President's Message

It has been a very busy fortnight in Oberon. The AGM has been and gone. There was only one change. John Brotchie who had been the Treasurer for 8 years did not want to continue in that position. He was replaced by Jessie Bijok who has a lot of experience in similar roles in Sydney organisations.

This year because the payments made by the Department of Infrastructure have exceeded a quarter of a million dollars our level of reporting to the Department of Fair Trading moved to Tier 1. The level of accountability and financial returns has increased.

I am pleased to report that the work on replacing the headstocks and the truss rods in carriage CBA850 is nearing completion. An inspection and certification will follow.

The work by CAM has moved along quite well. There have been some unplanned breaks due to the weather and some of the team members catching covid. Our fitters have enjoyed the conversations with the supervisors and we have learnt a lot about laying and repairing track.

There has been a lot of discussion at committee level about the Hazelgrove end of the tourist railway. An ambitious plan is developing and we would like to have a longer and more substantial platform for the safety of passengers. Plans for the original PC1 type of building are readily available and we are fairly sure that we can make a replica. The turnaround loop is seen to be a necessity and talks have started with a railway surveyor who develop a plan that uses the turnouts we have in stock at this stage. Enquiries have commenced to source more timbers and rail for the loop.

Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway Upgrades Are Full Steam Ahead

“It was great to recently drop in to the Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway to see the progress being made on the new track!

The works will ensure the historic attraction meets safety standards and caters for the rush of tourists expected once the precinct and line are fully functional.


In 2019 the Australian Government supported the Heritage Railway with \$1.5 million in funding to open the first section of track between Oberon and Hazelgrove. This section of track is now well underway.

Each week volunteers at the Oberon Tarana heritage Railway Incorporated work alongside Complete Asset Management (CAD) to breathe a little more life into the 24.3km long tourist track using reclaimed timber sleepers, some of which were salvaged from the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

Hundreds of volunteers have dedicated countless hours over the last 15 years to painstakingly restore the line so that the tracks can carry passengers once more. This will be the first of its kind to open since the Zig Zag Railway in the 1970s.

Unique tourist attractions like the Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway are a major drawcard for visitors looking for an impressive and authentic regional experience.

I’m looking forward to seeing the project finished with plans for the reopening scheduled for Easter 2023!

Apply for variation of existing accreditation to become a Rail Transport Operator Oberon to Hazelgrove.

Implement the completed review of SMS and Operational Procedures documents.

Karl Schaefer remembers....

"I remember, very well, when the Tarana – Oberon Branch Line (as it was correctly known – UP End, from which the lines originate, always precedes the Dn – to the terminus) was abandoned and prior, when we were responsible for and paid (from the Division Engineer's Office, W&W Bch., Bathurst), both the Fettling Gangs at Tarana, one of which cared for a short Section of Track from the MW on the Branch Line for a few kms towards Oberon itself. (Reasonably confident, Bert McKinnon was the ganger of "16 Gang, Oberon" at the time the gang was disbanded and I'm pretty certain, Bill Cosgrove was the Ganger there, when I started the job, 2 days after I left school in 1961 – might be, my memory isn't as good as it was/I think it is and it was vice versa – definitely remember the names of both Gangers at Tarana, one of whom, tragically, dropped dead in the pub at Tarana on the night of his retirement "do" – last day worked. We were responsible for maintenance of the line and all infrastructure, including the buildings, around that neck of the woods, as far west (on the "real" Main West – Broken Hill Line was, in fact, only a "Branch" line in those days – MW terminated at Bourke) as Wellington, SW to Kingsvale and NW to Binnaway, on the Branch Lines and the various "Pioneer" Lines off the "branches". Not sure if it has ever really occurred, but rail lines in NSW cannot be "closed", without an Act of Parliament being passed – easy way out for various, devious governments has simply been to treat them as being disused and/or withdrawing services and maintenance and in the latter case, it becomes exceptionally easy to withdraw services as the tracks become unfit for use, or using the old pretext, when floods (occasionally fires) damaged a section of, especially, the "pioneer" Branch Lines. Not sure about these new rail trails, to be honest

as I suspect, as much as I can appreciate them as a former, enthusiastic (road bike and race rider, the formations and rights of way being preserved, supposedly, in perpetuity as public lands and not sold off to the cockies whose lands (the truth be told, stolen from the First People of Australia), through which many pass, they wont preclude possible reopening to rail traffic or for use by heritage rail operators for tourism/historic rail journeys. Definitely brings back memories of the days when NSW had a genuine, government owned service to all parts of the State and not this Mickey Mouse bullshit system we've largely, by default, handed over to private enterprise. My greatest regret is that, despite many of the Branch Lines, such as Tarana – Oberon, Craboon – Coolah, even Blayney – Harden & Wallerawang – Gwabegar and the numerous off-shoots from the B-H being under the control of the DE Bathurst, I failed to travel on most of them, but I guess I can at least say I did travel by "trike" (DE's "flivver"), over quite a few Kms of the W'Wang – Gwabegar Line between Mudgee – Capertee one memorable trip with the DE of the day. (Managed one time, about 38 years ago, a trip with my family from Cowra – Canowindra – Cowra (former place where we had three fettling gangs and later two gangs and even at Koorawatha, from which the Koorawatha – Grenfell ran, three gangs), on a LVR steam hauled excursion, but never the full run from Cowra to Eugowra. I also remember, with considerable affection, many of the track vehicles used, especially by the W&W Branch, many of which were maintained by our own team of mechanics (based in Bathurst), and some which were actually built and overhauled in the PWS Bathurst (whose Wages Staff we also paid from the DE, Bx's office), and the many components for, in particular, Villiers Mk.8E quadricycles and other TVs, which were manufactured there and in the other PWS's Newcastle, Chullora and Goulburn. Needless to say, I also remember the names of many of the Gangers across the Division – wonderful old

bush blokes in the main, and several (two especially – one from Grenfell and the other, Gulgong – great coincidence there – the legendary Henry Lawson) whose handwriting was copper plate and others, probably worse than my own, which even I readily admit is “BA” – with great affection and admiration.” Sorry about the length of my rant/history lesson, but please feel free to pass on my thanks to whomever it is who provided the Newsletter from the area I still call/regards as “home” i.e., Around Bathurst.

Upgrade is on track.

From the pages of the Oberon Review
Thursday, September 22, 2022:

“Heritage railways rebuild is on track

Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway (OTHR) are pleased to announce that work is continuing the upgrade of the railway line between Oberon and Hazelgrove.

Complete Asset management (CAM) have been busy even if they are not always working in plain sight. Almost all the sleepers that needed replacing have been replaced and work is now progressing on the several level crossings along the stretch of track.

Many of these crossings are on private or farm access roads but several are on roads which carry a reasonable amount of traffic, and upgrades are done in a way that inconveniences the least number of people. Some of the upgrades involve extra work, an example being the crossing on Black Bullock Road. This crossing is now wider because the upgrade includes some essential work to divert water flow away from the edge of the road.

The latest work is on the level crossing on Albion Street. Closing the road for several days needed for the work to be done. While the work is being done the only access to Albion Street to the Highland Pine Plant is coming in from the roundabout at Abercrombie and O’Connell Roads, with all other traffic being redirected. This means that some heavy traffic, including log trucks, will be passing through residential streets, but it’s only for a few days.

“We apologise for the inconvenience,” OTHR President, Greg Bourne said,

“everyone will forget it when the railway is finally open, bringing in tourists and carrying passengers next year.”

According to CAM Project Manager, Dave Horder, the next major disruption in the rebuilding of the railway will be upgrading the crossing at the entry to the Borg plant on Lowes Mount Road.

The crossing on Lowes Mount Road itself just needs some cleaning, something which will make anyone travelling to anywhere on the Tarana side of the crossing happy. It’s a long way around if Lowes Mount Road is closed for

any length of time. At the same time, the crossing on the road into the tip will be rebuilt.

Work is expected to start on Monday, September 26.

OTHR hopes to have the railway between Oberon and Hazelgrove running early in 2023"

"The work on the railway line to Hazelgrove has progressed well with trackwork mostly complete and only the road crossing at Albion Street, the Borg Gate, Rutters Ridge and the Tip Road to be completed over the next 10 days or so. Soon, the major milestone for the Heritage Railway to get up and running between Oberon and Hazelgrove will be in place. I believe the aim is for tourist trips on the line to commence in late 2023.



There's so much to do in Oberon and surrounds. When puzzling about where your next extended run should go, give Oberon a thought.

Located in the New South Wales Central Tablelands and about 180K from Sydney, Oberon punches above its weight when it comes to attractions and points of interest.


