Parenting Styles ~ What Style Are You?

Authoritative

Authoritative parenting style characteristics are nurturing, compassionate, supportive and consistent in rules. However, they set rigid boundaries for their children. Authoritative Parents control children's behavior by defining rules, reasoning, and discussing. They listen to a child's perspective but stand firm in boundaries, not always accepting a child's point of view.

Children raised with this parenting style are typically friendly, active, happy, confident, self-reliant, helpful, and achievement oriented.

Authoritarian parenting

This parenting style is **strict**, stern, and commands obedient behavior through threats, shaming, and punishment.

Children raised with this parenting style are typically showing poor social skills and lower levels of self-esteem and may also suffer from stress, depression, and anxiety.

Permissive

This parenting style is emotionally supportive but lax. These parents do not set firm limits, nor monitor children's activities or behavior of their children.

Children raised with this parenting style typically are impulsive, aggressive, and rebellious. The children are low in self-reliance, self-control, and achievement.

Uninvolved

This parenting style is unresponsive to a child's needs. Parents are unavailable, detached from the start. These parents are unable to meet the emotional and psychological *needs* of their *children*.

Children raised with this parenting style tend to have low self-confidence, low self- esteem and explore other role models to substitute the need for a neglectful parent.
