
Father of goodness of love,

The Lent Cross

The Lent Cross During the Sundays during Lent, St James Church usually focus on the Lent Cross. The Cross is placed at the front of Church and each Sunday a different item is placed at the foot of the cross. These symbols represent different aspects of the path which Jesus took to the cross and the things which he suffered. We are not expecting to be worshipping in Church during the whole of Lent this year. We will still be using the Lent Cross - placing it inside the Church porch and adding a new item each week. Ash Wednesday 17th February is the start of Lent when Christians focus on confessing our sins to God and receiving his forgiveness.

From the first Sunday in Lent -21st February - we will be putting a new item by the cross each week. Please feel free to return each week and see the new symbols we are adding. On Easter Day we will be replacing the symbols with flowers, representing the joy of the resurrection - when Jesus rose from the dead. You will find the information about the symbols further along our Church railings.

New Moderator of URC's Mersey Synod

We're delighted to announce that the Revd. Geoffrey Felton has been nominated as our new Moderator of the United Reformed Church (URC) Mersey Synod.

Geoff was born and raised in Higher Bebington on the Wirral where he spent his teenage years before moving away to study. He became a Christian in 1984 at Anfield during Mission England, led by late American evangelist Dr Billy Graham.

Having passed his Geology degree at Portsmouth Polytechnic, now the University of Portsmouth, Geoff worked for six years in the North Sea on various offshore installations as a geologist. At St George's URC in Hemel Hempstead, Geoff began to explore his call to ministry by attending the London Bible College and Westminster College in Cambridge.

Geoff was ordained in 2000 and inducted into the Canterbury pastorate in the URC's Southern Synod, which he served for ten years. He then moved to Plume Avenue URC, his current pastorate, in 2010.

Geoff is excited about returning home to the north west and serving the people of Mersey Synod with compassion and vigour. He said, 'We live in difficult days, but we have a God who through Jesus Christ is victorious. I'm looking forward to leading the Synod through these post pandemic years – years that will help shape the Church of the future and its witness to a world in need of hope and love."

The nomination will be presented to URC national Mission Council in March and Geoff will hopefully start with us sometime in July.

We look forward to welcoming Geoff, his wife and their family into Mersey and to working with Geoff in the near future.





Property and Special Projects committee update.

We thought that a short report to you all on the daily 'happenings' in our buildings would keep you updated on life which still continues here at St. James.

Although we are once again plunged into a lockdown and our church building is closed maintenance and emergency works continue. Several of you, will remember with a shiver that our church boiler ceased to work for our last two morning services. It seems that these essential machines always do fail at the most inconvenient times! It just being prior to the Christmas break parts were not immediately available and engineers were either finished for the holiday break or in isolation mode because of Covid 19. However, we now have a repaired boiler – several new parts were required – at a cost of £850 but at least the building is now warm and ready to welcome you back.

Two small windows in an office in the hall were found to be in a state of bad repair following an ingress of water and have had to be replaced. During installation of these two windows and essential gutter cleaning and replacement of a high hopper to the side of the hall further rotting frames were found to the staircase window and large window to the small hall. Fortunately, our wonderful maintenance go to man was able to repair these and has worked through all this appalling weather to make them watertight and hopefully in good repair for some years yet.

There has been a number of damp areas appear in the main hall which have needed immediate attention for safety reasons. We have a water leak from the tower on the roof. This week end it was found that the two flat roofs to the new sports hall storage extension are leaking badly, in one place causing the fire alarm to activate due to water ingress into the unit and will need urgent attention. So, you see that there is never a dull (or wet) moment!

There is a constant need to maintain securely and safely both our wonderful buildings but this maintenance comes at a cost and as we have virtually no rental income from the hall due to groups being unable to meet this is a worrying time.

Which leads me to our **Special Projects Group** which plans to meet, via Zoom, on Thursday 25th February at 7.45 p.m. if anyone would like to attend that meeting, it is an open one, please contact me beforehand. wdoig45@gmail.com or 07867795179) OR if anyone has ANY ideas whatsoever as to how we can do some very much needed but fun fund raising during these very restricted times please do contact me.
