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Decolonizing Latinx Feminisms Course

MUJER's Decolonizing Latinx Feminism Course 2016, presented in partnership with The Centre for Women and Trans People at U of T, worked as a knowledge-sharing, community-building space that brought together trans, cis womxn, and gender non-conforming people with roots in Latin America. The seven week course explored the intersections of Latinx identities, ability, wellness, and the power structures affecting our community, while creating a critical awareness of our responsibilities as settlers on colonized land, working towards decolonization and liberation in solidarity with the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island.

DLFC is a free community-based course, which is incredibly successful and has received over 30 applications and had 16 participants. It offers learning plans that take into consideration different learning styles to provide a more accessible course for community members. Throughout these 7 weeks, participants thrive in an environment that is conscious of trauma, cultural context and safety, intersections, queerness, Blackness, Indigeneity, and resistance of our peoples. The following guest speakers were instrumental in creating setting the tone for the students: Dahli Clarke-Partida, Aldeli Albán Reyna, Mercedes Sharpe Zayas, Silvana Bazet, and Kiley May.


Community Engagement & Events

PRIDE 2016 – TRANS MARCH AND DYKE MARCH

In collaboration with the Toronto Rape Crisis Centre | Multicultural Women Against Rape, we planned a banner making day for both the Trans March and the Dyke March. The Trans March banner honours #PulseOrlando, the shooting that targeted LBTQI+ folks on Latinx Night and commemorates the lives of many Black and Brown Queer Latinx people who were impacted. The banner painting event created spaces for creativity and resistance to come together. ¡Existir es resistir!




Latinx Solidarity with Grassy Narrows

MUJER hosted a workshop for people from Latin American diaspora to learn more about the struggles of the Indigenous community of Grassy Narrows to support the River Run, demanding justice from the Ontario government on the impacts of mercury level in the water. More than fifty years ago a paper mill in Dryden, Ontario began to dump murderous amounts of mercury into the Wabigoon River, upstream from the community of Asubpechoseewagong (Grassy Narrows). The people of Grassy Narrows, and all the life that supports their traditional territories, have lived with the immense health effects of that crime ever since, with no responsibility taken on the part of the Ontario government that allowed that to happen.



BLMTO Tent City

On March 20th, Black Lives Matter Toronto Coalition organized a peaceful protest at Nathan Phillips Square to speak out against anti-Black racism in the city including state violence, the debasing of AfroFest, and the recent SIU decision not to charge the officers accountable for the death of Andrew Loku.
