

NOTES FROM FR. VANDEWALLE

Sunday Readings – **In** the First Reading, Samuel is taught to be open to the voice of the Lord. We ask for the grace to practice listening in prayer daily. In the Gospel, John the Baptist points the apostles to where the answer is found, Jesus: "Behold the Lamb of God." That's where the answers are! The Disciples will follow Jesus because they have been in the practice of being open to God previously.

9 Days Life Novena – The Life Novena goes from January 21st thru January 29th. On the USCCB website each day's intention is accompanied by a short reflection and suggested actions to help build a culture of life. The National March for Life in Washington D.C. this year is January 29th.

Day of Prayer for Right to Life - In the Catholic Church in the United States, January 22nd (the anniversary of Roe v. Wade) is designated as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children." As Catholics, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting, and/or giving alms. In addition, Governor Pete Ricketts issued a proclamation declaring January 22nd a Statewide Day of Prayer to end abortion. He wrote "Nebraskans display our pro-life values in a multitude of ways from the crisis pregnancy centers that provide free care for expecting parents to the prayer vigils held across the state every year." How wonderful that we have a Pro-Life governor!

Unordinary Time – Though we are back into Ordinary time in the Church calendar, these times seem anything but ordinary. There are so many things uncertain and evil powers seem to be having such a strong influence. Remember Jesus' words: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." (Jn. 16:33) Or again "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:5). Though the attacks of evil do not "play by the rules", truth and goodness will win out. Hopefully what is going on around us will motivate us to be diligent in the things that we know are from God, living for and standing up for those things (sometimes publicly) that we know are Good and True: Faith, Life, Family, Marriage, Supernatural Charity toward all, etc. In addition, this Year of St. Joseph is timely. Joseph is that just man chosen by the Father to be foster father to Jesus and Patron of the Universal Church. Joseph was holy and strong. Joseph is a holy spouse and holy father. He is called "Guardian of the Redeemer" and "Terror of Demons." Let us ask St. Joseph's particular guidance and help to be strong against evil and to guide us in this unordinary time to the Goodness of God.

By way of explanation, some are wondering about the current mass guidelines. There are varying opinions on whether they are helpful or not. However, unless they are immoral, I am supposed to be obedient to diocesan guidelines. We pray that they may soon not be necessary. Currently the guidelines are: (1) Every other pew is to be blocked off in order to help facilitate the 6 feet social distancing requirement. (2) Encourage people to wear masks. (3) Priests and acolytes are to wear masks when distributing Holy Communion. (4) There should be no congregational singing. Parishes may provide organ or other instrumental music. They may have a single cantor sing. (5) Missallettes and hymnals should not be provided for common use but may be provided for single use. (6) Continue to clean and disinfect church pews, doors, bathrooms, etc. between Masses.
