Some info on Age Badges and Length of Membership Badges from the Guidebook for Members

Age Badges.

Badges signifying a member has attained the age of 60 years, 70 years, or 80 years are available by contacting the National Administration Office. There may be occasions when the Club database does not hold information on a member's date of birth, and in that circumstance, proof of age may be required to be supplied before a particular age badge is sold to the member. Supply of the 70 years and 80 years age badges will be at the Club's cost, complimentary to the member upon application. The 60 age badges are at the members cost.

Length of Membership Badges.

Subject to confirmation of records, badges indicating continuous membership of the Club for a period of 10 years, and then in increments of 5 years, are available for members to purchase \$5.00 each. The 25 year membership badge is complimentary on individual application.

A member wishing to purchase a length of membership badge should contact the National Administration Office.



NATIONAL AGM

The National AGM in Launceston is fast approaching with some our members sailing off to attend. If you are one the lucky ones make sure you go along to the National AGM on Saturday 5th March 2016. Another highlight of the AGM is the National Road Safety Forum where two attendees from each Branch are invited to attend on Friday 4th March 2016. If you are attending the Safety Formum could you please pick up an extra copy of the Reports from across Australia for Amanda – she likes to read these, there is always a lot of info in them.

The National Safety Committee Report is available on the NATCOM website and was also emailed out – there were some interesting reads in this,

Neville Gray, Road Safety representative from South Australia, has his **Top Ten Tips for riding - here they are**

1. Look for other road users that are not looking for you. Ride conspicuously and never in blind spots. Never assume that the other vehicle will stop.
2. Riders, unlike car drivers with aids such as air bags, collapsible steering columns and the stability of four wheels, have only their hazard perception and avoidance skills and their protective clothing to make them safer. Therefore, keep your attention level high.
3. Always wear good quality protective clothing from your head to your feet. Protect your extremities with helmet, gloves and leg and arm protection in all weather conditions.
4. Most cars can stop quicker than most motorcycles especially in emergency situations. Therefore, always keep a 3 second gap to the vehicle in front of you.
5. Always perform a head check before changing lanes. Just looking in your mirrors is not good enough.
6. It is vital to ride at a speed to suit the prevailing conditions. In bad weather, this could mean at a speed under the posted speed limit
7. Riding under the influence of alcohol and drugs is plain suicidal. You need all of your faculties at a high level to successfully ride a motorcycle.
8. Don't forget the safety of your pillion as well as your own. They too need good protective clothing, be informed about the dynamics of a motorcycle and know how to assist the rider by being a good stable pillion.
9. Never lend your motorcycle to riders who are unlicensed or inexperienced.
10. Intersections are high risk areas. Slow down when approaching an intersection cover your brakes and be ready to avoid a possible collision.

Allan Smith, Road Safety representative from Queensland, has written this thought provoking article on Lane Filtering

The topic of lane filtering has been in the news a lot in the last couple of years because a number of the Eastern states have recently legalised the practice. It is still unclear if any of the other states will also follow suit and change their legislation also.

Lane filtering is the practice of riding your motorcycle at low speed between stationary or slow moving motor vehicles which are travelling in the same direction as you are. It is a form of overtaking between rows of vehicles. The practice is not new; some motorcyclists have been lane filtering for as long as they have been riding. The legality of lane filtering has always been the subject of a lot of debate, which we won't go into here. Let's just say it was generally illegal and

some jurisdictions and individual enforcement officers penalised riders for filtering and others appeared to adopt a less pragmatic approach.

Lane filtering should not be confused with lane splitting. Lane splitting is the practice of riding your motorcycle at speeds above 30 kph between stationary or slower moving motor vehicles which are travelling in the same direction or the opposite direction as you are. It is still illegal to lane split. The beauty about lane filtering is that it is not compulsory. Individual motorcyclists can choose whether they wish to filter or not. When you talk to a number of motorcyclists about lane filtering you will receive a wide variety of responses. Some practice it, some abhor it, and others selectively lane filter depending on the width of the carriageways, the width of their bike, the traffic density, the temperature, the weather conditions, and their urgency to reach their destination. Lane filtering is usually more popular in areas with double lane roads and high traffic density and is particularly popular with commuter riders in cities.

So what are the advantages?

[1] Lane filtering offers a number of advantages for the rider, including: [2] Reduced traffic delays or faster trip times. Improved rider comfort in hot conditions; the motorcycle and rider are cooler when the motorcycle is moving. Improved fuel economy; less fuel is wasted while idling in a traffic queue. [3] Opportunities for motorcyclists to reach the head of the traffic queue and then separate themselves from those other vehicles.

So what are the disadvantages?

[a] Safe motorcyclists tend to ride their motorcycle in a position on the road which gives them the best separation from other vehicles and which also gives them the best opportunity to see and to be seen by other road users. [b] The practice of filtering ignores these safety best practices and has riders almost rubbing mirrors with other vehicles.

The disadvantages are: [c] Riding in close proximity to other vehicles. [d] The need for intense rider vigilance and concentration. [e] The risk of continually riding in and out of driver's blind spots. [f] Restricted ability to see and plan ahead. [g] Exposure to risk of impatient drivers performing lane swaps without looking or indicating. [h] Exposure to road rage from aggressive drivers thinking the motorcyclist has an unfair advantage and is queue jumping. [i] Exposure to red light runners when you do reach the head of the queue

Legislation mismatches

We are not going to detail all of the new road rules for lane filtering; individual riders should familiarise themselves with their own state's road rules. And, yet again, we have differences in the road rules for lane filtering between the states which have introduced it (Queensland, NSW, Victoria and the ACT). If you do intend to filter it is in your best interests to learn the rules for both your own state and any other state you may plan to visit. Don't assume that the same rules apply everywhere.

Lane filtering safely

Your prime concern should be your own safety and the safety of other road users. Lane filtering is risky and there are a few tips which you may find will help you to better manage your risk:

the road rules for filtering

waddling between rows of vehicles?)

careful around gaps in the traffic; this is where impatient drivers are most likely to lane change without warning

passengers may open a door to exit a vehicle unexpectedly

Watch for other motorcyclists; some may not be as thoughtful and considerate as yourself

Lane filtering etiquette

If you are going to lane filter a little bit of etiquette will probably go a long way towards maintaining good relationships with the other road users. Remember that many drivers still believe that lane filtering is illegal. Some also believe that motorcyclists are getting an unfair advantage in congestion

and the more aggressive drivers may seize the opportunity to vent their ignorance and frustration on you. To improve the harmony: Filter and out of traffic. Bikes weave speed gets other road users off side quickly Be patient with aggressive drivers who may move their vehicle to block your progress Acknowledge who move over to let you through; a nod or a wave will help.

When you reach the head of the queue

The purpose of filtering is to allow you to reach the head of the queue and get ahead of the other traffic. Logic says that you will more than likely filter and then park your bike in front of the first row of vehicles and wait for the next green light. However be aware that the law does not allow you to cross the stop line at a red traffic signal (the white line painted on the roadway) or where there is no white line you are not allowed to pass the “stop here on red signal” sign. Traffic infringement penalties can apply.

Red light runners

The other and potentially more serious issue with being at the head of the queue is the threat from red light runners. After filtering to the head of the queue it is highly likely that you will have vehicles parked directly behind your motorcycle. When the traffic light turns green this can place pressure on you, the rider, to make a clean start and a fast getaway from the lights to distance yourself from the other vehicles.

This practice contradicts our training to take the time to glance both ways before riding away from the lights. Taking the time to check both ways is the only protection you have against red light runners. Traditionally, if you did not lane filter and your motorcycle was further back in the traffic queue, someone else at the head of the queue took the hit from the red light runners. This is something else you may wish to consider if you plan to lane filter.

I know I said he had little language ability but I could definitely hear him repeating "Fu&!&ing Beauty" "Lovely". Bill was over the moon when Kiwi approached him with his hand outstretched. It was an amazing moment, which I will not forget, we made his day! I was really glad that we were able to keep him in his wheelchair because if he could have he would have run over to the bikes. Other residents came out to see the bikes and trikes and take photos. The picture shows us at the Carols in



the building. It was one of those nights when it didn't matter if you could sing or not, you just did, joining in with the residents, family and staff in all the old favourites.

We received a thank you letter from the Salvos and an invitation to attend next year. It's definitely on my list of things to do, just being there made such a difference to so many people.

Ipswich roads are deadly risk to pedestrians, motorbikes

ONE in three road deaths in the Ipswich region involves a pedestrian, a motorbike or a truck.

Queensland Government figures show between 2001 and 2014, about 60% of all fatal crashes involve only cars and about 30% of fatal crashes on roads across the Ipswich council area involved a truck, a motorbike or a pedestrian.

RACQ spokeswoman Lauren Ritchie said pedestrians were some of the most at-risk people in cities.

"Crashes involving pedestrians more often than not occur in built-up areas," she said.

"It is not just people behind the wheel of a car who are at risk from distraction. More and more people with headphones on who cannot hear traffic coming are being involved in crashes."

Nearby rural areas the Scenic Rim and Somerset regions had some of the highest percentages of fatal crashes involving motorcycles in the state.

In the Scenic Rim 16% of all road deaths involved a motorbike and in the Somerset region the figure was 14%.

Ms Ritchie said recreational motorbike riders, in contrast to commuter riders, were especially at risk of dangerous crashes.

"Recreational riders are more likely to be involved in crashes at higher speeds in more rural areas," she said.

Ms Ritchie said last year Queensland had more than twice as many motorcycle deaths as 2012 and it was on track to be one of the worst years for riders in recent memory.

Australian Road Safety Foundation chief Russell White said pedestrians and drivers all needed to keep an eye out for one another.

Mr White said road conditions and locations made different transportation modes more likely to be involved in a crash depending on where it happened.

"It is not just the volume but the type of traffic on the road," he said.

"A truck driver on a country road or major highway has a different mindset than a holiday-maker on a Gold Coast road."

Statistics revealed cars are involved in about 60% of fatal crashes on Ipswich roads, motorbikes in 12%, trucks in 11%, pedestrians in 11%, bicycles in 3%, buses in 2% and all other vehicles in 2%.

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
