Morning of Service – Saturday, November 3, 2018 "Serve Christ and the Community with mercy, compassion and humility"

Planning is underway for our third annual Morning of Service on November 3. All ages and abilities are welcome. Last year almost Immaculate Conception parishioners participated, including young families with toddlers, elementary, high school and college youth, millennials, families, seniors, and clergy. Over 800 hours of community service were provided by the people of Immaculate Conception. Your feedback to us indicated that serving as Christ's hands and feet in our community was a joyous, compassionate and humble experience for you.

This year's format will be similar. There will be a variety of service opportunities at local agencies and in the parish center. You can volunteer for 2-3 hours at one of the many offsite locations or you can volunteer for a 90-minute session at one of the on-site projects located in the parish center. Each service project will have a team leader who will be your contact person and coordinator.

The morning begins about 8:30 a.m. with registration in the church, a group picture, and a prayerful sendoff from Fr. Jerry. Then we drive or walk to our service locations, depending on which project you selected. After the conclusion of your service, you are invited for a light lunch, in the parish center hall starting at 12:30pm for some fellowship and sharing of your experiences.

Project selections are being made taking careful consideration of Christian service through the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy and the Beatitudes. The off-site locations being scheduled are: the City Mission, Glendale, Baptist and Heritage Homes, Habitat for Humanity, Jack's Place, Joan Nicole Prince Home, Things of My Very Own, Town of Glenville, Regional Food Bank and the YWCA. The recipients for on-site projects scheduled to date are: Bethesda House, the military, Jack's Place, Saratoga County Animal Shelter, Habitat for Humanity, Northeast Parent and Child, and Booth Home. We encourage you, if you are physically able, to consider selecting an off-site project.

By mid-August, more information will be available about all the projects in your personal emails, the weekly bulletins, the parish web site, Facebook and the parish App.

On-line signups are scheduled to begin the weekend of the parish picnic, September 8-9 and run through mid-October or until projects reach capacity. Most parishioners will receive an email invitation from *Sign Up Genius* with a link to the sign up site. That link will also be available through the parish web site. Members of the planning committee will be on hand at the picnic to provide information and to assist you.


St. Vincent de Paul Society Assists the Poor and Less Fortunate

The St. Vincent DePaul Society volunteers continue to assist the poor and less fortunate members of our community without regard to religious beliefs. This charitable response to those in need is made possible by contributions made to the poor boxes at the doors of the church, direct monetary gifts from parishioners and parish ministries and generous food donations. The Society is also graciously supported by Father Jerry and the wonderful rectory staff who handle telephone and walk-in requests for assistance.

The Society strives to respond, in a timely manner, to all requests for help, especially those involving children. For monetary requests for rent and utility bills which are greater than the Society's resources can handle, other charitable organizations team up to meet the need.

On average, 20 to 25 requests for assistance are received each month. For Thanksgiving and Christmas, more than 100 families are given food baskets and Christmas gifts. This is accomplished with the help of additional volunteers and the youth organizations of our cluster parishes.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) Schedules Meet and Greet Session By Kim Klementowski

RCIA helps guide seekers along their faith journey, teach them about our Catholic faith and assist them in receiving the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation) enabling them to be full members of our Catholic faith and our wonderful parish.

This past Easter, 4 amazing men and women were brought into full communion with our Catholic faith. Leanna Guerra, Mark Delnick and Jeffery O'Rourke each received the sacraments of Confirmation and First Eucharist, and Jennifer Jada received the sacrament of Confirmation. All 4 have been warmly welcomed into our parish, thanks to all of you.

Many of you may not know what RCIA is exactly, and I'm sure many of you know someone (family member, friend, spouse, co-worker, etc) who may be interested and may benefit by the process. RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. It's not a program, it's a process. A program has a definite start RCIA is an on-going faith and a definite end. journey intended to assist adults who are seeking full communion with the Catholic Church through the sacraments of Initiation which are Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation. There isn't any age limit. So if you've never been baptized or if you were baptized in another Christian Faith, this process is for you. If you were baptized Catholic but have never received the sacraments of First Eucharist or Confirmation, this process is for you as well. If you have been baptized Catholic and received the sacrament of First Eucharist but have not received Confirmation, there is a separate process for you as well. If you've received all of your

sacraments but have been away from the Catholic Church for a number of years, we can help you too. I can go on and on about the RCIA process here at Immaculate Conception, but let's hear from the people who recently went thru it.....

after attending Sunday masses for a few years, I began to question my faith.

I had very limited knowledge of my
Christian faith and many questions came up about the Catholic Church.

The RCIA process provided an in-

depth introduction into the Catholic Faith. Each session was an open conversation and all questions were encouraged in every class. 

When my family moved to Glenville in 1970, one of the first people to welcome us to The Church of the Immaculate Conception was Carmel Lavergne. It is with great pleasure that I write about this wonderful parish member.

Dutch Apple Pie Cookies—A Tag Sale Favorite

This recipe for Dutch Apple Pie Cookies was requested several times from people at our Tag Sale. They were delicious and the Rosary Society hopes everyone that wanted this recipe will make and enjoy the

Ingredients

1 roll of refrigerated pie dough

5 small Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and finely diced

1/4 cup granulated sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon cornstarch

For the streusel topping:

2 1/4 cups all purpose flour

2/3 cups brown sugar

2/3 cups granulated sugar

2/3 cups old fashioned oats

Pinch of salt

3/4 cups plus 2 tablespoons (14 tablespoons total) butter, melted

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray the wells of a standard-size muffin tin with nonstick spray. Roll out dough onto lightly floured surface and cut circles, about 2" in diameter. Re-roll unused dough. Place a circle in the bottom of each muffin well.
- 2. Cook the apples, sugar, cinnamon, lemon juice and cornstarch on medium heat, stirring occasionally, for about 5-10 minutes until the apples have softened slightly and the juices have begun to thicken.
- 3. Add about 1 tablespoon of the apple filling on top of each circle of pie dough.
- 4. Mix flour, brown sugar, granulated sugar, oats and salt. Add melted butter and mix until well incorporated.
- 5. Add a heaping tablespoon of the streusel topping to each muffin and gently pat it down over the apples.
- 6. Bake for 17-19 minutes. **Allow the apple pie cookies to cool in the muffin tin for at least 10-15 minutes before removing. A dull knife will help to remove them from the tin. Cool on a wire rack.
- 7. Makes 2 1/2 dozen
