CAN YOU DIG IT?

Years ago a surface water diversion ditch had been installed along the property line behind the summer kitchen. The ditch was installed to prevent water from the adjoining hillside from flowing down the driveway; however, it had become cloaged with debris in recent years. As a result, the heavy rains associated with the September 2011 tropical storms overwhelmed the ditch and caused the mansion driveway to be washed out. (See the 4th Qtr 2011 newsletter for photos of the damage to the driveway.) While the driveway has been repaired,



we need to redo the drainage and grading in the area of the carriage house and summer kitchen. This will protect the driveway as well as correct an ongoing moisture problem in the summer kitchen. Two trees have been removed in preparation for this project. Anyone with a backhoe and expertise in

properly shooting grades that can help with this project is encouraged to contact the board.* If you do not own a backhoe but know someone who does, please ask them if they would consider helping the HMPS with this project.

2012 HMPS President's Annual Report

This report is from May 2011 to April 2012. This is my sixth year as president and my thirteenth year on the Haldeman Mansion Preservation Society. I have given a total commitment to this organization. I planned to step down this year from the presidency, but no one on the board wanted to replace me. It looks like I will be here another term.

This past year was very busy. The three outdoor events had Mother Nature on their side. All three were well attended. The Strawberry Festival was our best attended outdoor event this past summer. All the events were down in numbers due to the economy. Conoytown, with Tina Mark, as chair, was fun for families and educational for all. We had a great tea with some dressed in 19th century clothing.

Two events were canceled due to the rains of September. The road to the mansion was ruined and resulted in two cancelations - the Tavern Dinner and the Watershed Educational Event.

October brought the Fall Festival. This was enjoyed by those who attended. The

numbers were really low. This was the first event that we charged for cars. The cost was \$5.00 a car. The reason we needed to charge was the cost of the entertainment. We raised \$500.00 for the parking of cars, and this was the cost for the musicians.

In November, we had our third annual Kristkindtle Mart with a nice variety of vendors. People who came were pleased with the choices but again the number attending was down. We are trying something new this year with the change of location to the Bainbridge Fire Hall. This will be downtown and will be two days - Friday evening from 4 to 8 PM and Saturday from 9 to 1 PM. Nov 9th and 10th.

Our roof fund continues to grow. The temporary roof is still doing well. We still need to raise more funds for the roof. Members may continue to donate to raise at least double of the amount we We have now have. in the roof account now. aren't sure how much we need since the estimates were several years ago. We aren't even sure of the kind of roof that we will have - It could be wood shingles, tiles that look like wood shingles, or something else.

Letters were sent out in January to renew memberships and get new members. We had a good aresponse with 84 units responding. If you haven't paid your 2012 dues, please send in soon. We have 240 units on our membership list. This is less because about 100 haven't paid dues for 5 or more years. These were all sent the newsletter but did not We have some respond. members who are volunteers and some are businesses who support us. I would like to see the member units go to back up to 340. If you haven't sent in dues or donated to the roof fund, please help save the mansion. Your money is used for ongoing expenses, insurance, repairs and other bills.

We are getting ready for three events that will happen soon: Our first event is new this year. The Spring Tea will be Saturday, May 5 at 4 PM at the mansion. The cost is \$25.00 and you will need to make reservations. second event is Conoytown Education Day, Saturday, May 19 from 10 AM to 1 4 PM. The cost is \$ 5.00 per adult. children to age 17 are free. Tina Mark is the chair. third event is the Strawberry Festival, Sunday, June 3, 2012, with Elaine Jackson as the We have three other chair. events this summer:

Victorian Tea will be Sunday, July 15 with Tina Mark as Chair. Samuel Haldeman's 200th birthday is August 12th from noon to 4 PM.

Tavern Dinner will be Saturday, September 8 with Gail Yurkovic, chair. The Teas and the Tavern Dinner events need reservations.

Other things that happened in the last year are also significant.

Two trees were cut down behind the carriage house and the Summer House. All the stumps were removed. This was completed by Charles Heineman.

A copper strip was installed the length of the roof to inhibit moss growth by John Hughes.

A new sump pump was purchased to help get water out of the basement. We also bought a dehumidifier for the same reason.

This winter we had the sewage tank pumped. It had caused a backup in the restroom of the carriage house. This cleanup was done by Keith Shearer and Elaine Jackson.

We began working with Tim Smedick to develop a preservation plan and fund Raising Proposal for the Haldeman Mansion in 2011.

Also in September of 2011, the Conoy Township was instrumental in getting the road redone so we could drive to the mansion and have the Fall Festival. They did this with a big savings to the Haldeman Mansion.

As you can see, we had many expenses this past year. We are thankful for all the volunteers, the donations received and your memberships. We did not get in the red but we were almost there, and so far have paid all our bills, and we increased the roof fund by \$ 4000.00.

Goals for 2012 include:

- 1. Complete the painting of the windows of the Carriage House. (This was on the 2011 list and not done.)
- 2. Finish painting windows of the Haldeman Mansion. (We need volunteers to help on the 2^{nd} floor from 2011 list.)
- 3. Finish repairing and painting walls in the kitchen (from 2011 list).
- Replace two fans with lights in the apartment of the Carriage House
 - 5. Continue to raise money for the roof.
- 6. Have successful events with members and volunteers support.

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

Locust Grove & Vicinity Timeline

INTRODUCTION: The Haldeman Mansion is on a rise overlooking the mouth of the Conoy Creek and east bank of the Susquehanna River in northwestern Lancaster County, PA. It is the heart of what has been known as Locust Grove since at least the early 1800s. It is part of what was John Galbraith Jr.'s 440 acre+ land warrant from the William Penn Family. A warrant that stretched from the bank of the river inland in a north easterly direction for over a mile. It encompassed the Conoy Creek up to a present day village known as Stackstown. These lands and those warranted to the immediate north (by Jonah Davenport & James Logan), immediate east (by Alexander Hutchinson & James Cook) and immediate south (by George Miranda & Samuel Smith) provide a microcosm of colonial activity and influence, which was fostered by their proximity to early Indian occupations, river ferries and a year-around supply of water power. The history of Locust Grove and the mansion property includes Indian settlements and traders, farming, manufacturing and quarrying. Peter's Road (an early indian traders' path), the Pennsylvania Canal and Railroad traversed the property and contributed to the business and political success of its prominent owners from pre-colonial times well into the 20th Century.

1813	Bainbridge was originally founded by Henry & John B. Haldeman (1779-1836) in 1813. The latter's contribution included the purchase of a "(Martin) Shaffer Farm. Their land contributions were north of Race Street. These lands were on the portion of the Logan Patent that descended thru Henry Miller (Lancaster County, PA Deed Book GG, Page 238). They laid out their town "on the north side of the main street leading eastward from the river at the railroad station". Bainbridge was enlarged by adding Centreville, which bordered on the south side of Race Street. Two blocks to the South of Race Street was Market Street, which ran due east to the Stackstown road, paralleling Race Street, which extended to the Stackstown road, as well. The original Bainbridge had its own Market Street. See the 1875 Atlas. Centreville was on part of the land that descended from the Logan patent thru Michael Graff, thru Bartram Galbraith (1738-1804), thru Jacob Hoffman to John Siple and John Smith Jr. The latter purchased the land that was to become Centreville in 1813.
