



• CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

Theme: Jesus raises the dead.

Materials: None, only your imagination

Scripture: John 11: 1-44

Good morning girls and boys. It's so good to see you this morning. I'm really glad you're here today.

Today I want you to imagine with me that we are in a clutch tournament basketball game watching the FM High School team play. Imagine FM has been down by one point the whole game and now, with time running out, our best player has the ball in his hands. As the clock runs down, three...two...one, your favorite player shoots from the baseline and...BOINK! The ball bounces off the rim and time runs out.

Suddenly, however, you realize our player was fouled and will be shooting free throws with no time remaining. But as he moves toward the free throw line the entire crowd begins to spill out of the gymnasium...no one thinks he or she will make the free throws to win the game. And now our player begins to cry. How terrible he must be feeling, huh?

This was the scene for those gathered with Jesus outside Lazarus's tomb. Lazarus had been dead for four days and no one thought he would be coming back. And Jesus, the only one who might have been able to do something, begins to cry.

But guess what? Jesus wasn't crying because Lazarus was dead. He was crying because none of the people believed that Jesus had the power to bring Lazarus back. He was crying because the people were so bound by death that they had lost their faith. So in order to give them a sign that all was not lost and that they should believe, Jesus walked up to the tomb and called for Lazarus to come out.

And when Lazarus appeared everyone realized that Jesus had beaten death with a big, overtime, SWISH! This story is for you to learn to have faith in Jesus as the one who made eternal life with God possible for all of us.

Let's pray... Dearest Jesus, thank you for raising Lazarus from the dead. You really are our lord and our savior. You and God are one and the same. Help us to never forget that. Help us to never lose our faith in you. Amen.

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• SCRIPTURE READING: John 11:1-44

P: Our scripture reading for this day is from the Gospel according to John, the 11th chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

1 Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. ²Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. ³So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." ⁴But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." ⁵Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, ⁶after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. ⁷Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." 8The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" ⁹Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. ¹⁰But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them." ¹¹After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him."¹²The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." ¹³Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. ¹⁴Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. ¹⁵For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." ¹⁶Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

¹⁷When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. ¹⁸Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, ¹⁹and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. ²⁰When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. ²¹Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. ²²But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." ²³Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." ²⁴Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." ²⁵Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, ²⁶and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you

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believe this?" ²⁷She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world." ²⁸When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." ²⁹And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. ³⁰Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. ³¹The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. ³²When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

³³When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. ³⁴He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." ³⁵Jesus began to weep. ³⁶So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" ³⁷But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" ³⁸Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. ³⁹Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." ⁴⁰Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" ⁴¹So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. ⁴²I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." ⁴³When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

• SERMON

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the one who will call

you from the grave, Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior, amen.

I'm sure glad I'm not poor Lazarus! I mean he's the one Jesus loved

according to John's Gospel. If you wonder what the love of Jesus looks like,

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closely read this story and you'll soon see what love means for Jesus. John tells us that though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. If love compelled Jesus to go from the region of the Galilee on the eastern side of the Jordan River to Bethany, then why did Jesus wait an additional 2 days before departing? When I was away from my family during many deployments in my Air Force years I loved and missed them every day I was gone. When at last I was able to return home I got there by the fastest means available. I didn't hang out an additional 2 days to see the sights or play at the casino tables. I'm not saying that's what Jesus did... The Bible gives us no clue what Jesus was up to during those days, but is does say Jesus loved Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. So, what ever he was doing, it must have been extremely important to cause Jesus such a delay.

By the time Jesus arrives, his friend Lazarus has died. He's been dead four days. Now a days, we've all heard stories about people who have died for a few minutes and then been resuscitated. They tell amazing stories of walking into a bright light or being with their long-deceased family members. One book I read even had a young boy who met his great-grandfather who was long dead before he was even born. The man that the boy met in heaven was young, at the peak of life. He even identified him in old pictures of the grandfather when he was a young

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man. Anyway, that's not what we're talking about here with Lazarus. He has been stinking dead for 4 whole days. Nobody comes back from that... When Jesus sees the grief and sorrow of those he loves caused by the death of Lazarus, Jesus himself is moved to tears. At this point I have to ask another one of my off the wall questions, if Jesus was so certain he had the ability and the willingness to raise Lazarus from the grave, why did he cry?

For all his power and might, Jesus never acted as one who was better than anyone else. He humiliated himself to become human. Being human means, among other things, that you feel the full gambit of emotions. Here in this rare insight into the mind of Jesus Christ, we witness his humanity. For Jesus, love means being completely human and undergoing every human emotion, even sorrow and grief. If we didn't have this story we would be missing a piece of who Jesus was and is. Jesus still feels our loss and our pain.

All the commentaries point out this raising of Lazarus foreshadows the empty tomb of Jesus himself. I agree to a point. Lazarus wasn't really resurrected. He was merely resuscitated. When we're resurrected it will be to eternal life. Poor Lazarus, after having already gone through death once, would now have to go through it again. Yes, he had to die not once, but twice... When Jesus was resurrected, he was resurrected to eternal life, never to face death again. That's the

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resurrection we're promised. Not some halfway measure where death still stalks us like a thief in the night. The promise we have in Christ Jesus is that we will be raised in a resurrection like his, not like this resuscitation like poor old Lazarus. If that's all we have to look forward to it would be a sad state of affairs for us Christians. Death would still hold the last word. Jesus would only be seen as postponing the inevitable.

I think that's the way most of us pray. We ask God, through Jesus, to heal our illnesses. We ask for the cancer to be gone or the heart to beat in rhythm. We ask for more time with the ones we love. Ultimately, those requests are asking for our Lazarus to be let out of the tomb, only to face death another day. Is that all we want in our savior? Not me! As the Rock Band Queen would sing I want it all! I don't want half a healing, I want it all. I don't want just my hardship to be lessened I want my death to be no more. I want eternal life with all the ones I love and with my loving God and my Lord Jesus Christ. I don't want to just be brought back to this same old stinking death enslaved world. I want to be truly free from death and to be raised up to a new life with no more tears and no more pain. I want a new life where the devil and all his empty promises have been not only debunked, but proven to be lies. I want it all, Jesus. So, if that means you have to stay away for two more days while you pray and gather your plans and finally

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decide this is the hour for your glory, then I'm ok with waiting for you to come on your time and on your terms. I trust you, O Lord, because I've seen your love in action and I trust in your faithful love.

One final note regarding the extra two days Jesus stayed across the Jordan before returning to Bethany and his now dead friend Lazarus. John tells us poor Lazarus was already 4 days dead when Jesus arrived. Even if Jesus had dropped everything he was doing and immediately left for Bethany, Lazarus would have met the same fate. Instead of being dead for 4 days, he would have only been gone for 2 days. So, let's not make too much out of the fact that Jesus was delayed before coming to the aid of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus... Personally, I believe the delay was a detail John may have added to emphasize that Mary, Martha, and the crowd of Jews were able to see the glory of God when Jesus raised him from the dead. If Jesus had arrived before Lazarus died then the significance of the miracle would have been reduced to a mere healing of a sick friend. As the story is in its current form the raising of Lazarus from the dead serves to not only prove the power of Jesus as God's Son, but also this miracle, for John, serves as the catalyst for Jesus' own death and resurrection.

So far I've given you a lot to meditate on. This story is so rich and full of metaphor and hidden mystery that I've barely scratched the surface. Yet, every

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time I read this story I'm confronted with the question did this really happen? Did this really go down the way John tells the story. Most scholars I've read say there's more evidence that this story is just made up by John. They point to the fact that there are no references to this Lazarus or his being raised from the dead anywhere else in the Bible. They also point to the parable Jesus told in Luke's Gospel where the poor man named Lazarus lived at the gate of the rich man and when both men died the rich man went to a place of torment, while Lazarus went to heaven to be with Father Abraham. These scholars make the point of all the parables Jesus told in all the Gospels, Lazarus is the only character with a name. They then make the leap that John's Lazarus may be his way of giving a historical account of one who was raised from the dead as the rich man begged Father Abraham to do. As for me, when I think about this story and the question of did it happen, or could it have happened, it always comes down to faith. For some people, even for those who are eyewitnesses to miraculous events, it's simply impossible to accept that the supernatural can sometimes overlap with the rational or natural world. For them, it's always an issue of reason over faith. Yet, for many of us, the experiences of our lives have led us to know there are certain times when the veil between the natural world and the supernatural world is thin and porous. For religious people, this mystery, is seen as God acting in the world for

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the sake of love. There is no way to prove the facts of this story. It's one that must be taken on faith and either believed or rejected. The real question that defines our faith is this: do we believe God, acting through Jesus of Nazareth, has power over life and death? I already know my answer, how about you? This is the central question posed by John all through out his Gospel. Jesus himself gives us the answer when he says to Mary, "I AM the resurrection and the life."

All this is interesting and makes great fodder for meditation, but what relevance does this raising of Lazarus have for us and for our world. First, it draws many people into the great question for faith. I think that's the main point of the story. By raising Lazarus and then later when Jesus is raised from the dead, he is proving that death no longer gets the last word. Death no longer separates people from God. God has now demonstrated, through Jesus that as Saint Paul says, nothing, not even death can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ!

May this story of Jesus raising Lazarus bring you, like it has brought so many others to saving faith. May your trust be in the God incarnate who broke the bonds of death and opened the graves of all believers. May your faith in Jesus be that rock to which you cling when all the world seems to be falling apart around you. Yes, Jesus has the power over life and death. Yes Jesus has shown us God in action in the physical world. Yes Jesus is God acting for you so that you might

have faith in the one who loves you. Yes Jesus, I, like Mary and Martha and the

crowd of mourners with them believe you are my savior and my God. Amen.

The Nicene Creed is said on all festivals and on Sundays in the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. The Apostles' Creed is said at other times. The Creed is omitted here if the service of Holy Baptism or another rite with a creed is used.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen
