ELA 6

Over the last few weeks, students have been working on our class novel study, The Wizard of Oz. From exploring new vocabulary, and diving deeper into character analysis and literary elements, students have demonstrated creative and innovative ways to represent and demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of literature!



MATH 6

In the last few months, students have explored financial literacy and percentages, and now have begun to explore algebra and linear relations. Through a marketplace project, students demonstrated their flexibility with decimals and percentages, as well as budgeting and taxation. From playing ordered pairs Battleship, to plotting points to create pictures on Cartesian planes, students have begun to demonstrate their understanding of algebraic and linear relationships!



LEARNER PROFILE

As part of the IB curriculum, students are encouraged to exemplify ten characteristics, known as Learner Profiles. These are traits that are considered the blueprint of a successful IB student. Each month, we will select a learner profile trait as our focus. The month of January was 'Open-minded' and students demonstrated these skills through exploring new parts of the community, celebrating the Lunar New Year, learning about Indigenous culture and history, and discovering ancient civilizations. The month of February was 'Communicators' and students demonstrated these skills through organizing and planning Valentine's day activities and treats, sharing their Wonder Work presentations, collaborating on Social Justice posters, and using post-it notes to dish out compliments to their peers! We continue to be amazed by how much our students are learning and growing. We can't wait to see what the next months hold in store for us!

French 6

In French, students created a short children's story around the theme of winter. Through expressive vocabulary, such as adjectives and past tense, students were able to demonstrate their understandina of storytelling and makina connections. For the month of February, students have been learning all about Festival du Voyageur and the Métis. Through exploring Indigenous culture and traditions, students have acquired the knowledge and skills to put on a Mini-Festival of their own!





French 7/8

In French, students have been working on making connections between social justice issues in their target language. Through reading exercises, students have acquired new knowledge and understanding of social justice movements such as feminism, racism, climate change, and LGBTQIA+ rights. Using new verbs «pouvoir», «savoir», and «vouloir», students have worked to learn more about these issues, make real-world connections, and dive deeper into activism and allyship. Currently, they are working on creating a series of informational posters in their target language, all about an intersectional topic in social justice.

Science 6

Our Science 6 students have been exploring plate tectonics and learning about the movement of the Earth's crust. They have been investigating the causes and effects of earthquakes, volcanoes, and other geologic events. Through their inquiry, they have been developing their scientific skills, including observation, data collection, and analysis.



SCIENCE 7

Our Science 7 students have been working on a research project on keystone species. They have been studying the critical roles that certain species play in their ecosystems and how the loss of those species can have significant impacts on the environment. Through their research, they have been developing their skills in critical thinking, analysis, and communication.

SCIENCE 8

Our Science 8 students have been working on a research project on Earth's systems. They have been exploring the connections between the geosphere, atmosphere, hydrosphere, and biosphere, and how they interact with each other. Through their research, they have been developing their skills in scientific inquiry, data analysis, and problem-solving.



ADST 6

Our ADST 6 students have been busy cooking and baking. They have been learning about different ingredients, kitchen tools, and techniques. Through their hands-on experiences, they have been developing their skills in following instructions, problem-solving, and creativity.



Social Studies 7/8

Our Social Studies 7/8 students have been working on presentations about the fall of Ancient Greece. They have been studying the political, economic, and social factors that led to the decline of one of the most influential civilizations in history. Through their research and presentations, they have been developing their skills in historical analysis, critical thinking, and communication.

Math 7


In this unit, students explored oral and written patterns, ordered pairs, graphs and linear equations, and transformations. Students completed their Dynamic Math 7 workbooks, and each section was considered a formative assessment. In addition, they had to apply concepts learned through the completion of a major project titled "Systems of Linear Equation Project," where they had to choose between two real life situations and then using systems of linear equations decide what to buy. Students had to collect data, write a system of linear equation and word problem, graph and solve algebraically, and design a final poster board.



PE 7/8

In this unit students continued learning the essential components of playing a basketball game. They were exposed to the skills and rules of basketball and were learning to perform basic skills in a game Students learned movement situation. including passing, dribbling, shooting, defending, running an offense, and advancing to a full court Our classes have been focusing on aame. badminton this unit as well. Students have been learning about the different strokes and strategies involved in the sport, as well as the rules and safety considerations. They have been developing their hand-eye coordination, endurance, and teamwork skills through practicing and playing matches.

Math 8

In this unit, students had to demonstrate knowledge of variables and relations, graphing with table values, translating between written and algebraic expressions, generalizing and problem solving, and first-degree equations. Students completed their Dynamic Math 8 workbooks, and each section was considered a formative assessment. In addition, they had to apply concepts learned through the completion of a major project titled "Systems of Linear Equation Project," where they had to choose between two real life situations and then using systems of linear equations decide what to buy. Students had to collect data, write a system of linear equation and word problem, graph and solve algebraically, and design a final poster board.



ADST 7/8

This unit students developed computation thinking and completed daily lessons that included code challenges and gave students an opportunity to stretch their skills. Students learned about the basics of HTML, it's structure and document standards, and had to construct a Fashion Blog as part of their formative assessment. Students had to use their new HTML knowledge to create the underlying structure of the blog and had to make sure to include plenty of pictures, links, lists, and other HTML elements that they've learned so far.



Art 7/8

In the last few months, students have continued to explore the principles of design using the visual mediums drawing, painting, and using pastels & pencil crayons. They were assessed on in-class sketchbook activities and had the opportunity to reflect on their own work, in order to review the quality of their work and make adjustments where needed. Students completed assessments such as "Still Life Painting" and the "Perspective City in Color Project" where students had to use their knowledge of space, color, value, line, and form to create a cityscape out of either onepoint or two-point perspective. A light source also needed to be established to create realistic light and dark values, and the cityscape was colored neatly according to a chosen color scheme.


Art 6

In the last few months, students have continued to examine symbolism in art, in order to understand and demonstrate how art is ever-evolving, and the ways it has changed over time and space. They were assessed on in-class sketchbook activities and had the opportunity to reflect on their own work, in order to review the quality of their work and make adjustments where needed. Students completed formative activities such "Geometric Hearts," "Eye to Eye: How Animals See the World," and "The Great Wave Art Project." In the project, students had to look at a poster of Hokusai's Great Wave and break down the painting into the three sections. They drew the first wave, then added the second wave and finally added the main wave. Drawing the waves was very easy and intuitive for almost every single child and showed their great creativity and imagination.



English Language Arts 7/8



Students also began flexing their critical thinking muscles by analyzing characters in a story.
