Music festival a great chance to showcase talent

The 38th annual Fort Saskatchewan Music Festival is geared up for a week of fun-filled competitions and a chance for young performers to display their musical talents.

The festival begins today and will run through to Friday. There are 409 entries this year and about 2000 performers. This is in comparison to last years entry count of 400 and 1,969 competitors.

Kathy Faris, past president of the music festival, said there are four categories this year and judges have been chosen for each category. The judges are, for vocal and choral Loretta Baker, piano Janet Scott Hoyt, instrumental Tom Dust and David Hoyt and speech arts Beth Dunbar.

Participants in the various categories range anywhere from six to 19 years old and entries include communities around the Fort as well.

The family class seems to be a favorite among people this year. There are a lot of entries in this category.

"The idea of the family class is to promote music in families. This year it seems to be quite popular," she said.

A creative music class has been introduced this year. Participants will write their own music and then perform it. They will be judged both on the writing and the performance.

The different competitions will be held all over the Fort. The piano competition will be held at Our Lady of the Angles Church, choral at Win Ferguson School, vocal and speech arts at the Community Baptist Church, instrumental, solos and ensemble at the First United Church, and bands at the Rudolph Hennig School and Fort High.

The festival is all run on donations from the community and Faris said it would that the music festival committee is always excepting donations. A final concert will be held at the Win Ferguson School on Sunday beginning at 3 p.m. The concert will include the top performers of the week. Faris said the concert always has a good turnout and is worth seeing.

Students tune up for Music Festival

All around town school age children are tuning up their musical abilities in preparation for the 38th annual Fort Saskatchewan Music Festival in early March.

Adjudicator chairman Sharon Cameron says this year's Music Achievement Days — March 10 to 16 — promises to be bigger and better.

"Last year we had about 1,900 students involved and this year we are expecting about 2,100. There will be five bands coming from Redwater, Ardrossan, Landing Trail of Gibbons, Lamont and Namao which will boost 4:30 p.m. and there are no

A core of 10 volunteers will co-ordinate the major event. A marshal and a secretary are mandatory at each concert.

"We are looking for volunteers and grants to pay the adjudicators. We really need one more instrumental adjudicator, too,"

Festival categories include piano, vocal, speech arts, choral and instrumental.

The festival will run at churches and schools between 9 and

evening performances. Firstplace finishers in each category will participate in the final concert on March 16 at 3 p.m. in Win Ferguson School.

Many scholarship winners will be announced on Mar. 16. too. Cameron is excited about the expertise of the four adjudicators who will oversee the hundreds of young musicians.

They are David Hoyt, Janet Scott-Hoyt, Beth Dunbar and Loretta Baker.

Hoyt is currently the resident guest conductor with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra. He began as a principal horn with ESO 21 years ago and per-

formed as a member or soloist with almost every orchestra in Canada. Hoyt is a regular with the ESO.

Scott-Hoyt spent 22 years with the Banff Centre for the Performing Arts and taught at the U of A. A regular performer on CBC radio who maintains her own studio of students.

Dunbar owns and operates her own speech arts and drama studio, played many stage roles, conducts workshops and adjudicates around Alberta.

Baker will adjudicate the choral section and was the supervisor of music for many years with Strathcona County.



Music festival largest ever

Chalk up another success story for the Fort Saskatchewan Music Festival Association. The 1996 Music Achievement Days held March 4-10 saw the largest number of participants since 1992 and several youths were selected to move on to Provincial festivals.

The final concert at Win Ferguson School capped off the week-long event that saw 1,913 youths participate. "It was a very good time for everyone," says Association president Kathleen Faris. "The adjudicators were all pleased with the events and gave some very good compliments."

Dr. Robert deFrece, Janet Scott Hoyt, Dr. Tom Dust and Walter Kaasa were the adjudicators and they recommended Clarice Mah go to the Provincial Festival for piano, Tegan Becker for musical theatre, Jaclyn Cyca for piano and also the Ardrossan Ju-

nior High School band.

"The best performers I've heard here are equal to the best I've heard elsewhere," said Dr. Tust, who adjudicated the band and instrumental performances. "It's not as large as some other festivals, but the standard of performance is very high."

The Provincial festival for solos will go June 7-8 at Alberta College in Edmonton and the choral and band festival is in May in Camrose.

Music Festival organizers are hoping for good turnout

Organizers of the 36th

annual Fort
Saskatchewan Music Festival March 6-10 are expecting a large turnout.

"We had over 1,200 participants last year, and we're hoping to have more this year," says Kathy Faris, president of the Fort Saskatchewan Music Festival Association.

The festival will feature classes for elementary and secondary students in piano, vocal, choral, speech, and instrumental.

Classes will be held between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday to Friday at the United Church, Community Baptist Church, Our Lady of the Angels Church, Fort Saskatchewan Junior High School and Rudolph Hennig School.

All classes are open to the public. Some classes will be held at 7 p.m. Monday evening to give working parents the opportunity to attend.

The festival will wrap up with a public concert at 7 p.m. March 12 at Win Ferguson Community School, featuring the week's best performers.

Festival participants must be currently attending school or taking lessons in Fort Saskatchewan.

This year's adjudicators will be Barbara Mackin, a

pianist and music teacher living in St. Albert (piano); Kim Mattice-Wanat, a soprano singer and voice teacher at the University of Alberta (vocal and choral); Walter Kaasa, a veteran actor of stage, radio and television from Edmonton (speech); and Bill Dimmer (instrumental).

"We are financially supported by local businesses, organizations and individuals," Faris says. "The music festival is truly a community effort."

Last year the festival received \$4,742.21 in donations and \$2,439 from entry fees.

But Faris says the admission fee for the final

concert may have to be increased, because renting the gymnasium at Win Ferguson Community School is no longer free. Last year admission was \$2 per person.

Faris says the music festival is a good opportunity for Fort Saskatchewan students.

"It's really a good way to showcase the talents we have in our community," she says. "It's the only event for all the kids and schools in Fort Saskatchewan."

Faris says about 65 volunteers are involved in the preparation of this year's festival.

"It takes a lot of volunteer hours," she says.
