#### **First Steps**

Before you buy equipment or bees you might like to attend some of our beginner's sessions to learn some basics.

At our Association Apiary you will have an opportunity to handle bees and equipment. We go through different aspects of beekeeping. After the course you will feel more confident looking after your own bees.

South Chilterns "Mentoring Scheme"
When you get your own bees we can
assign an experienced beekeeper close by,
who can help with practical techniques.

South Chilterns "Winter Workshops"
An opportunity to experience practical aspects of beekeeping. We concentrate on specific subjects in an indoor workshop setting and without bees!



#### What equipment do you need?

#### **Protective Clothing**

When you visit bees you will need protection clothing. To begin with you can borrow a bee suit from the club. You also need gloves (Marigolds) and Wellington boots. A bee suit costs about £60. And yes, we all get stung occasionally!

#### **Buying Equipment**

In the long term, it pays to buy the best equipment you can afford. Do ask for advice before buying. It is possible to get complete beekeeping starter kits for £250 upwards, which include the hive, clothing, smoker, beekeeping book and often other useful gadgets. Most beekeepers start with one hive but expand to two or more in the second year.

Once you know what you want, the cheapest place to buy kit can be at these annual events:

- BBKA annual conference
- Bee Tradex

#### **Borrowing Equipment**

We have a number of items of equipment for use by members.

#### **Getting Bees**

When you are ready for bees, we suggest the following:

- South Chilterns can provide you with your first bees (a Nucleus) at about half the market price.
- South Chilterns members may have bees for sale.
- South Chilterns members may have a complete hive of bees for sale.
- South Chilterns members collect swarms of bees.

Beware – Buy bees only from trusted sources. Ask one of our experienced members for advice.



#### How much time does it take up?

- Looking after a single hive takes about half an hour per week between April and October.
- Occasional external inspection of the hive and feeding is required over the winter
- That's it! Unless you want to take longer!
