AN APOLOGY to all members of the church family exempt from wearing a face covering

The Re-opening Church Information issued recently asked anyone exempt from wearing a face covering for health reasons to bring proof of their exemption the first time they came to church, if possible.

Government guidance¹ indicates this is not necessary, and the request was made in error. We apologise most sincerely for any anxiety or distress this this has caused.

Exemption cards

Those who have an age, health or disability reason for not wearing a face covering should not be routinely asked to give any written evidence of this, this includes exemption cards. No person needs to seek advice or request a letter from a medical professional about their reason for not wearing a face covering.

Some people may feel more comfortable showing something that says they do not have to wear a face covering. This could be in the form of an exemption card, badge or even a home-made sign.

This is a personal choice and is not necessary in law.

Tuesday 11pm: check late news on phone; discover government is re-

imposing strict UK- wide socialising limits from next Monday. Heart sinks at impact on church family, newly re-gathering for worship. Sleep *very* badly!

Wednesday 9.30 a.m. top update on Methodist website message on social media, posted by Archbishop Justin Welby: "After contact with Government we hear that there is no change to guidance on places of worship. Worship is the

work of God – not a social gathering – and gives the strength to love and serve......" My spirits rise faster than a well-struck bell at the fairground.

Wed. 1pm. BBC news gives little detail, but PM will say more at 3.45pm. Wait, anxiously, trying to fill the time with useful things so I don't have to think or feel.



Wed. 3.45pm Notepad and pencil ready: PM says some Covid-19 secure venues - <u>like</u> <u>churches</u> - will be exempt from new restrictions, as long as there are no individual groups of more than 6, and groups don't mix socially or form larger groups. Suddenly find I am breathing again.

Wed. 5pm. Go for walk (get blister from new shoes!!). Ponder why I have felt like this? Am I selfish and short-sighted that this matters to me so much? There are life and death events of great seriousness all around. Is being able to go back to church so important? [*YES*!]

Am reminded of the privilege of being permitted to worship, and the need to take care of and for others. Archbishop (and others) had something to pray about that too.

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL READINGS

Gospel Reading: Matthew chapter 18 verses 21 to 35

Jesus tells the parable of the unmerciful servant – reminding us of God's forgiveness to us and the challenge to forgive others in return.

21 Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, 'Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Up to seven times?'

22 Jesus answered, 'I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.

23 'Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. 24 As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to him. 25 Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt.

26 'At this the servant fell on his knees before him. "Be patient with me," he begged, "and I will pay back everything." 27 The servant's master took pity on him, cancelled the debt and let him go. 28 'But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins.[i] He grabbed him and began to choke him. "Pay back what you owe me!" he demanded.

29 'His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, "Be patient with me, and I will pay it back." 30 'But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. 31 When the other servants saw what had happened, they were outraged and went and told their master everything that had happened.

32 'Then the master called the servant in. "You wicked servant," he said, "I cancelled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. 33 Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?" 34 In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed.

35 'This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart.'

Epistle Reading: Romans chapter 14: verses 5 to 13

St Paul writes about how to handle differences in opinion and tradition within the Church. He reminds the Christians in Rome about what is most important – that Jesus died and rose again for us all.

5 One person considers one day more sacred than another; another considers every day alike. Each of them should be fully convinced in their own mind. 6 Whoever regards one day as special does so to the Lord. Whoever eats meat does so to the Lord, for they give thanks to God; and whoever abstains does so to the Lord and gives thanks to God. 7 For none of us lives for ourselves alone, and none of us dies for ourselves alone. 8 If we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord. 9 For this very reason, Christ died and returned to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.

10 You, then, why do you judge your brother or sister? Or why do you treat them with contempt? For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. 11 It is written:

"As surely as I live," says the Lord,

"Every knee will bow before me; every tongue will acknowledge God."

12 So then, each of us will give an account of ourselves to God.

13 Therefore let us stop passing judgment on one another. Instead, make up your mind not to put any stumbling-block or obstacle in the way of a brother or sister.
