Year 12 Written **Expression Marking**

As a recent participant in the Year 12 Written

Expression Marking in Port
Moresby last term, I learned many
new and interesting things. As
importantly, I had a lot of fun
throughout the marking process.
The training focus was on the 2
main areas of the exam paper:
Argumentative and Creative
Writing.

In addressing Argumentative Writing, the Chief Examiner and Marker Ms Helen H. Vetunawa emphasised that English teachers need to prepare students to understand what the essay question is asking of them. They need to teach the students the skills of writing good argumentative essays. This involves the narrowing down of the question statement, organising counter arguments and demonstrating a clear position they must take for or against the topic in the question.

Creative Writing on the other hand requires the teacher to make the effort to know each student well and to connect with their personal situations in a professional manner. We were reminded that students write about their reality which is often about very painful family situations. Through the marking of the Creative Writing pieces, we gained an appreciation of how the students are in our hands during the school day, to care for and to support them. Teachers were encouraged to develop the skills of creative writing especially from Year 9 upwards: using descriptive and narrative forms of writing, using adjectives and figures of speech like similes, metaphors, alliteration and sentence variation, in order to capture the reader's attention.

The take home message from the training prior to the actual marking experience was that we

are living in an English-speaking world therefore teachers of English have to impart new knowledge and skills to their students every day. It is because of skilled teachers that students are writing better English in their workplace every day.

The Acting Secretary for the Measurement Service Division informed us that previous exam papers would be uploaded online for mock exams and for revision of exam skills. The new STEM curriculum for Years 11 and 12 will be implemented in schools in 2021 and effective in 2022.

I thank the Leadership Team for the opportunity to participate in this invaluable training and marking experience. I look forward to sharing the insights I gained, in my daily classroom teaching and as importantly with my peers in the English Department under the guidance of Mrs Burain, senior teacher of English.

WEEK REFLECTION.

READING FOR THE WEEK: Mathew 21: 28-32

Message: Conversion is a process. It is an ongoing journey that will end only at death.

Here we need to keep in mind that all of us are still journeying toward full conversion. Some of us are struggling to make transition from being an ordinary Christian to being a good one. Others are struggling to move up from being a good Christian to being an excellent one. And still others are trying to change from being an excellent Christian to being a model one.

Jesus makes it clear that tax collectors and prostitutes were on the path to holiness whereas these religious leaders were not. This would have been hard for them to accept.

In which category do you find yourself? Sometimes, those who are considered "religious" or "pious" struggle with a similar pride and judging others as the chief priests and elders of Jesus' time. This is a dangerous sin because it leads a person into much stubbornness. It is for this reason that Jesus was so direct and so harsh. He was attempting to break them free from their stubbornness and prideful ways. The most important lesson we can take from this passage is to seek the humility, openness and genuineness of the tax collectors and prostitutes. They were praised by our Lord because they could see and accept the honest truth. Sure, they were sinners, but God can forgive sin when we are aware of our sin. If we are not willing to see our sin, then it's impossible for God's grace to enter in and heal.
