We provide food and financial assistance to pay outstanding bills. Over the past quarter we helped over 40 clients. During the next quarter we will be busy preparing for the distribution of food baskets for Thanksgiving and Christmas. At Christmas time we will also provide gifts for the needy.

Bethlehem Tree Project 2019



The Bethlehem Tree project originated from the 'Church Renew' project, which took place in the 1980's. This means our parish has sponsored this project for more than 30 years, and it continues to be successful year after year due to the generosity of our parishioners.

In 2018, we were able to provide approximately 1200 gifts, and had very few request cards left on the trees. We also had monetary gifts from a number of parishioners and the Knights of Columbus, which were used to purchase gifts for those remaining requests.

This year the Bethlehem tree project begins the weekend of November 16th and 17th, and presents are due in the Flicker room by noon on December 8. Please deliver your gifts by this date as we can't guarantee that late gifts will reach their recipients. It is an early schedule for a holiday project, as requested by recipient organizations. They need time to sort through the presents, purchase omitted gifts (some cards get lost, people forget to purchase some gifts etc.) and finally distribute the gifts to the clients.

****Please note: there are many gifts which are labeled "Do Not Wrap!" Please do not wrap, box, or bag any gifts with this label. It will help make the job of sorting the gifts easier and more efficient. These unwrapped gifts are used as supplies for the recipient organization throughout the Christmas season and the year.

October is Pro-Life month so it is fitting to discuss the Reproductive Health Act enacted this year in New York State that legalizes abortion up till birth. Around that dark cloud we may see some rays of hope. Recent main stream movies "Gosnell" about at-birth abortionist Kermit Gosnell, and "Unplanned" about Abby Johnson, director of a Planned Parenthood abortion facility who had an abortion and witnessed another, then finally converted, wildly exceeded expectations and got people talking. More people are becoming aware of and indignant to this attack on innocent human life. We know this because the 40 Days for Life campaign this past spring in Schenectady saw increased participation by people who specifically said they were repulsed by the Reproductive Health Act and wanted to do something about it. If you are so moved, the fall 40 Days for Life campaign of prayer and fasting, constant vigil, and public outreach to stop abortion is happening now through November 3 in Schenectady and in more than 800 cities in over 50 countries around the world.

Visit https://40daysforlife.com/schenectady to get involved and make a difference here locally, where you can. You can help add to the success of 40 Days for Life: 16,004 lives saved, 191 abortion workers quit their jobs (Abby Johnson is one of these and she joined 40 Days for Life), and 104 abortion centers closed, so far.

Blessed Cardinal John Henry Newman To Be Canonized This Weekend

On October 13, Blessesd Cardinal John Henry Newman (1801-1890) will be canonized in Rome. Originally an Anglican priest, he converted to Catholicism in 1845 and was ordained a Catholic priest in 1847. He was a scholar, a theologian, a philosopher, and a poet.

Dedicated to education, he founded two schools for boys. Three years after he died, a Newman Club for Catholic students began at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. Now his name is linked to ministry centers at many public and private colleges and universities in the United States.
