I was going to build a windmill for electric, grow my own garden, hunt and fish for my food, and cut plenty of wood for heat for the house.

Hey, I was young. I had a lot of energy then.

That first summer I had a great little garden going. After digging up probably 15 tons of rocks and stones out of the area I wanted to plant, and adding a tandem load of topsoil to fill in the hole left from the removal of the rocks, I finally started producing tomatoes, beans, lettuce, squash and numerous other table vegetables.

Every thing was growing great until mid June. That was when the local animals decided to enjoy some of my harvest. Actually I was sitting on my deck overlooking the garden when a deer first appeared. He headed toward my tomatoes, but when I yelled from the deck, he ran off I knew then that I needed a fence... No, I didn't have one... and no, I don't know why.

I went to the lumberyard and bought a 200-foot roll of 5-foot high chicken wire. I made the fence one continuous piece, so there were no breaks in it. After a full day of driving stakes and wrapping wire I knew my garden was going to be safe now.

Until a week later.

As I was looking out my window, my eye caught something big and black making its way out of the woods and heading towards my vegetables. It was a very large black bear!

He went towards my fence and continued to plow right over it, poles and all, as if it wasn't even there. I ran outside screaming and clapping my hands and he turned and ran back over the knocked down section of fencing.

I fixed the fence and several days later, it was knocked down again. This time he got some of my veggies.




Trivia at large



Life, Or Something Like It

But the prettiest sight to see is the holly that will be on your own front door.

I am a law-abiding citizen. I would never think of hurting someone or damaging their property. I stop at red lights and always use my turn signals. I file my taxes and declare everything I can think of. (My husband finds this particularly irritating.) My point is that I walk the "straight and narrow" so well that I annoy even myself.

Except this time of the year.

The fact of the matter is that for several weeks each year I trespass and pilfer shamelessly and that's just the sad, sorry truth.

Here's what happens: Outside our house we have buckets and barrels and all sorts of odd containers that absolutely demand to be filled with greens for the holidays. And we do have greens, I promise you, all over our property. Each year I pull out my trusty garden wagon and spend a happy afternoon or two filling it with a variety of pine branches and whatever other natural material catches my attention. Then I spend another satisfying bundle of time arranging everything in the buckets and barrels and odd containers. And then I step back and say to myself, "We need some color here." That's where the trespassing and pilfering begin.

"Color" means berries. Lots and lots of berries. And, sad to say, our property is a berry-less wasteland. This requires – work with me here – what one might call "The Importation of Berries" which sounds slightly better than "Absconding with Berries from Wherever You Can Find Them."

To this end, from Thanksgiving onward, I travel with a pair of garden snippers in my car's glove box (as one does when planning to commit a crime) and I start traveling the countryside in search of the very best berry bushes. I do have my standards, by the way, so you can rest assure that I would never sneak onto your front lawn and snip away at your shrubbery (though I've been tempted, I admit) but if you happen to have a nice selection of berry bushes growing alongside a quiet country road, I will most definitely stop to investigate.

You may not realize this, but berry bushes are tricky things. Some are covered with sharp, nasty thorns. (I prefer my pilfering to be pain-free whenever possible.) Some berry bushes have very little "staying power." I learned this the hard way after arriving home once with a trunkful of naked branches - not a single berry still attached. (I was still unearthing them from odd corners of my car well into April.) The highest quality berry bushes I've found - the ones that have no thorns and that stay hale and hearty for weeks - grow best, unfortunately, in swampy, wet areas. More than once I have literally balanced on thin ice around a stand of bushes, only to hear that dreaded crack, then found myself ankle-deep in muddy water. The bad news is hypothermia. The good news is how fast and efficient I become at berry harvesting under such conditions.

I try to be mindful that I'm not the only one who desperately wants these berries, by the way. Untold legions of birds count on them to get through the long winter and, since I don't want hungry-bird-guilt to weigh on my conscience (I've got enough paraphernalia lingering in that department already) I try to take only a few branches from any one area. This means that it takes countless trips afar to get the "color" all those buckets, barrels, and odd containers demand, but it's a burden I'm willing to bear.

When at last I feel that I've achieved the optimal berry-to-pine ratio in my containers, I remove the garden snippers from my glovebox, sweep the evidence (I mean berries) from my trunk, and pat myself on the back for once again avoiding the Long Arm of the Law.

Then return again to my boring, law-abiding self. Until next year...

2021 Dog Licenses Available at County Treasurers' Offices;

Dog License Sales Begin December 1, 2020 - All Dogs Must be Licensed by Jan. 1, 2021

Pennsylvanians can purchase 2021 dog licenses starting December 1st from their county treasurers. State law requires all dogs three months and older to be licensed by Jan. 1 of each year.

An annual dog license is \$8.50, or \$6.50 if the animal is spayed or neutered. Lifetime licenses are available for dogs that have permanent identification (microchip or tattoo). Older adults and people with disabilities may be eligible for discounts.

The dog license application is simple and only requests owner contact information and details about the dog being licensed, including name, age, breed and color.

Yearly Dog Licenses can be purchased by coming in person to our office, by mail, or online (convenience fees apply) www.padoglicense.com -- Lifetime Dog Licenses can be purchased in our office or by mail only with application and microchip/tattoo verification form signed by vet, vet tech or shelter.

Be aware that there are fake online PA dog license sites. The only Monroe County, PA website to purchase your dog license is: www.padoglicense.com

Monroe County Treasurer, Theresa Johnson, offered these reasons for dog licensing:

- ☐ If a dog gets lost, a license is the best way to get him/her back. A license helps animal control and shelters identify a dog and its rightful owners.
- ☐ It's the law. All dogs three months and older must have a current license.
- ☐ The cost of a license is less than the penalty for being caught without one. Owners who fail to license their dogs could face a fine of up to \$300 for each unlicensed dog.
- ☐ License fees support animal control. The annual fee to license a dog helps keep shelters running and supports the work of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement, which provides a number of vital services to protect dogs and the public. Last year, the Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement: 0,,
- o Enforced health and safety regulations in kennels by licensing 2,428 such operations and conducting more than 5,200 inspections.
- o Helped to secure more than 4,500 stray dogs, placing them in shelters until those that were licensed could be reunited with their owners.
- o Issued more than 3,000 citations and filed 115 misdemeanor complaints for violations of the Dog Law, including failing to license dogs, abandoning dogs, and allowing them to run at large.
- o Investigated nearly 1,500 dog bites, and they investigated and monitored 587 dogs that were deemed dangerous by magisterial judges.

Price Township man making a gift to the future

Editor's note: "Woods and Water" is a new occasional feature focusing on the relation between land and water quality - and the conservation easements that help preserve our environment in the Brodhead watershed. By Carol Hillestad For Brodhead Watershed Association

With his chocolate lab, Annie, gallivanting in the lead, Bart Bartolacci is showing me around his 40-acre private preserve along Stony Run in Price Township.

He's already explained the backstory. It was the dearest wish of his wife, Vivian, to keep this land protected. She loved fly fishing here and at a nearby fishing club, and wanted to be sure this wild woodland would never become lawns and McMansions. Together, she and Bart made plans with a land trust to conserve the land permanently.

But conservation easements take time; fate intervened, and Vivian didn't live quite long enough to see her wish fulfilled.

"She knew it was in the works. That gave her peace," Bart says

The woods are managed mostly by nature. Most stormtoppled trees lie where they fall, eventually becoming "nurse logs" that host lichens, ferns, saplings, and countless small creatures. Dry, brown curlicues are all that's left of summer's hay-scented fern, and wintergreen grows in the leaf litter beneath red stems of blueberries.

A long stretch of crystal-clear Stony Run meanders in and out of view. Its many braided strands come together as the water runs downstream into Brodhead Creek. From a wetland high on the Pocono Plateau, through this preserved land, it makes its way to the Delaware River and the Atlantic Ocean

Nature is in charge here, but humans have left traces, too. Old stone walls mark boundary lines, and Bart points out a less common marker: a white oak, intentionally bent as a sapling, now grown into a conspicuous, L-shaped sentinel tree, about 130 years old — its purpose a mystery.

We circle around the perimeter, which abuts another 400-acre property that has also been protected by a land trust. In fact, several landowners in the area have conserved their property with conservation easements.

"Every conservation easement is different," commented Louise Troutman, director of Pocono Heritage Land Trust, a local nonprofit. "Some owners want to carve out an area in case children, grandchildren or a future owner wants to build a home one day. Others want to ensure there will be no future development at all."

Each easement is tailored to the property and the property owner's wishes.

What conservation easements have in common is protecting land permanently. "You still own the land — you can sell it, for instance, or bequeath it to anyone you choose. The restrictions on development become part of the deed, so you, your heirs, or any other future owner will be bound by them," Troutman says. As holder of the easement, part of a land trust's job is to monitor the property and ensure it is protected 'basically forever," she adds.

The land remains private, but we all benefit when someone conserves land.

Natural forest land keeps drinking water from creeks and private wells safe and pure. It protects against floods and erosion. Neighboring property values tend to increase. Beautiful views remain undisturbed. Air quality stays high. Wildlife thrives on pure water, natural habitat, and room to roam.

We're nearly back to where we started when Bart stops at an upright, head-high boulder. "When her illness got hard to bear," Bart said, "this is where Vivian would come, to rest against this rock in the stillness.'

It's good to know that thanks to two special people, this land will support healthy forest and pristine waters, as far as the future





ABOUT CONSERVATION EASEMENTS

A conservation easement is a tool for conserving land. In our area, conserved land protects water quality and quantity, views, working farmland, forestland, and other public interests.

In fact, thousands of acres of farms, forests, scenic hillsides, historic landscapes, and town green spaces have been conserved with conservation easements. An easement is created by mutual agreement between a landowner and a private land trust. With conservation goals in mind, the easement limits certain uses of the land, while keeping the land in the owner's control. Owners continue to use the land as they wish, within the constraints they agree on when establishing the easement.

Conservation easements don't include public access unless the owner establishes that in the agreement. Conservation easements are designed to be perpetual. They become part of the deed to the land, and future owners will be bound by the terms.
