Welcome to the April issue of the Ipswich Branch of the Ulysses Club Inc. Newsletter.

The 13th March will not be remembered as a happy day for the Ipswich members. We lost one of the founding members and strongest supporters of the Ipswich Ulysses Club when Konrad "Howza" Walters, our friend and webmaster lost his hard-fought battle with cancer. Kon's passing affected our members in differing ways but he has left a memory that will not fade for a very long time. Kon developed the PUB "Proposed Ulysses Branch" webpage which was used to attract potential members to our new venture which in turn, three months in fact allowed us to be granted branch status by NATCOM.

Kon was escorted to the chapel on his last ride by 66 motorcycles and about 8 cars. A credit to the respect the man held amongst his peers. We send our love and prayers to our resigning welfare officer and Kons wife Christine who nursed Kon until his final day.



Kon will be sorely missed as a friend, mentor, committee member and guide to many of the branch members. Konrad was a committed and proud Ulyssian with almost 10 years' service, during this time serving on both the Lockyer Branch and our Committee as Webmaster. I was proud to present his eulogy at his celebration and it was then I realised just how much of an influence Kon had on our lives.

Konrad was given his nickname "Howza" years ago when I was the sheriff of the Lockyer Branch. "How's the air up there" was our usual comment to him. Konrad was inspirational, kept us on track and grounded. A man with a wealth of knowledge who normally had to be asked before he gave his opinion.

The National President personally presented Konrad with the Telemachus medal in 2016 for services to a branch. This award is the second highest honour than can bestowed on a Ulysses member. As only the 55th recipient in Ulysses history, it is a sign of just how highly regarded he was by all.

Kon's legacy will live on in the hearts from those who had the barest of touches, up to those who were his regular companions. Kon will be missed when we ride our bikes and get together for other activities. Each year we will be honouring Konrad's memory by having a "Howza" memorial ride leave from Kyogle to Rathdowney via the Summerland Way, Kon's favourite ride. We will also be submitting his eulogy to the Riding On, and adding his name to the Honour Board at the Ulysses Memorial Gardens, Somerset Dam in September 2017.

We also offer our condolences to Steve 'Angry' Mathison on the recent passing of his partner Maree. Some of us had the honour attending the celebration of her life. Maree's was part of our social group and her daughter Jo has been on a few rides with the branch including the Father's Day ride in 2016.

The branch AGM is being held tonight and there will be no need for a ballot for any position, however you will still need produce your current Ulysses Membership Card to sign into the AGM proper. A huge thank you to those who have decided to stand down from the 2016 committee for all the time and effort you have put in over the last 12 months. Good luck and a big thankyou to those who have put up their hands to keep the branch running in 2017/18. The jobs are not hard but do take up some personal time every month. All I ask is that you support each and every one of these members.

Please remember all committee members are volunteers and are doing the job because they love the branch and want to see it thrive in a climate which is seeing Ulysses membership decline considerably. They are only too willing to listen to any comments you may have to assist the branch as long as the subject is approached in a respectable way. 2017/18 sees the branch saying farewell to four members of the committee. Unfortunately one of the positions is vacant because of Kon losing his battle with cancer. I have no doubt that the members who take over these positions will do the very best they can and I look forward to being at the head of the table once more and working with them to continue the great reputation we have in the Ipswich area.

The branch talent quest a great success with quite a few members and guests stepping up to the stage to entertain around 60 of us. Old Goat was given first prize, DaZar and Julz sharing 2nd with their duet and Spook getting a well-deserved 3rd place. Lots of nerves made way to brave and wonderful efforts in the name of glory. A huge thanks to Old Goat for donating his sound system which he set up at around 11am and then hung around the Club until the rest of us arrived. Our infamous MC DaZ'ar kept the night running as smooth as possible expertly assisted by Julz. What started as a throw away idea became a reality on the night and there was many commenting that we should have another next year. This seems like being a formality and I believe that it will become an institution being held just before the Branch AGMs. I also want to acknowledge the Ipswich Country Club for donating the room for us and for also putting on extra staff to look after us.

The third Ipswich Bike Night was held last Saturday night with hundreds attending again much like last time. Thanks to those who manned the branch marquee for the night while Windsucker and I looked after the registrations and voting for the show and shine. Unfortunately, the trucks with the lighting for the night were caught up in the floods somewhere and the lights in the car park were not really built for the job they had to do. Never mind, we learn as we grow and the Country Club has learnt heaps from the first two and the next should be spot on. I saw Ulysses members from Redcliffe, Lockyer, Redlands and Brisbane branches who attended as well as members from other motorcycle clubs from the area.

The National AGM is on from the 21ST May until the 29th May in Wauchope NSW. There seems to be around a dozen of our members attending so far so if you still have designs on attending then you need to make the decision and register quite quickly. If you are not attending and would like to have a say in the make-up of the National Committee, then you need to contact NATCOM pretty quickly and get a postal vote organised for yourself. This year we have the choice of a male or female President, a new Treasurer, and also a new committee member. For those attending, we will try to have a bbq get-together for the branch members one afternoon. Also for those attending the formal dinner on Tuesday or Saturday night and want to have a drink or two are advised to get themselves a bus lift offered by NATCOM which needs to be pre-booked.

There were three rides since last information night for you to come along to. The first was led by Smurf and headed towards Yarraman via a stopover at Esk. The second was a ride to the Black Dog Ride starting at Shark Leather at Ormeau. Eight came along to the start of the ride in pouring rain, with four heading off to the coast and four heading off to have coffee at Yamanto and dry off. The third ride was Chopper and Yakky's ride to Crows Nest which had to be postponed until a safer time due to flooding around the districts and us not being able to do a pre-ride to ensure the safety of our members. We look forward to Chopper and Yakky leading us off to Crows Nest in the near future.

Choppers ride ended up heading up to Boonah for coffee with 21 bikes and 23 attendees. After saying goodbye to the rest of the mob, Amanda and I decided to go towards Aratula with Mick and Paula then turn back and go through Kalbar to touch base with Bluey who runs a motorbike apparel store from his home. We were hoping to convince him to come to the DV Ride with his sewing machine so those attending could have their patches sewn on the same day. Unfortunately, his machine is way too heavy for him to be mobile so I will keep searching to find someone to do the job for us.

For those who have not yet been informed, Crows Nest has become a Bike Friendly Town and it was christened on the same day as Smurf led his ride to Yarraman. Amanda and I peeled off the ride that day and went to network our branch ride to the rest of the motorcycle community. We were lucky to be introduced to Mark Hinchcliffe who writes articles under the name of Motorcycle Writer and he has already written about our DV Ride and will be doing a follow up article as the ride gets closer. We were able to speak to other members of clubs and get the information out there.

The branch has been given an official invitation to join the Bundamba ANZAC Observance Committee to honour those who have fought and given the ultimate sacrifice during times of war. Please be aware that Bunnings in Mining St Bundamba has opened their underground car park for those who wish to attend the service. The march which moves along Brisbane Rd from the Salvation Army Citadel begins at 4:15am so we need to be in the memorial ground before then. Chopper and Smurf have volunteered and will be laying the wreath on behalf of the branch this year.

Next year I believe it would be appropriate for two female members to lay the wreath as we have not had this happen in the times we have been attending. As we have for the past few years, those interested will be leaving after the ceremony and heading to the Queens Park to have breakfast. If you are intending to join us can you please let me know so I can cater for the occasion? \$5.00 gets you a cooked brekky, juice, and we will supply the tea and coffee if you bring along your flasks. If you have dietary requirements, please let us know.

I have been investigating ways for the branch to get the good name of Ulysses out in the community more and I have had two items fall into my lap in the last couple of months. The first is on the 22nd April... Yes, this month. Vera from "Focus on Youth" contacted me to see if we could give some disabled children a ride on the bikes. After a bit of phone tag it was decided we meet them at Cormorant Bay at Wivenhoe Dam and take the youth for small rides around the complex. This allows for maximum safety as we would not be travelling on highways but would be staying in the grounds itself. After giving the rides we will be joining them for a free bbq lunch. Those interested in helping out could you please contact me asap so I can give numbers back to Vera for catering and, I myself will have an idea of how many members I can count on to attend. Also please bring along a spare helmet as pillions will obviously be required to wear helmets and closed in shoes on the day.

Also bring your camera for some great shots for the website and newsletter. Hope to have a good turnout on Saturday 22nd April, we will be leaving from the Club at 10:30 am and I will hopefully get us there with no 'u turns'. If my beloved VTX isn't on the road I will need someone to tow our branch trailer, so please see me. These community events might not be of high interest to some, but I believe they provide a great opportunity to us to get-together, have a chat, get to know each other a little better, whilst putting a smile on the face of those less fortunate than ourselves.

The next trip is not until June but it requires a side car (Doogies) to take a lad from his home in Calvert to his 21st Birthday luncheon at Char'd in Booval. I thought it would be nice to have an escort for Joshua and some support for Doogie if we could have some members join us for the run into town. It is only relatively a short ride so we could go back up to the Queens Park kiosk or Café 63 at Yamanto for coffee after dropping him off.

By now you would have received your copy of the Riding On and seen the wonderful article that Chopper (Peter) and Yakky (Sue) submitted about the DV Ride. Chopper was just telling me that he met some of our members at the 2016 DV Ride and was encouraged to come join Ulysses and our branch. Being such new Ulyssean it is heartening to see him leading their first ride for the branch in 2017 and now being published in the National Magazine of our great club.

Another thing I am particularly proud of is our new signage at the front entry of the Ipswich Country Club. This took a lot of negotiation with the Club, the owner Sirromet Wines and also NATCOM to bring this to fruition. DaZar's workplace CV Signs has once again donated professional expertise, time and financial support to provide the signage free of charge to us. We thank them sincerely for their support and want to let you all know that CV Signs have been acknowledged as a major sponsor of our branch. The frame to hold the signage was provided free of charge by the Ipswich Country Club. 
Thank you to everyone that was involved in making the evening the success that it was. We can't wait till we do it all again next year.

Dave must have warned you about us because you told us that we looked exactly like Dave had described us. Already on the first night I felt a connection like we already knew each other. I always liked being near you, even when we didn't have much to talk about.

When we were riding you always liked to go fast through the twisties but that wasn't always easy when we were riding with so many other people, where there would always be someone slowing us down. I found out when riding behind you, you had your own way of fixing the problem.

We have made a change to our corner-marking rules:

Normally when we come to a corner or intersection that needs to be corner-marked, the first bike after the ride leader should stop and mark that corner. However, if the first bike after the ride leader has more than 2 wheels, (Bike towing a trailer, Trike, bike with sidecar) we would then like the next bike to mark that corner so we don't have something wide to cause a traffic hazard.

This should be my last Road Rash as I am taking on another task after the AGM so I thank you all for putting up with my Road Rash.



Queensland Motorcycle Riders' Guide (Supplied by Ado)



The <u>Queensland Motorcycle Riders' Guide</u> is a comprehensive one-stop reference handbook for all motorcyclists, whether you are new to riding, a regular rider or thinking of returning to ride. It covers a range of topics including licensing and registration, road rules, protective gear, safe riding techniques, how to cope with hazards, motorcycle maintenance, modifications, offences and current penalties.

Motorcyclists have to adhere to the same <u>Queensland Road Rules</u> as other road users however, there are some laws that apply specifically to motorcycle riders and their pillion passengers. In addition, there are special rules for the class of licence you hold (learner, provisional and open).

The Queensland Motorcycle Rider's Guide and the latest edition of <u>Your Keys to</u>

<u>Driving in Queensland</u> provides up-to-date information about the Queensland licensing system, road rules and road safety messages.

Choosing the right motorcycle

Just because a motorcycle looks good, doesn't mean it's the best choice for your needs and your level of experience. Try out a few different motorcycles and get advice from experienced riders.

Remember a few basic rules:

- If you are a learner rider or hold a class RE motorcycle licence in Queensland, you are restricted to a
 motorcycle approved under the LAM Scheme.
- Your motorcycle must be roadworthy. Buying through a licensed dealer may be more expensive than buying privately, but will provide you with a warranty and guarantee of title.
- Make sure your motorcycle suits your build. You don't want one that's too high for you, so make sure you
 feel comfortable when you're sitting on it with the stands up. You'll also want to make sure you can push it
 easily without losing your balance.

Motorcycle maintenance checklist

You should check your motorcycle before every ride — your safety begins with your motorcycle. Routinely check and maintain your motorcycle to reduce your risk of injury and the risk of damage to your motorcycle. Before riding make sure you check:

- current registration
- registration plate is clearly displayed and securely attached
- working lights including headlights, tail-light, brake light and indicators
- working brakes
- steering
- suspension
- working horn
- tyre pressure and tread depth (at least 1.5mm over the whole tyre surface)
- chain/drive belt guard.

Adjust the controls of the motorcycle so they are right for you. You should be able to reach all the controls easily without being cramped.

Before you ride



No one can predict what will happen on the road, but you can put the odds in your favour if you make sure you and your motorcycle are in top condition before you set out.

Are you roadworthy?

Riding a motorcycle safely is more mentally and physically demanding than driving a car. Use this simple checklist to make sure you're up to it.

Don't ride if:

- you're tired or unable to concentrate
- your blood alcohol level is above the legal limit
- you are under the influence of illegal drugs or any medication that may affect your riding ability.

Think very carefully about riding if you:

- are not in the right frame of mind to be alert and careful
- haven't slept well
- are stressed
- feel unwell or emotionally upset.

Safe riding tips

Maintaining concentration

Your survival depends on concentration, anticipation and judgement.

You need to be aware of how your concentration is affected by your immediate environment, your health and/or physical condition, and your ability to process visual information. Fatigue, alcohol and drugs are just some things that can affect your concentration.

Speed management

Skilful riders manage their speed and road position to maintain a crash avoidance space around their motorcycle. To determine the crash avoidance space to the front of your motorcycle, you need to take into account two key factors – reaction time and response time.

Reaction time is the time you need to:

- see the information
- understand what it means
- decide on a response.

A rider who is fit, concentrating, alert and not affected by alcohol, drugs, fatigue or a distraction, will require about one and a half seconds to react to a sudden and unexpected change in traffic.

Response time is the time required for you to take action. You need a two second gap to react and respond to a situation in front of you. You may need even longer in poor conditions.

Remember, the faster you are travelling, the longer it takes to stop.

Positioning

Traffic and road situations are constantly changing and so does the safest position on the road. Skillful riders aim to be in the right place at all times. Generally you should position yourself on the road where you can see ahead and where you can be seen by other road users. Select a safe gap when turning, overtaking and changing lanes.

Riding techniques such as identifying vehicle blind spots and correct positioning, can improve your visibility to other road users. Don't ride in the blind spots of other vehicles (behind and beside them). If you cannot see the external mirrors of the vehicle in front, the driver cannot see you.

Night riding

Riding at night is considerably more dangerous for motorcyclists. Take extra care when riding at night and apply safety measures, such as:

- Ensure you can be seen—check that your lights and indicators are working properly, and wear reflective or fluorescent clothing.
- Maximise your vision—avoid wearing dark, tinted or scratched eye protection, travel on well-lit roads, and use high beam (except within 200m of another vehicle).
- Give yourself time to respond slow down to maintain at least 6 seconds of vision, and increase your crash avoidance space you must be able to stop within the distance you can see.
