
THE EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS NEWSLETTER FOR THE ORANGE CALIFORNIA STAKE

We interrupt this month's regularly scheduled Power of 3 message to bring you an important message about emergency communications.

You may not realize it, but every year in October, our stake conducts an emergency communications exercise. As part of this exercise, we practice for a scenario when no phone communications are available. Wards are tasked with checking on as many members of their ward as possible within a short period of time, and then reporting that information back to the stake. The stake then reports that information via ham radio to the region, which in turn reports that information to Church headquarters. Admittedly, not every ward participates every year, but we are hopeful that all wards will participate this year.

Each ward has a different system for checking on members: Some have designated Zone Captains in charge of a specific geographic area, while others use ministering assignments to check on people. Your assignment this month is to find out what system your ward uses and find out who is supposed to be checking on you in case of an emergency. Make sure you have those people's contact information so that you can reach out to them to let them know if you family is okay or if you need help. If you haven't already done so, print up a copy of the stake's FAITH Plan (attached to this newsletter) and add the contact info to the form.

It's also a good idea to get to know your neighbors and other church members who live near you. In the event of a major catastrophe, these are the people you can help, or who can help you, so it's worth it to develop positive relationships now.

Bonus: Find out who is supposed to check on you and get their contact info.



"SURPRISE" EXERCISE

You never know when a disaster might strike or what it will be, and this year the wards won't know when the *stake emergency communications exercise* is going to take place. The wards usually get advanced notice on the date and time of the exercise, but this year they won't. Sometime in October, we know not when, the stake presidency will notify bishops that "today is the day" for the exercise. Wards will need to get the word out that the exercise has begun and will need to put their ward plans into action.

Please remember that you are *not* allowed to use phones or emails for this exercise. However, you can text, check on people in-person, use smoke signals, ham radio, etc. --whatever works best that's not a phone call or email. (Note: If it happens to fall on a Sunday, it doesn't count to say you saw somebody at church. You have to make an effort to check on them at their home, not in church.)

In case you're curious, we're allowing texting because sometimes, even when phones are down, texting will still work.



This is our second year of gradually preparing by going through The Power of 3 Member Preparedness Plan.

Put your ICE (In Case of Emergency) contacts in your cell phone.

ATTENTION ALL HAM RADIO OPERATORS & BISHOPS

Please join us each month on the **first Sunday of the month** for a quick radio check-in. Alan McQueen runs our **net at 7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. on Red 1 (144.310 MHz).** It's a great chance to test out your equipment. (Bishops, if you don't have a ham license, find someone in your ward who does, and meet with them to check in with the Stake President.) Each ward should be able to report via ham radio.

HAM RADIO PLUG



Once upon a time, our stake had about 200 ham radio operators that regularly checked in via radio. If you look at the last 6 months of monthly check-ins, less that 20 ham operators checked in on a regular basis.

When all other communications systems are down, ham radios will usually still work, so we really need more ham radio operators. See below to find out how to get your license.

3 Steps to Getting A Ham Radio License

Step 1: Decide the level of license you want to get. As a beginner, you'll probably want to get the basic license, which is called the technician license.

Step 2: Study for the exam.

There are lots of resources online. You can buy books, apps, or courses or just search for free resources. It takes about 10 hours of studying. There are 35 questions on the test, taken from the FCC's question pool. You need to score at least 26 to pass. A course might cost about \$35 and a book might cost about \$20

Step 3: Take the test (in-person or online)

You can find a local ham radio club where you can take the test in person, or find an online option.
