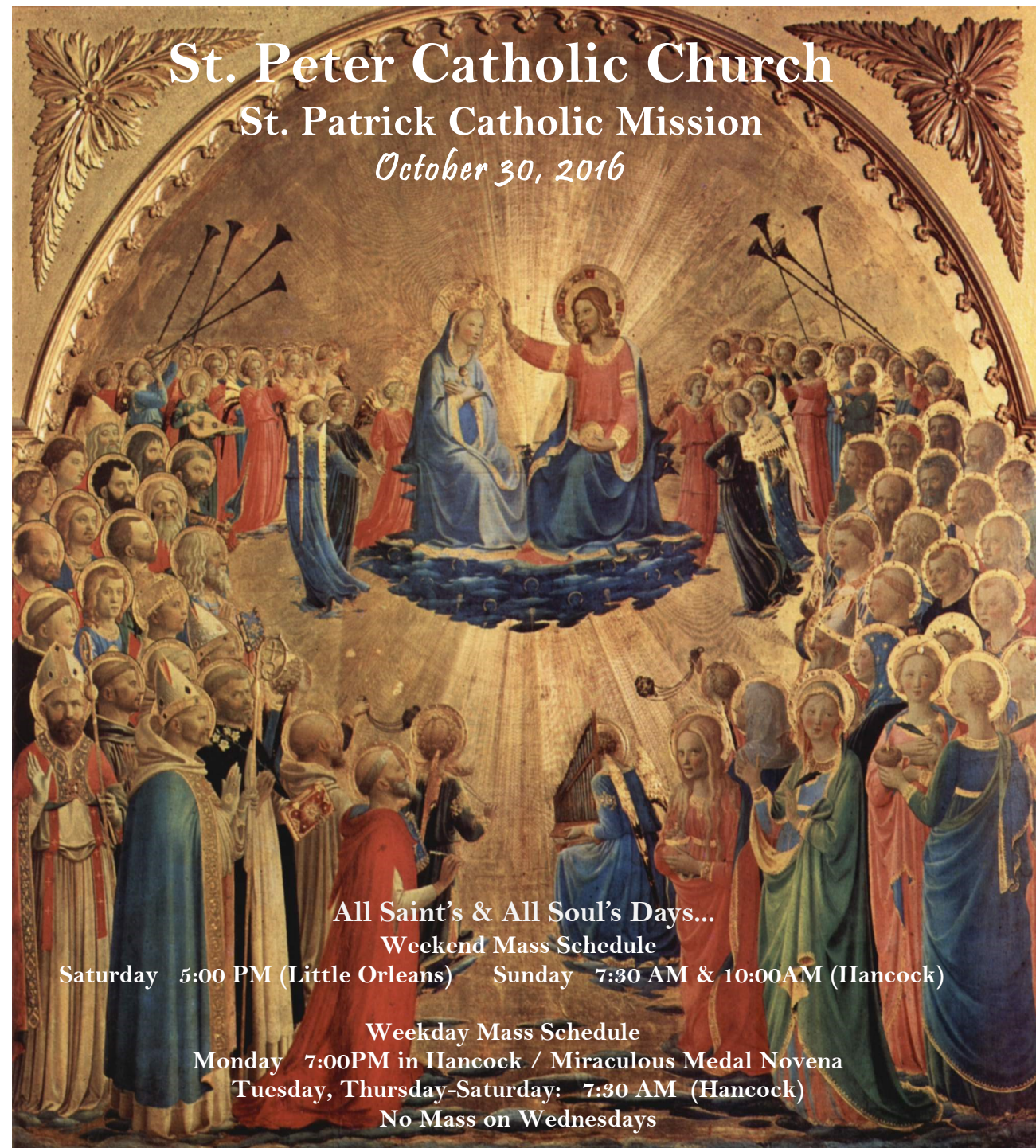

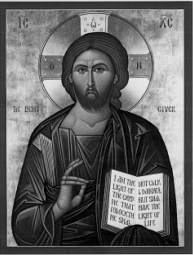

Spirit Reflection: Yesterday I interviewed Bob and Eun Yea Williams. They walked 500 miles in Spain for the Lord. This Summer they (about age 70) walked 100 miles to Ocean City for religious freedom. In her childhood Eun Yea walked across northern Korea to flee communism. Bob and Eun Yea met there and immigrated here, to WV. At dinner I watched them hold hands, after almost 50 years of marriage! And last week they cheerfully walked and helped us in the Hancock-Halloween parade. We need more witnesses like them: be the one!

The Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time- Reflections

The contrast between the reaction that Jesus and the crowd had to the comic figure of Zacchaeus points out the difference between the way God sees things and the way we humans see them.

If the story of Zacchaeus were not in the Bible, we could almost imagine that it had been written by a comedy writer rather than Luke. Perhaps Luke intended it to be a funny story. He did insert lots of comic clues. Luke tells us that Zacchaeus was “a wealthy man”. In his day, the only sure sign of wealth was being overweight. Being thin meant that you did not have enough to eat. Having lots of muscles meant that you did hard physical labor. Being fat meant that you had other people to do things for you. Luke says that Zacchaeus was “short in stature.”

He must have had to hike up his expensive clothes and run ahead on short little legs in order to see Jesus. Did Zacchaeus have to jump over and over again to reach a bottom limb or did he find something in just the right place to give him a leg up? Just when it seemed he could not get any more desperate or the situation any more comical, Luke has this overweight, richly dressed, short man climb a tree to see Jesus and quickly get surrounded by a crowd. Imagine how all these people must have laughed and teased him when Jesus called his name and they spotted Zacchaeus in the tree. But as always, Jesus turned things around.

Zacchaeus may have looked comical as well as be a figure of contempt but Jesus did not see him the way the crowd saw him. For Jesus, Zacchaeus was a child of Abraham, a member of his own people, and thus worth of respect and dignity.

All too often we base our opinions of others on superficial appearances.

All too often we find it easier to condemn others for their actions, rather than to seek to understand their circumstances or motivations.

All too often we forget that Jesus sees everything we do—the good and bad—and still respects and loves us. In the end, Zacchaeus promised Jesus to give half his wealth to the poor. Are we ready to let others make amends for the things they have done? Are we ready to offer others the care and concern and the love that Jesus gives to us? ~*Deacon James Mason*

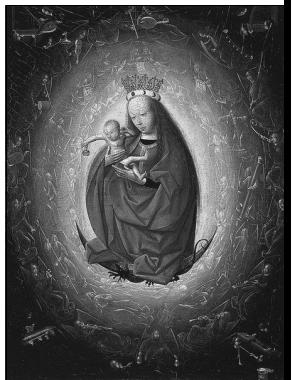
