Fr. Jerry's Tuesday Talks Appeal to All Ages

Every age has been touched by the pandemic, even the youngest among us. Beginning in March, preschoolers were no longer attending their day care centers, and elementary students were learning from home. No more play dates, clubs, or after school activities-and no more church. Christine Goss responded to Fr. Jerry's concern that he would lose contact with kids and their parents suggesting that he connect with them in different ways and show them a different side of himself-not in church in his priestly garments but in his home in regular clothes. Originally intended for children, the episodes have been enjoyed by adults as well. Some have even dubbed him "Our Own Mr. Rogers." First called Storytime with Fr. Jerry and later Tuesday Chats with Fr. Jerry, episodes have been recorded by Christine Goss, Bob Vielkind, Paul Buckley, and Tom Bigos. The series premiered on March 31, 2020, and through October nearly twenty episodes have been made available on YouTube.com. Each begins with a prayer, the singing of "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands."

In eight episodes, Fr. Jerry started with the Gathering Space and moved through the church to explain the things that we see but do not know-the ambo, the holy oils, the art. Tom Bigos explained the bells, the Juliet bells named for Fr. Jerry's mother which rang for the first time on Christmas Eve, 2009. We found Fr. Jerry lying on a pew and he taught us about the history of pews, with the term originally meaning "to elevate" because people had to step into them using

the kneeler to rest their feet. In one of his favorite episodes, Fr. Jerry was found in the pipe loft cleaning the pipes which are more than a hundred years old and came from a Protestant church.



Another favorite began with Fr. Jerry enthusiastically playing the organ before Dr. Gray demonstrated this

single instrument which can sound like a symphony orchestra.

When Fr. Jerry welcomed us into his office, he was sipping his favorite drink, warm water and lemon. In this episode viewers learned that, according to a Polish custom, the first Christmas card he receives with an illustration of the three wise men is placed over the door. We saw part of his frog collection, the signed picture given to him by his former parish, a cross from Jerusalem—and even his plastic orchid! Children were invited to

send their pictures to be placed on his office chair and be his special guests for the day. In the next session, Alex and a Jason were the special guests and



we were treated to pictures of Fr. Jerry's family. With 3 brothers and two sisters, he was the baby of the family. When he was the ring bearer at his Uncle Bob's wedding, he wore a tux for the first time. A message to children was, "God gave me good parents, and He gave you good parents too."

In his living room, we saw the little teapot that belonged to his grandmother and was given to him by

his mother. This was the inspiration for a message of holding on to memories. A statue of Mary holding Jesus on a donkey with a chipped ear led to the message that nobody is perfect—we all have



our little chips. In the secret garden that opens from his office, Fr. Jerry shows us his plants and garden ornaments like the statue of the Blessed Mother and the broken vase that teaches us that even broken things have use. A reading from Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudatory Si* teaches the importance of caring for the earth.

Ministry Updates

Youth Ministry – Catechesis – What's New? By Christine Goss

In a response to concerns surrounding Covid-19 and in an effort to best meet the varied needs of our families and teens, we have expanded our program and for the first time given families of youth in grades 7 - 10 three models of formation to choose from for the upcoming year.

Option 1 – In-person Mini-Courses

Youth gather in the Parish Center in-person in small groups to learn about one specific faith topic that they select. Each topic meets for three consecutive weeks with a catechist leading the conversation. This model has been the model we have had in place for the past several years.

Option 2 - Completely Virtual E-Learning

Utilizing a new platform designed by respected Catholic Publisher, St. Mary's Press, youth who select this model will complete six modules of Catholicism 101. The e-learning modules are interactive and self-paced, giving participants the flexibility of setting aside time to focus on their faith formation as it fits into the rest of the schedule of their lives. After each module, participants will have a virtual session to break open what they learned, to answer any questions that they may have and to come together in prayer.

Option 3 - Family Foundations of Faith

The Catechism of the Catholic Church clearly teaches the importance of recognizing parents are the primary educators of the Catholic Faith for their children (CCC 2223, 2226). This model of formation will be parent led and done primarily within the at-home context. Youth Ministries has curated and created a list of suggested activities that they will complete at home, on their own schedule, as a family. The expectation of this model is that families complete 8 of the activities over the course of the year. After each activity, each Youth Ministry participant will email in a short written or video reflection about how they grew in faith from the experience.

Our Confirmation Preparation Program will continue in gathered sessions to allow candidates the opportunity to be together, to grow in faith and community as they prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in Spring 2021.

We are incredibly blessed here, at our Parish, to have the facilities, space, support and technology to offer families these alternatives. Thank you for your continued support of the youth of our parish.

Parishioners Raise Awareness of the Abuses of Fast Fashion

When Bridget Kirsch was studying in Germany last year, she elected to do a project on fast fashion. She was interested in fashion, had even sewed some of her own clothes, and was considering a career in the fashion industry, so she wanted to find out about any dark side to the business. What she learned encouraged her to become an advocate for those who toil in sweat shops around the world to make clothing that is less expensive and poorly made.

Often taking place in third world countries, this unethical production in the sweat shops is a violation of human rights. The shops are subject to fires, and the workers earn as little as 5 cents a day even though their days are very long. Moreover, the system is detrimental for the environment: it takes as much water to make one tee shirt than the average American uses in a year.

Armed with this information, Bridget and her mother Lynn have begun to think about clothing in new terms, not of Fast Fashion but of Slow Fashion. This involves thrifting or first seeking out thrift shops for ethical brand clothing to buy. They have learned that, just like full price stores, these have their specialties. One may cater to people who like trendy clothing while another caters to shoppers who like more traditional wear. Thrifting does take effort, and even when the shopper finds the right store, there might be some frustration since the inventory can be unpredictable. When you do find items that you like, the process of upcycling begins—refashioning or giving the clothes a makeover so that they become something new.

When she was 7 years old, her father got a new job at General Electric and off they moved to Schenectady. There they joined St. Helen's Church (now St. Kateri) where Maria made her First Eucharist and Confirmation. Her parents were very active in the church. She gives her "love of service to the church" credit to her parents. They were both very active in the church.

She graduated from Linton High School and had planned to study to be a travel agent or a cruise director (laughingly, she says, "like Julie on The Love Boat). While working at her first job at Brooks Drug Store, she met her husband and

Where can each of us begin to be more clothing responsible? First we can limit our wardrobes to what we need and assess our own closets for items that have not been worn in at least a year. Lynn suggests reversing the hangers when we wear an item. After a year, we can make an assessment of the items on hangers that have not been reversed. At that point, Lynn and Bridget suggest donating and recycling them through thrift and next-to-new shops from which they can hopefully to be upcycled by the next wearers. When we want to purchase new items we can then invest in quality clothing, like a special cashmere sweater, that will last a long time and has not been made in a sweat shop.

At this point, Bridget and Lynn are spreading their message by word of mouth, but they do intend to use social media in the future. Also, Bridget plans to make instructional videos on how to upcycle. Bridget and Lynn are at the start of a trend that will have broad appeal across generations as people understand that it is less expensive, kinder to the environment, and more ethical. With their knowledge, enthusiasm, and commitment to the cause, there is little doubt that Bridget and Lynn will be successful in convincing many people of the merits of Slow Fashion.
