

fittings" to be incorporated into the Rector's Vestry. It is so important that we choose the right light fittings, fire surround, floor coverings etc. to best suit our needs. A regular check on the finances are also needed to ensure we are on track with our income and expenditure as we head towards completion of Phase 6.



Outdoors and work carries on. It was square but now its chamfered! A block of sandstone, quarried in Cumbria and worked on by Paul, the stonemason, originally weighing about 400 cwt now sits , a little lighter, and firmly in place ,on the south wall of the Oratory.

The massive stone roof is rapidly taking shape.

The stonemason is working hard to ensure it will stand for generations to come. He is intrigued by its design, which " in all his years " he says " he has never seen a design like it"!
