horse Conchs, sea life, and more, including Lion's Paws (though not pairs).



On subsequent days we returned to the village and beach, visited others, and waded in bays. We found another bonanza of dumped shells, including small Helmets (they look like Scotch Bonnets) and Pink-mouthed Murex. The shelling was phenomenal!

Next year, on Thanksgiving week, I have another trip planned to the same area. Cost



to shell club members will be \$2125-\$2565, depending on how many sign up, and that price includes airfare from Tampa. A deposit of \$1000 will save you a place. Don't wait too long!

A Discovery

by Peggy Williams The Bahamian island of Eleuthera has several salt ponds. These ponds have been in existence for possibly hundreds of years and have an outlet to the sea far underwater. I'm told that someone went down to 80 feet deep in one and didn't find the outlet.

There are very few organisms in the ponds because of their isolation, and those that are there have been there for a long time. Some of them have developed into new species unique to the pond they live in

to the pond they live in. Three species of mollusk

have been named from there in recent years. The first was *Chicoreus dunni*, a murex that evolved from *Chicoreus florifer*, the West Indian Lacey Murex, which is related to our own *Chicoreus dilectus*, the Florida Lacey Murex. Named by Ed Petuch in 1987, in its best state it is pure black and

reaches about 3 inches in size. However, because so many collectors have been taking these shells in recent years, it is hard to find a full sized live one any more, and few are found less than one inch.

I recently took a group to Eleuthera, and among the group was Jason Hall, who is primarily interested in Marginellas (like our 1/2 inch common Marginella). He had me make him a hand dredge to use for these sometimes tiny species and was quite successful in finding them with the dredge.

Of course, he was especially interested in the salt ponds because two new species of Marginella were recently named from them:



Volvarina jimcordyi and *Volvarina cordyorum*, both named by Cossignani in 2009 and 2007. I had been aware of these shells for about 20 years, but Jim Cordy had only recently become aware of them and found the right pond! He got them to Cossignani, so they were named for him and him and his wife (*cordyorum* means more than one Cordy).

Since Jim takes groups to Eleuthera at least twice a year, and since he has been aware of the pond since at least 2006, and since Jim likes to collect shells to trade, I was afraid these Marginellas would have been overcollected, and I was correct. We did find quite a few of the *cordyorum* but not nearly as many as I had seen in prior trips.

I had only ever collected one of the *jimcordyi*, however, and it was feeding on a dead crab. The crabs in the pond are large spider-type animals, and some people eat them.

I found five dead crabs, and I gently blew away the soft sand inside the carapace of one, and I found seven of the *jimcordyi*! I called Jason and together we spent time demolishing some of the other crabs to search for more. In one crab I found about 30 marginellas and also some *Caecum* (about 2 mm in size!)

The crabs stank, and so did my hands! I discovered that the shells also stank! I put them in alcohol in Fuji film cans (which don't leak) to take them home, and they still smelled when I took them out!

DID YOU KNOW... Brilliant shades of blue and aqua coat the iridescent lips of giant clams, but these shiny cells aren't just for show, new research finds. The iridescent sheen directs beams of sunlight into the



interior of the clam, providing light for algae housed inside. In a symbiotic return, the algae use that sunlight to power photosynthesis, resulting in energy for the giant clam.
