The Deacon

Easter greetings to you all! My name is Jim Sniadajewski. I have been in formation for the Permanent Diaconate for the past 5 years and will be ordained on May 7, 2022. Although I have not been officially assigned to serve at any parish yet, it is possible that I will remain at Immaculate Conception and by extension Sacred Heart. With this in mind, Fr. Miller has asked me to explain the role of a deacon in the Church today.

Holy Orders is the sacrament through which the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles and their successors continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time. Within the Church, there are two degrees of ministerial participation in the priesthood of Christ: the episcopacy (Bishops) and presbyterate (Priests). The third degree of the diaconate (Deacon) is intended to help and serve the bishop and his priests. All three degrees are conferred through the sacrament of Holy Orders. The priest through ordination is consecrated and configured as Christ the Head. That is he acts in the person of Christ the head. This is most evident during the Mass when the priest acts in "*In Persona Christi*" (In the Person of Christ) at the consecration of the Holy Eucharist.

The deacon through ordination is consecrated and configured as Christ the servant. He is neither a lay person nor priest but one ordained to the service of God's people in communion with the diocesan bishop and his body of priests.

The ministry of the deacon is threefold. Strengthened by sacramental grace, they are dedicated to the People of God in the service of the liturgy, of the Gospel, and of works of charity.

In the next few weeks, we will look at each of these ministries in more detail. In the meantime I humbly ask for your prayers and patience.

The Deacon II

In the first article concerning the ministry of the deacon, we briefly looked at the Sacrament of Holy Orders and the relationships of the bishop, priest, and deacon. The principle function of the deacon is to collaborate with the bishop and the priests in the exercise of a ministry, which is not of their own wisdom, but that of the Word of God, calling all to conversion and holiness. We ended by noting that the deacon is in the service of the Church in three ways. In the Word, in Liturgy, and in works of Charity. In this article, we will look at how the deacon participates in the Church's ministry of the Word. During the Ordination Rite of a Deacon, after the Prayer of Ordination and the newly ordained deacon has vested he goes to the Bishop and kneels. The Bishop places the Book of the Gospels into his hands and says: *Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach.* The deacon is called to proclaim the Scriptures, to instruct and to encourage the people in their faith. The deacon participates as an evangelizer and teacher in the Church's mission of heralding the Word.

This is most evident during Mass and other liturgies. It is the deacon who properly proclaims the Gospel when he is present. By virtue of his ordination, he may give the homily in accord with requirements of canon law.

The deacon can participate many other ways in the Church's ministry of the Word. These may include catechetical instruction, assisting in the religious formation of those preparing for the reception of the sacraments, outreach to alienate Catholics, evangelization, and leading retreats.

In these and many other formal and informal ways, the deacon leads and assists the community to reflect on its communion and mission in Jesus Christ. The deacon, by God's sacramental grace, by word and example, helps the faithful discover their own call to live lives of service.

Next time we will look at how the deacon serves the Church in the Liturgy. I again, humbly ask for your prayers and patience.
