PASTOR'S CORNER

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." – John 13:34

The second part of our mission as a church is fairly straightforward: **care** for one another. This may be the one we consider the most attractive, the most innate, and the most tangible. It can also be the one that we most appreciate, both as recipients of love from one another and as givers of love to one another. Indeed, in our recent church survey, the overwhelming thing that we liked about our church was the sweet fellowship, the mutual care, the spirit of togetherness. We *like* to care for one another.

This is a good thing. As you can tell from Jesus' command above, showing the sort of love to one another he showed to his disciples is central to what he taught, lived, and established. This is reinforced throughout the Gospels (where he elaborates on it many times) and in the records of the early church. Paul spoke of it, Peter spoke of it, John spoke of it, James spoke of it. Loving one another is one of the pillars of Christian faith.

But that doesn't always make it easy!

Love, you see, is – by definition – sacrificial. It means treating someone else the way you wish to be treated, caring for their needs even if it costs you something, seeking the good of others as a priority, and learning to care for people and love people who may not be terribly loveable at the moment. And that can be hard! The command to love transcends all sorts of differences in life, as Jesus exhibited in his tale of the Good Samaritan (the neighbor was the one society would have said to hate and revile), and as he demonstrated in his chosen family (his disciples included Simon the Zealot, a group known to hate those who cooperated with the Roman Empire, and Matthew the tax collector, who cooperated with the Roman Empire in very visible ways). We find Jesus showing incredible compassion to Jews and Gentiles, Pharisees and prostitutes, men and women, friends and enemies. He cared for anyone who was put in his path and went out of his way to show that love in powerful ways.

At Grace Hills, we seek to embody that same sort of love, as commanded by our Lord and Savior. To quote Paul, we strive to foster a love here that is patient and kind; that doesn't envy and doesn't boast and is not proud; that does not dishonor others, is not self-seeking, and is not easily angered; that keeps no record of wrongs and does not rejoice in evil but rejoices in the truth. The love we strive for always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. (1 Cor. 13:4-7)

We don't always achieve that sort of love, mind you – but we aspire to it and take conscious steps to hold that love and show that love for one another. And as we **care** for one another, we reveal an important piece of our faithfulness to the call of Christ and our mission as a church.
