## The Pub was Open!

On Monday last, 5 October, the Gospel was the parable of the Good Samaritan. Remember, a person was attacked and robbed on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho. That's not like going down to Cork or up to Belfast. Jerusalem is 754 metres above sea level and Jericho is 258 metres below sea level: that's a vertical difference of 1,012 metres and the towns are only twenty or thirty kilometres apart - so you do go DOWN from Jerusalem to Jericho.

As you head west from Jerusalem not only are you going downhill you're travelling through a very arid area. as recently as 150 years ago you'd be walking or depending on a horse (or other animal!). You would need water. An inn was built where there was a well and it's still there there weren't many wells. The road was improved and now runs part what was the back of the inn. (Like the house on the estate where Santry Stadium was built: the son left the house in a rage and said he'd never darken that doorway again. When he inherited the estate he remodelled the house with a new entrance. Or so the story goes.)

And that inn is where the Good Samaritan looked after the badly battered victim.

Time passed, postal services began, and a post office opened in the inn where the Turkish Ottoman Empire postal service used a postmark that said BON SAMARITAIN. And there it is from 1879!

The Parable of the Good Samaritan is in Luke 10:25-37
