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Spiritual Advisor's Message

May is the month of Mary and is a good time for us to increase our devotion to her. A good way of doing this is every time we see one of her flowers we say one of Her Marian prayer, such as a Hail Mary, Memorare, Salve Regina etc. There are five flowers closely connected to the Blessed Mother and are often used in art to symbolize different spiritual truths of Our Lady.

Lily--The lily symbolizes purity, innocence and virginity. The Archangel Gabriel is often depicted in scenes of the Annunciation giving the Blessed Mother a lily. Additionally, there is a white day lily that only blooms around the time of the Assumption in mid-August and is known as the "Assumption Lily".

Rose--The Blessed Mother is called the rose without thorns. She has often been given the title of Mystical Rose. The Rosary is sometimes visually represented in art as a garland of roses given to our Heavenly Mother.

Iris--The iris is sometimes called the "sword lily," and for this reason was used most often in connection with Our Lady of Sorrows.

Periwinkle --The periwinkle is also named the "Virgin Flower" and its blue color connects it to Mary, who is usually depicted wearing blue. The color blue has been viewed over the years as a symbol of innocence, the Heavens and also the virtue of hope.

Marigold --The vibrant colors of the marigold represent the Blessed Mother in her heavenly glory. The flower also will turn its head to follow the bright sun, as Mary's gaze is always directed to Her Son.

As we enter into this beautiful month of spring where all the flowers start to bloom and come alive, may our devotion and love to our Blessed Mother come alive as well.

LEGISLATION/RESPECT LIFE

Ever since the overturn of Roe vs Wade, politicians have been trying to introduce legislation to provide abortion for any reason up to birth. On March 29th, the U.S. House of Representatives reintroduced the Womens Health Protection Act. In February, Rep. U.S. Senators Murkowski (Alaska) and Collins (Maine) called for passage of SB 4688. The bill does not have a chance of passing the Republican controlled House, and Republicans will filibuster the bill in the U.S. Senate where Democrats control by a narrow majority.

In PA, HB 803 was referred to the Committee on Health on April 3. It proposes an Amendment to the Constitution of PA providing for personal reproductive liberty. This is only the first step of many to destroy the Abortion Control Act of PA. This is the reason why we must elect pro-life representatives.



The primary election will be held on Tuesday, May 16th. The positions for judge that are open are for Supreme Court (1), Superior Court (2), and Commonwealth Court (1). Refer to the Voters' Guide on the paprolife.org website for more information.

A dangerous bill dealing with assisted suicide has been introduced in the PA House of Representatives. House Bill 543 would overturn PA's long-standing ban on assisted suicide. Please contact your state representative and urge him to oppose the bill.

Also, tell your state representative to continue increased funding for Real Alternatives. This organization provides financial resources to run pregnancy help centers throughout PA. Since the budget provides for Planned Parenthood, it should also share some monies to mothers and their babies.

Please offer daily prayers for all those involved in pro-life and the changing of hearts for those who oppose us. Our future depends on them.

STELLA KULP CHAIR HISPANIC APOSTOLATE/MIGRANT MINISTRY

Stella Kulp was born in New Mexico and moved to Washington, DC, to attend school where her brother was serving in Congress. She met her husband, Russell, and they were married and lived in Washington for a while. They later moved to Perry County and then to Mechanicsburg where she and her family became active members of Saint Joseph's Parish.

In 1988 Bishop Keeler formed a new Parish named in honor of Saint Katharine Drexel, the first Parish in the world named for her. From that time on, Stella shared her selfless gift of time and has continued to do so for the past 35 years at Saint Katharine Drexel Parish and with the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament.

The 2020 Diocesan LORICA AWARD was presented to Stella for her commitment and service to the life of the Church and a Catholic Christian way of life. This award recognizes those who have "bound to their heart" the strength of the Triune God through integrity of faith and generosity of service. The award was named after the renowned prayer for protection attributed to Saint Patrick.

Recently, Cheryl Guy interviewed Father Aaron Lynch, Vicar of Saint Francis Xavier Parish in Gettysburg. Father also serves as the Spiritual Advisor to the Parish CCW.

How long have you been with your current parish?

I have been at St. Francis Xavier parish for 1 ½ years since my ordination in 2021.

How long were you associated with your home parish, St. Patrick's in Carlisle?

My family moved to Carlisle when I was in the 7th grade. My dad was a Marine and we lived in North Carolina when I was born. Our family moved to Missouri, then Oklahoma, back to Missouri, and then to Pennsylvania.

When did you become aware of your vocation? Was your faith formation influenced by your family when you were younger?

I can't trace it to a specific date. It was a gradual process that was not initially intentional. My family was Catholic but we didn't go to Mass every Sunday. I went to public school and I loved going to CCD, doing my catechism homework and learning about the Church. It was when I was preparing for Confirmation that my mother decided that we as a family would become more faithful and when my mom said we were going to do something, we did. When I was in high school, I joined Life Teen and met other young people who were in love with Jesus and His Church. A good friend, Kevin Key (who is now a transitional deacon), encouraged me to attend Quo Vadis days. It wasn't until I was in high school that I had my first sit-down conversations with a priest. As I met seminarians and priests, I became attracted to the religious life and I especially loved the fraternity that exists among brother priests. At the end of my senior year, I petitioned the bishop to be allowed to enter seminary.

What aspect of your parish family inspires you?

There are no fence sitters in Gettysburg – they are a passionate people and I can always find an opinion. It's nice to know that people care and want to get involved. Being put on notice for the things I've done well and the things I have not done well have made me a better priest.

Do you have a favorite saint? Why does their faith journey inspire you?

St. John Chrysotom's name means "golden tongue" and he was a great preacher. I would like to follow that example in my own preaching. I also like John the Beloved because of his

relationship with Jesus and his insight into who Jesus is. That inspires me to grow in my love of Jesus.

Do you have a favorite gospel parable? Why does it speak to you?

I don't really have a favorite parable. I like those moments when Jesus puts the parables aside and speaks plainly. People didn't always understand Him then, but there was great power in those moments.

How can we enhance our devotion to Our Blessed Mother?

Spend more time with her and with her son. A Marian devotion that deserves more attention is the Seven Sorrows of Mary. While Mary didn't suffer physically, she suffered in her heart. She is the model of suffering with Christ.

What role does your parish CCW fill at your parish and how has Council been helpful to you?

The biggest help our PCCW gives to my life is the intercessory prayer offered for me. I can feel when people are praying for me. Intercessory prayer is often underrated and we should never underestimate the power of intercession.

What insights have you gained into the priesthood since your ordination?

I have truly seen the reality of the grace given at Holy Orders. There was a big change in me at ordination. I enjoy seeing the grace of the sacraments, especially confession.
