Hebrews 12: 1-3





When I was at school, there were words on a games afternoon I used to dread: *"The pitches are too waterlogged/frozen, we are going on a cross country run."* I was looking forward to rugby or football, but a cross country run was the last thing I wanted to do. The teachers used to place themselves so they could see if we were looking for short cuts. So there was only one thing to do - run!

In the Olympics, we are going to see many races in the main athletics stadium - some over in less than 10 seconds. The race the author of Hebrews is talking about is much more like a cross country run. There is a start, markers on the way and a finish. The race begins when we first decide to follow Jesus. Our race is marked out with special moments. These may be services like Confirmation or significant moments or experiences. For Jesus, these would have been times like his baptism or the transfiguration (Matthew 17. 1-13). They are often reminders of how much God loves us or a deep touch of His Spirit. We can hold onto these in tougher times as we remind ourselves of God's faithfulness.

Having these sacred moments to hold on to helps us to persevere as we run the race (Hebrews 12. 1). But we are also surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. Those from the Old Testament are listed in Hebrews 11 (it is well worth going through this and thinking of what we know about those mentioned). We also have heroes of the faith that could be added to that list - some designated as "saints" and others who we admire for their faith in God and their ordinariness.

There will be few athletes competing in Tokyo 2020 that do not have a team around them of coaches, physiotherapists, nutritionists etc. In order to persevere, we should have a good support network around us to spur one another on. We are going to face hard times. Jesus faced them and promises He will be with us through ours (v.3). But we also need to gather others around us who can support us, give us wise advice and even challenge us.

Most importantly, we need to keep focused or re-focusing on Jesus. He was with us at the start of the race. We can get distracted or discouraged, but He is there to help us back on track and to "perfect" our faith.

Run the race with perseverance. There is a finish line and the prize is out of this world! Life will not always be easy, but Jesus will always be with us. So there is only one thing to do - run!
