and to celebrate the birth of this nation. On July 2nd 2010, Eighty Six New Jersey FCCLA members traveled to Chicago for the 65th Annual National Leadership Conference where they competed in STAR Events, participated in career explorations and witnessed life changing workshops. To kick off a successful conference, everyone attended the 4th of July festivities on Navy Pier that closed with a breathtaking fireworks show.

On Monday, July 5, 2010, many of our members began our day supporting the New Jersey FCCLA national officer candidates, Brian Garsh and Danny Brooks, as they presented their creative national officer candidate speeches. Danny ran for the regional position and Brian ran for an at-large position. At the general session, conference participants were introduced to our 2009-2010 National Officers Team. The audience was moved by the keynote speaker Aaron Davis. He challenged us as students to think about the impact of our choices. The following day was the business and recognition session where we discuss proposed Bylaw Amendments and the membership report. At the close of the business session, the 2010-2011 National Executive Council was announced. We were ecstatic to hear that Danny Brooks succeeded in his goal to be part of the National Executive Council.

At the closing session, John P. Stevens High School was recognized for their second place award in the Community Service National Program, for their project: Kids helping kids. We were pleased to learn the total amount collected for the national outreach project was \$241,590.05. A representative from the Children's Miracle Network accepted the check with appreciation. At the end of this session, we said farewell to the 2009-10 executive council and we welcomed the installation of the 2010-2011 National Officers. Our own Danny Brooks was elected to serve as the National First-Vice President. We are very proud of him. To close that evening everyone celebrated FCCLA's 65th birthday at the Gala. The next morning was the STAR events recognition session. New Jersey FCCLA brought home 32 gold medals, 38 silver and 4 bronze. Congratulations to everyone and we hope to see many of you next year in Anaheim California.



The beginning of the school year is the best time to involve all members, new and experienced, and fundraise for your chapter's future endeavors. Below is a list of 10 fundraising ideas to start your year off right.

1. Guessing Jar: Halloween is right around the corner and what better way to get in the spirit than by having a guessing jar. All you need is a jar and candy to fill the jar with. Count the number of pieces and let students take a guess for any monetary amount. The winner is the one who guesses closest to the number that is in the jar. The winner can receive a prize.

2. Haunted House: Have a haunted house at your school for your classmates or community members by decorating a classroom and dressing up. Have participants pay one dollar or have them bring a non-perishable can of food for a local food bank.

3. Bowling Night: Hold a bowling night at your local bowling alley. Talk to the manger or staff at the bowling alley to see if your chapter could have a night where everyone at your school could go to that bowling alley and your chapter could receive a percentage of the profit that night. 4. Ink Cartridge Donation: Go green with your chapter. Staples, Office Depot, and other various office supply stores offer this program. Every time you donate an ink cartridge you will receive a few dollars for your donation, it goes towards store credit but this will allow your chapter to get supplies for various projects your chapter will be doing.

5. Warm Cider: Pick up some apple cider at the store, warm it up, and sell it at lunchtime or after school.

6. Candied Apples: With a few simple supplies like caramel, apples, plastic sticks, a stove, and a recipe of your choice gather members of your chapter to make some candy apples to sell at lunch or after school.

7. Entertainment Book Sale: Sell Entertainment Books to everyone in your community.

8. Yard Sale: Gather members, friends, students, and anyone else that would like to be a part of this wonderful fundraiser. All you need are tables, donations of items that can be sold, and a date to have the event.

9. Flag Football Tournament: Flag Football is a great activity for any grade. Talk to your gym teachers, pass out fliers and have teams sign up. Players can be charged and some of the money fund a trophy or prizes for the winners

10. Pizza Sale: There are many companies all over New Jersey but the most famous is Joe Corbi's. Hand out fliers and forms which can be received from contacting the company. Pass out fliers and forms to everyone. As an initiative, the student who sells the most can win a prize.

Healthy Snack Idea

School is back in session, which means a ton of homework along with indulgent after-school snacks. For many students, after school snacks are usually chips and soda; however, as FCCLA members, we know that staying healthy is key! After School snacks should be tasty, healthy, and fulfilling. An awesome afterschool snack is a pizza that is hearty, healthy and wholesome. It is sure to keep you satisfied until dinner and help you focus on your studies! Here is a pizza recipe I'm sure you'll love.

- 2 large whole wheat pita bread rounds
- Nonstick cooking spray
- ¹/₂ cup assorted fresh vegetables (broccoli, cauliflower, red pepper strips, sliced fresh mushrooms)
- ¹/₄ cup pizza sauce
- ¹/₄ cup (1 ounce) shredded low-fat mozzarella cheese

Directions: Place pita rounds on a baking sheet. Bake in a 400 degrees (F) oven for 5 minutes. Coat an unheated small nonstick skillet with nonstick cooking spray. Preheat over medium heat. Add the assorted vegetables; cook and stir until crisp-tender. Spread pizza sauce on pita bread rounds; sprinkle with cooked vegetables and cheese. Bake in 400 degrees (F) oven for 8 to 10 minutes, or until light brown. Serve warm.

ENJOY THIS HEALTHY SNACK!!

As the school year is starting, it is imperative that chapters focus on recruiting perspective FCCLA members for the 2010-2011 school year. Membership is essential to the success of FCCLA and boosting your chapter numbers will prove beneficial for the organization at the local, state and national levels! Everyone has different methods for recruiting members, but here are a few suggestions that might help you kick off the year to recruit and retain members:

- Type up a fun and attractive advertisement for your chapter and the organization in general to give to parents and students at open-house night!
 Have a membership drive. Remember that you will have the most competition at the start of the year when every other organization and club in school is recruiting. Advertise the membership drive and motivate your current members to get out there and meet people.
 - Promote! Promote! Promote! Have your current members wear their gear! When students see the members wearing FCCLA shirts, sweaters, and other items it will draw them in and make them want to join as well. Keep in mind the on line FC-CLA store has all types of pens and gadgets with our logo on it that you might want to hand out at an information meeting.
