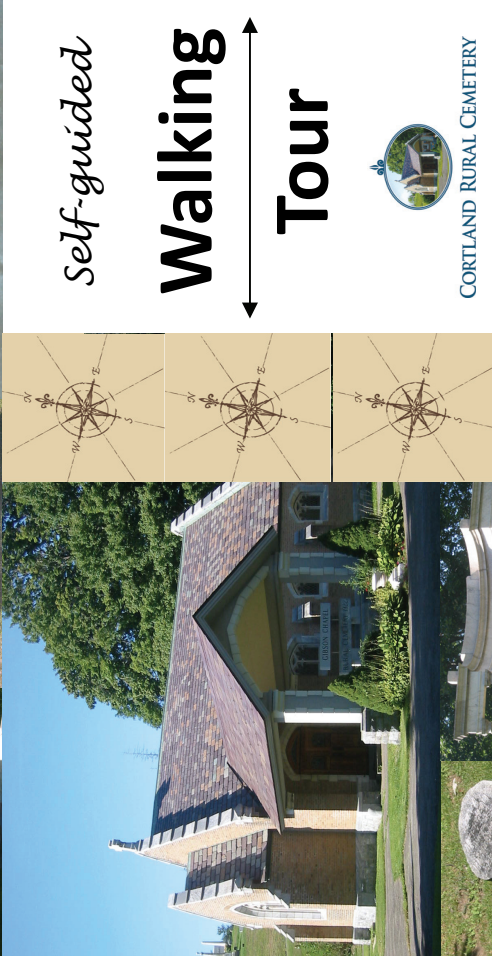


ARBORETUM

Established in 1853 during the heyday of ‘garden’ or ‘rural’ cemeteries, the Cortland Rural Cemetery was consciously designed to provide a natural respite from busy, urban life. 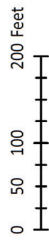
