Please restore our peace and joy through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.



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Why Do We Sing the Psalms? Rev. Ryan Biese

If you are like me, and were not born a Presbyterian or are new to Reformed Worship, you may be wondering, "why do we sing so many psalms at FPFO?"

After all, sometimes the ideas and language of the psalms seem strange to our ears. But the language and ideas of the psalms are not only our spiritual heritage, but also things in which we can find great blessings if we are familiar with them.

Let me give you four reasons why we sing these ancient psalms as well as more modern hymns and songs in our worship.

1. The Command and Example of Scripture: When Jesus and the Twelve (eleven) left the Upper Room they sang a hymn, but not just any hymn: one of the Psalms customary for use at Passover (Pss. 113-118). So when we sing the psalms, we're following His example. But Christianity is not simply "what did Jesus do," because after all there are many things Jesus did that we ought not to do. So we also sing psalms because we are explicitly commanded to do so in such places as Col. 3:16 or Eph. 5:19.

2. The Psalms Illustrate the Gospel: We have no pictures of God or even of the Lord Jesus Christ; in fact, pictures of God are explicitly forbidden by Him. But the psalms provide illustrations of what Christ accomplished.In Psalm 22, for example, there is richly portrayed the extent of Christ's suffering. Or think about Psalm 75,

which we sang last Lord's Day, there is powerfully illustrated for us what we deserve (i.e. the Lord's wrath pictured as a cup of foaming wine), yet we remember how in the Garden the Saviour was willing to drink the cup of wrath down to its very dregs to spare us from it (Mark 14.36 cf. Rev. 14:10, 16:19) so we could drink the cup of blessing (1 Cor. 10:16).

3. The Psalms Remind us of Our History: As Christians we are sons of God by faith in His Covenant promise. The Covenant promise dates back to the days of Abraham, Noah, and Adam: that God would save His people through faith rather than their own works. Every instance of God's salvation and redemption in the Old Testament not only testified to God's faithfulness to His word, but also prepared the people for God's final act of salvation in His Son. So when we sing of the blessing of Israel or of Zion, we're speaking of God's blessings to us, the Israel of God (Gal. 6:16). We're not fixated on a small ethnic group or city in the middle east; when we sing about Zion or Israel, we are rejoicing that the promises of God made to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob have not only come to pass, but that even we have been grafted in and been made partakers in those covenant blessings by grace through faith in Christ (Rom. 11:19) even as we look forward to the Heavenly Zion coming to earth when the dwelling place of God will be with His people forevermore (Rev. 21:3). As we sing the psalms, we remember God's faithfulness in the past and have confidence in His continued mercies to and care for His saints now until His return.

4. Songs for All Seasons: John Calvin called the psalter "an anatomy of all parts of the soul," and indeed it is. The psalter has songs and prayers for every season and situation of life. There are very few hymns written for hard times, times of depression, loneliness, oppression, and sadness. But there are many psalms given by God for us to sing in such occasions. Additionally there are words and ideas in the psalter that make us blush to sing them sometimes and were they not given by inspiration of the Holy Spirit, our cultural context might make us think such words are "sub-Christian." But God has given us the psalter for us to sing those words back to Him even if we may not fully understand His purposes in giving us such songs to sing and prayers to pray.

Presbyterians are part of the Reformed Faith, which is described as such because our forefathers desired to have their religion "re-formed" after the pattern seen in the Scripture rather than merely the traditions of men. Likewise in Reformed Worship, we are continually looking to the Scripture to tell us how to worship God, and what better way to do that than to sing the very hymns (psalms!) He has given to us?
