The annual Romanza Festivale is back in St. Augustine from April 29 through May 15, 2022. The two-week long festival hosts musical and dance productions presenting the most talented in St. Augustine.

This year's headliners include Leonard Bernstein and his opera "Trouble in Tahiti," Akia Uwanda in "Tribute to the Ladies of New Jazz and Soul," Dance Kaleidoscope, music by Mama Blue, and the "Music of Albert Syeles - An Evening Musicale." Romanza promotes and produces cultural events that showcase St. Augustine's vibrant living culture that enhance the quality of life for residents and create a positive lasting impression of the Nation's Most Romantic City. St. Augustine's St. Patrick's Day Parade, St. Augustine Celtic Music and Heritage Festival, St. Augustine's Romanza Festivale of the Arts are annual showcase of the arts in Northeast Florida.

Romanza Festivale is a collaborative production by dozens of independent cultural organizations and businesses in St. Augustine, Florida. With over 100 high-quality concerts, plays, tours, and more over 10 days, with mostly small audiences, St. Augustine's Romanza Festivale of the Arts is the "Un-festival" avoiding huge crowds all at once in a single space.

Romanza draws attention to St. Augustine's burgeoning arts, culture, and heritage community through an unprecedented program and major marketing campaign. Romanza's "St. Augustine Celtic Music & Heritage Festival" in March is centered in the City's large "events field" with authentic music, cultural offerings, highland games, and vendors. The St. Patrick's Day Parade is the only one in Northeast Florida.

St Augustine South Reflections

This spring, St Augustine South has begun dusting off the cobwebs, and getting out and socializing again after the restrictions imposed and self-imposed by the SARS CoV2 epidemic have eased. It's so good to meet neighbors again at community events.



Spring began with the launch of our Composting Project, in partnership with EpicCure, an all-volunteer organization dedicated to reducing hunger in St Johns County by ending food waste, redistributing excess food from stores and supermarkets, and promoting composting. Anyone can sign up to contribute green kitchen waste and garden trimmings to the composter. Many families with young children signed up and brought their little ones to learn about composting, starting good habits young! Although some neighbors compost at home, many are dumping food waste in their trash, from where it goes off to the Tillman Landfill and contributes to methane production and climate warming. A better way to dispose of your green food waste – vegetable matter, coffee grounds, and eggshells, but not dairy or meat – is to compost it. You can collect your green food waste in a 5 gallon hardware store bucket with a lid, and bring it to the composter on Sundays between 3pm and 5pm. Culture has a new home - The Waterworks



The Waterworks was built in 1898 as the pumping station for St. Augustine's first water utility and remained in service until a new water plant opened in 1927 on West King Street. The site was then developed into Davenport Park and the building was adapted for use as the City's Little Theatre, then a home for the St. Augustine Arts Club, and later as the St. Augustine Garden Club.

It was closed in 2005 for safety concerns and the city secured grant funding to stabilize and refurbish the building. The Waterworks was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2014 for significance at the local level by association with Jo Conn Guild, a nationally significant engineer, and F.A. Hollingsworth, one of St. Augustine's most prominent architects.

A collaboration between the St. Johns Cultural Council and the City of St. Augustine, The Waterworks will dramatically increase access to arts, culture, and heritage programming for residents and visitors, and provide much-needed space for local organizations to meet and host community events.

County COVID-19 Testing Site Closed

Effective 4 p.m. on Friday, Apr. 22, the NOMI Health COVID-19 testing site at the St. Johns County Wind Mitigation Building will no longer be operational due to a lack of sufficient federal funding.

Since early March, daily testing numbers at the county site have been steadily declining, averaging less than 100 tests a day. This is a result of widespread testing availability in the private sector, the Federal program that mails free COVID-19 tests to individuals, and a decrease in COVID-19 infections.

Humane Society Receives Grant For Veterinary Tech & Pet Groomer Interns

The St. Augustine Humane society is the grateful recipient of an anonymous grant to hire two local candidates aged 18-25 for year-long paid internships. This is the fifth annual grant,

formerly named the WorkStarter Grant, awarded to the St. Augustine Humane Society as part of a program to encourage recent high school graduates to learn a trade upon entering the local workforce.

Over the last four years as recipients of the grant, the Humane Society developed and refined two distinct training programs; one for veterinary technician and one for pet groomer. Each curriculum is designed to produce a comprehensive education, which includes hands-on skills development combined with written lessons. The veterinary technician training is completed in the Humane Society's state-of-the-art veterinary clinic on Old Moultrie Rd. in St. Augustine. The Society Pet Spa, also on the property, offers the pet groomer the most extensive training environment available locally.



After a year under the Humane Society's tutelage, each intern is well-prepared to find solid employment in the private sector.

"In addition to providing outstanding skills development, interns are offered a supportive environment where they are encouraged and appreciated," Executive Director Carolyn Smith said. "They are also exposed to the philanthropic workings of a non-profit and gain an appreciation for its role in the community."

Previous years' internships have been offered beginning in June and restricted to candidates who graduated from high school in the same calendar in which they began their internship. In response to the overwhelming interest in the positions by people ages 18-25, this year's candidate pool will be expanded to include people graduating from high school between 2018-2022. Some of these individuals have been in the labor market for a couple of years or tried college and learned it is not for them, so offering a year-long internship is an opportunity for a fresh start.

The St. Augustine Humane Society's goal with this program is to support the professional development of local young people as they navigate the beginning of their careers, while also contributing to the needs of the community. Veterinary practices and other pet service businesses are in constant need of competent vet techs and groomers, and the candidates trained in the internship program are ready to help fill that need.

Dry Needling Q & A

I have written on Dry Needling (DN) before but continue to receive questions regarding this intervention. The purpose of this column is to answer as many of those questions in the space allowed (500 words or less) but more info can be found on our website or can be answered with a phone call at 904-829-3411 by any of our DN clinicians (see ad).

Is DN new?

No, DN is not new. It has been growing in popularity since the 1960's when Janet Travell, MD coined the term Myofascial Pain Syndrome and used it to treat myofascial trigger points. It has been utilized for years by European physical therapists, which was my first exposure and was first approved in 1984 for use by US/Maryland physical therapists.

First Coast Rehabilitation (FCR) therapists have been teaching DN nationally and internationally since 2010, were approved in 2017 by the state PT Board to use in 2017, testified before the FL PT Board on behalf of all FL PT's, which was approved in 2020, and have since trained many others in St. Augustine, Florida and across the nation (see myopainseminars.com).

Why utilize DN?

The benefit of DN is multifactorial and rooted in pain science research. At its root, a trigger point, or hyper-irritable nodule within a taut band of muscle, develops when the muscle is overloaded. This can happen in several ways, but poor posture or unaccustomed activities are two primaries. When this happens, the basic contractile elements of the muscle lock up, causing compression of the vascularity, thereby depriving the tissues of oxygen, resulting in tissue damage and the release of noxious (pain stimulating) chemicals = pain.

When treating the trigger point with DN, a twitch response is elicited, which is protective response to the stimuli via a spinal reflex loop. The "twitch" is an indication the trigger point has been treated and the noxious stimuli have been flushed out. It may leave some muscle soreness but can result in an immediate analgesic effect, increase motion, strength and function. And because no medication is involved, there are not medicinal sideeffects.

What kind of problems can be treated with DN?

Almost anyone. It can help with nearly all types of headaches, Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, shoulder, neck, back, hip, leg, foot, and hand pain, where trigger points are involved. TMJ, jaw pain, and ringing of the ears caused by trigger points can also be treated. It can be used for orthopaedic and neurological problems where pain, muscle inhibition and loss of range of motion are a result of trigger points. It can also be used to treat scar tissue, pelvic pain and more. Is it safe?

Yes. All needles are sterile. In a 2013 multi-site study in Ireland, which included 39 PT's in nearly 8,000 treatments, proved with proper training and practice, DN is safe. (Therapist at FCR have been trained in the same techniques used in this study.) The major side effects were soreness, fatigue, an occasional bruising.

There are many more questions but limited space. What to do after treatment? How may session will it require? Once the trigger points are treated, are they gone forever?

Epic-Cure: The Local Non-Profit Fighting Food Waste and Putting Meals on the Table

those in the coastal suburbs of Northeast Florida, do not have to worry about putting meals on the table. The blessing of having a food-filled pantry, therefore, is often overlooked. Unwanted food is carelessly thrown out, drinks are left to expire, and produce to mold. These actions are done without malice, yet their impact is massive. 30 to 40 percent of America's food supply ends up in landfills. Annually, food waste is also the largest component in landfills, making up 10 percent of all greenhouse gas emissions

These staggering numbers shocked Sunny Mulford, the founder of the local nonprofit organization Epic-Cure, and was a clear call to action. With the help of her husband Ken, Sunny founded Epic-Cure Inc. in 2018. Epic-Cure, a 100 percent volunteer organization, has since helped fight the amount of food waste in Northeast Florida through food rescue and distribution. Nine and a half percent of St. Johns County households are experiencing food insecurity, and Epic-Cure provides food to many of these homes.

The process in which Epic-Cure rescues and redistributes food is both efficient and effective. Epic-Cure is reliant on community volunteers who are willing to give their time to the cause. First, donated food is picked up from grocery stores, food pantries, and various other donors. Volunteers then assist in organizing this food in local Epic-Cure warehouses throughout the week. Volunteer opportunities are updated weekly on Epic-Cure's Facebook Volunteer Group. "Last to attend cooking classes.

Many American families, particularly time I volunteered for Epic-Cure, I sorted meat and unloaded trucks," explained high school sophomore, Ellie Goodfriend, who recently volunteered in Epic-Cure's St. Augustine facility.

After being sorted, food is distributed to those who are food insecure in the community. This has an incredible impact on the lives of those in need. In total, Epic-Cure has provided approximately 70 pounds of food around 89,000 times to families experiencing food insecurity. Mulford stated, "By us providing that food on a regular and consistent basis... senior citizens might be able to purchase medicine that they couldn't have otherwise purchased. Working families... will say that because of the food they didn't have to buy, they were able to pay their utility bills, or make their car or mortgage payments.

In addition to providing families with food, Epic-Cure also helps the local children form life skills and build their resumes. This assistance is provided in the form of cooking classes, in which local chefs and senior volunteers instruct school-aged children.

To get involved with Epic-Cure, by volunteer opportunities are available in their local warehouses. Volunteer dates and locations are updated weekly on the Epic-Cure website, www.epic-cure.org, and on Epic-Cure's Facebook Volunteer Group. Epic-Cure also accepts monetary donations through their website. This helps Epic-Cure's food rescue initiative and allows more underprivileged children

home phone rings many times a day with scam calls. They always seem to start off with a greeting that sounds like the title of this article, then they go on to say that they have detected some sort of issue. They need to fix it right now.

The State of affairs with Scam Support calls is so bad that now a significant part of my business is dealing with the aftermath of someone being scammed after giving remote access to their computer.

Another common call is the Refund scam, in which folks get a call stating that you are owed a refund, and they can help make sure that you get that as soon as possible. All they need is access to your computer. (big red flags should be going up)

The common thread on most of the phone scams and computer support popup scams is that all important and immediate need to have access to your computer. Anyone that requests access to your computer should be treated with the utmost caution.

If I were to ask you for access, and you have never met me, or have not looked me in the eye, you should definitely NOT grant me remote access. Going beyond

Lately, my clients tell me that their this is the idea that If you know me, and someone says that they work for me, or are my representative, you still should NOT grant access.

The problem with someone calling you and claiming to be with Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, or whatever company they may say, is that you have no way to prove they are telling the truth. They may know enough about you to convince you that they are really from whatever company being named.

When someone that called you asks you to go to your computer and go to a website, or "type these words" or "click this link in the email", your default answer should be to hang up the phone. Don't say another word, simply hang up.

Hang up the phone if someone calls and starts off with anything that sounds like "I'm with support", because it's a scam
