

How to Start a Women's Learning Circle in Your Area



Recent surveys estimate women now own or co-own close to 50% of the farmland in the US. Women's Learning Circles are designed to serve women farmland landowners who are interested in learning more about conservation. Our work with women farmers and landowners shows many share strong conservation values, and want their land farmed sustainability into the future. "Learning circles" are peer-to-peer meetings in which every women's knowledge and expertise is of value. A wide range of experts are brought in to provide information that will help the landowners make informed decisions about soil and water conservation, hunting and habitat management, pollinator habitat, forest management, and many other topics. Some of our partners include the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, Soil and Water Districts, Purdue Cooperative Extension, Indiana State Department of Agriculture, Indiana Department of Natural Resources, USDA Farm Services Agency, and Indiana Department of Environmental Management.






