Wilmington Fire Department celebrates 100 Years

Riverview Cemetery offers final resting place for 26 firefighters by Tedd Cocker

As the city of Wilmington prepares to recognize the 100th Anniversary of the establishment of the Wilmington Fire Department, we take this opportunity to identify those former firefighters whose final resting place is Riverview Cemetery.

On December 1,1921, the Wilmington Fire Department (WFD) was formally created. Prior to that time a number of smaller, independent, local volunteer fire companies throughout the city provided fire protection-two of which began service in the late

1700s. Volunteer fire companies such as Brandywine, Delaware, Fame, Friendship, Independence, Liberty, Phoenix, Reliance, Rescue, Union, Washington, Water Witch, and Weccacoe were those that formerly protected Wilmington.When the WFD was chartered in 1921, many of these companies were dissolved into the new fire department, but a few simply went out of business.

To date, we have identified 26 WFD firefighters who are interred at Riverview. The earliest known burial was that of **Howard H. Foulk** (Delaware Fire Company #3) in 1890, followed by **William A. McNeal** (Washington Fire Company) in 1896, **James Logue, Sr.** (Brandywine Fire Company #10) in 1935, and **Barrett P. Conner, Jr.** (WFD – Bureau of Fire) in

We are privileged and honored to be the caretakers of the remains of these brave souls, some of whom died in the Line of Duty. So, as we go about our daily lives, let's all be thankful that the men and women — these local heroes — of the Wilmington Fire Department are on duty.

An excavation contractor by trade, he used wagons and teams of horses to haul stones to build Rockford Tower in Rockford Park. He was the first to bring Christmas trees to Wilmington by train from Canada. When sold, trees were delivered by horsedrawn wagons.James was elected president of the Brandywine Volunteer Fire Company No. 10 in 1910.

Battallion Chief and Fire Marshall for the Wilmington Bureau of Fire. He designed and engineered fire engine cages built to protect fire fighters during the 1968 riots. Barrett was also a lifetime member of the Talleyville Fire Company and an instructor with the Delaware State Fire School.
