Preschool: We have slid right back into our routine! Last week we talked about shapes and we learned how to draw a square and a rectangle. When watching your child draw these, please, encourage them to pick up their pencil before making a new line. I noticed that some of the students made the shape with one motion so the square becomes more of a circle. We need a good straight edge to make rectangles and squares. We will talk about winter weather this week and do some fun things with snow! We will also learn about the letter "s". Have a great week! - Miss Stacie

Kind: Wow! What a great week we had last week! My students came in Monday morning ready to work and continued to work hard throughout the week! I can definitely see progress. This week we will be learning words that end with -it and -in. We will also be reading the book "Snowmen at Night". Our spelling words for this week should have been sent home in your child's folder on Friday. Please, review these at home. I am very proud to say that every student got all of their words right last week. Let's keep this up! Don't forget parent teacher conferences this week. I will be calling at the scheduled time I discussed with each family.

1st/2nd: First and second grade will continue their unit on penguins this week. We have been working on our reading skills through the unit as well as some science and math skills too. Second grade has also been working more on recognizing the states that border Missouri. We will be adding to that this week along with discussing Washington, DC and a couple other places. Both grades are working on the scientific method with an apple seed experiment. Please continue working with your students in their math facts as they will be learning more each week. First grade will be working harder on our sight words this week as well. Remember to dress warmly, because we are going outside for recess, if the weather allows. I hope everyone has a great week. - Mrs. Hird

3rd/4th: With our first full week back under our belts, our class continues to move forward. This week, we have several types of testing outside the classroom. We will have MAP practice testing and Dibels testing. We will have our regular spelling test on Friday. Fourth grade will have a math test on Wednesday. On Friday, our class will have a test over the states that border Missouri. They will have to identify the location on a map and be able to name each state with the correct spelling. Fourth grade will also have a quiz this week over prime numbers. We have a lot going on this week, so if you should have any questions, please don't hesitate to

5th/6th: In Writing, 5th and 6th graders will finish their Diamond poems this week and will review simile, metaphor, and personification. In Science, 5th graders will be reading about the "Water Cycle" and 6th grade will quiz over "Properties of Waves" on Wed. In English, both grades will be learning how to use quotation marks to punctuate the speaking parts of a sentence. In Reading, students will present roles over Ch. 1-4 in our Lit. Circle book "From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler". In Social Studies, 5th graders will be reading about the "Gold Rush" and later the "Industrial Revolution". 5th grade will have a label Canada test on Thursday. 6th graders are reading about famous explorers and will have an "Important Dates in History" test on Friday. **7/8 Comm. Arts:** Students will be reading Ch. 3 & 4 of "The Outsiders" this week and will still be looking at different literary devices used in the book as well as comparing the music of the "Greasers" versus the "Socs". - Mrs. Foster

5th-8th Math: Fifth grade is working on place value and division of bigger numbers and measures of various polygons. Sixth grade is working on different situations in which you can recognize when to reduce before multiplying fractions and reviewing how to treat decimals in the various operations. Seventh grade is working on various rate and ratio problems and scientific notation of large and small numbers. Students in Pre-Algebra are working on more involved equations and surface areas and volumes of shapes with circular bases. In algebra, students are working on characteristics of various mathematical sets, graphing of linear equations, and problems involving various geometric solids. **Tests This Week: Algebra: Tuesday, 7th Math: Wednesday**

7th-8th: In grammar, we will soon be moving to a new unit involving rules regarding pronouns. In science, seventh grade will be continuing with their unit on stars and eighth grade will be continuing their unit on cells. In social studies, seventh grade will be comparing the economic and cultural aspects of various regions after the Middle Ages. Eighth grade will continue to look at the pivotal events of the first half of the 19th century. **Tests This Week: 7th and 8th Science: Tuesday**
