


NOTES FROM FR. VANDEWALLE

Light of the East – As we begin Advent, one of the best "Advent-y" things I heard last week was a Podcast from "Light of the East" Radio which can be found at byzantinecatholic.org. under "features and programs". Fr. Thomas Loya is an Eastern Catholic Priest. Eastern Catholics are part of the Catholic Church, but with customs different than the Roman Catholic Church. In his 11/10 episode #842, Father Loya spoke of how while there is always the spiritual battle going on against evil, it seems that the world is now contending with the same demons, despair, hopelessness. BUT there is also lots of good! How do we understand this? No matter who our leaders are in church or state [which can cause confusion], there is a battle of ideologies of God v. evil. This may be happening now in ways beyond precedent in history. At the time things are happening, we seldom realize what God is up to. God may allow evils we don't understand, but only for some ultimate good that He intends to bring out of the evil. Our job is to become AUTHENTIC Catholics. Previously it was easy to get by with "cafeteria" Catholicism without the cross. For a while the Church has not challenged people, thinking that this will help people to stay in the church ... but it did not work. Now, it seems God has "had enough" and is trying to make us stronger. The reception of the body and blood of Christ will enliven us and put us "on our toes" more prepared to face the enemy in this cosmic battle. It seems that God has allowed evil to be even more apparent; it is not hiding anymore, it is out in the open. Furthermore, things have been revealed about ourselves, our weakness and selfindulgence. We are reminded that we are called to martyrdom, either "red" (actually dying for Christ) or "white" ("dying to our self-wills" so God's will in us takes precedent). We are meant to say no to ourselves so we can say yes to God and our better selves. This seems foolish to modern society. We are to become people of prayer and to be a gift to other people. To call us back, God has to strengthen us like a drill sergeant at boot camp. And we are to help save peoples' lives. Fr. Loya invites us to look to the invisible realities beyond the visible.

Advent – The first half of Advent ("toward the coming") we look toward the second coming of Christ, examining our conscience for readiness and some penitential practice to straighten what is crooked and make some reparation for our sins. The second half of Advent we look toward the First Coming of Christ that made it all possible.

There are lots of options: Attend mass on-line. Pray the rosary today with someone. Read the beginning of the Gospel of Luke. Look up how the Eastern Catholic Church honors Mary on this Feast. Pray and celebrate with Mary and the saints with a delicious dessert.
