Over 1,400 years ago in the Arabian Peninsula, Nusaybah Bint Ka'ab was the first woman warrior of Islam, when she took the oath to protect the Prophet Mohammed (PBUH) as a human shield during battles.

She was a part of the Banu Najjar tribe living in Medina. At first, she was just bringing water to the warriors and tending to their wounds. After they lost the battle because the archers disobeyed the Prophet (SAW), she knew it was time. Nusaybah, with her sword at her side and her bow in her hand, joined the group who never left the Prophet's side.

Nusaybah was still alive when Abu Bakr Al Siddiq and Omar Ibn Al Khatab (RAA) were alive and when they became a khulafa. She had lost her hand and received several wounds because she fought fiercely at Al-Yamamah. She never gave up fighting side by side with the Prophet (SAW) defending him unlike others who had retreated.

According to Nusaybahfamily.net and Islamweb.net, the Prophet (SAW) said to her; "*Praise is due to Allah who gave you victory over your enemy and satisfied you by showing you his death*".

This was said when the Prophet (SAW) saw that Nusaybah's son was in danger, so he had found the person who tried to kill him, and they all started hitting him until he died.

Sr. Ansam, the Director of Al Ihsan Hifz School, states about Nusayba, "We all wish to be like Nusaybah, she was strong, brave, sincere, and sensitive. We can't protect the prophet (SAW) in battle like how she did, but what we can do, is protect his sunnah".

With the mentioning of dogs in the Quran and hadith, Muslims search for ways to keep it halal while having a dog for a pet.

There are certain reasons that people can keep dogs in their houses. Some people have their

dogs kept outside of their house in a garage or put in an outside doghouse, however, it is only supposed to be for important reasons. Those reasons include for protection as in Surat al Kahf, Allah explains the story when there was a dog it was used as protection for the young men that stayed in the cave; "And, their dog lay outstretching its two forelegs on the threshold. Had you come upon them unprepared, you would certainly have turned away from them in flight and would certainly have been filled with awe of them," (18:18).

Another reason that having a dog as a pet may be permitted in Islam is for farming and herding animals. A narration from Abu Hurayrah showed that the Prophet (PBUH) said, "Whoever keeps a dog, his good deed will decrease every day by one qeeraat (a unit of measurement for a mountain) unless it is a dog for farming or herding." (Reported by al-Bukhari).

According to Islamqa.info, a dog may be helpful if a person is blind, and it as an exception to keep a dog since they can make it easy and useful to go to certain places.

But keeping a dog as Muslims does have its complications when it comes to Salah, if a dog licks you, you would have to wash your hands 7 times or throw away your garments (Islamqa.info).

So, keeping a dog as a pet may be fun and beneficial but you must be ready for the high maintenance that comes with it.

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
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SELF-CARE By Alaa Murra and Fatmeh Sammour
