

#### Harm reduction

Set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences associated with risky behaviors



Does not attempt to minimize or ignore the real and tragic harm and danger associated with drug use



"The primary principle is to accept the fact that people do engage in high-risk behaviors and commit to helping those people reduce the harm associated with behavior."

# **History & progress**

- First sanctioned SIF: Switzerland (est. 1986)
- First sanctioned SIF
  in North America:
   Insite in Vancouver, BC
  (est. 2003)
- As of 2018:
   100 sites legally operating in 65 cities / 10 countries
- Additional unsanctioned sites
- Extensively studied
- But none in the US






# Why SIFs for the US?

- Overdose is a national public health crisis
  - Leading cause of accidental death
- Injection drug use remains a concern
  - 770,000+ people inject drugs in the US
  - Injection-related HIV has declined, but PWID account for 11% of all men and 23% of all women living with HIV
  - Majority of HCV cases in the US are associated with injection drug use
  - Increased opioid use raising concerns about increases in HIV and hepatitis C
- Growing recognition of the need for comprehensive services for people who use drugs











#### SIF sites

- Meant to complement, not replace, existing prevention, harm reduction and treatment interventions
- Part of a comprehensive public health approach to reducing the harms of drug misuse
- Part of a spectrum of substance use services
- Fundamentally non-judgmental environment
- Are about <u>much</u> more than the drugs....

Promote dignity, survival and increased social integration

SAFER IS BETTER

- Enhanced access to & utilization of:
  - Drug treatment
  - Medical services
  - Social services
- Improved safer injecting practices including decreased syringe sharing
- HIV & HCV prevention
- Reduced prevalence & severity of SSTIs
- O overdose deaths!

#### **Additional benefits**

- Reduced public injecting & public disorder
- Less drug-related litter
- No increases in:
  - Drug use
  - Initiation into injection drug use
  - Drug-related crime!
- Enhanced connections with—and insights garnered from—PWUD
- Once established, SCS sites enjoy community support

SAFER IS BETTER

"All studies converged to find that SIFs were efficacious in attracting the most marginalized people who inject drugs, promoting safer injection conditions, enhancing access to primary health care, and reducing the overdose frequency. SIFs were not found to increase drug injecting, drug trafficking or crime in the surrounding environments. SIFs were found to be associated with reduced levels of public drug injections and dropped syringes."

"Vancouver, Canada's supervised injection facility, Insite, has been the most extensively studied SIF in the world, with over 60 peer-reviewed articles published examining its effects on a range of variables, from retention to treatment referrals to cost effectiveness."

SAFER IS BETTER

- 57 percent entry into drug treatment over two years.
  - --DeBeck,et al., 2011 "Injection drug use cessation and use of North America's first medically supervised safer injecting facility." Drug Alcohol Depend. 113, 172-176.
- 50 percent decrease in public drug use.
  - --Wood, et al., 2004 "Changes in public order after the opening of a medially supervised safer injecting facility for illicit injection drug users." CMAJ 171, 731-734.
- 35 percent reduction in drug overdose in area surrounding SIF.
  --Marshall, et al., 2011 "Reduction in overdose mortality
  after the opening of North America's first medically
  supervised safer injecting facility: a retrospective
  population-based study." Lancet 377, 1429-1437.

#### Cost effectiveness

- Facility costs are basically low
- Savings associated with preventing health costs:
  - Fewer ambulance calls
  - Fewer ER visits & hospitalizations
  - Averted HIV, HCV, SSTIs
  - Averted non-fatal overdoses & overdose deaths
- Savings associated with better MAT uptake
- LE savings through reduced public order concerns
