History Corner

Susan Merfa

HDCCW President 1986-88

My affiliation with the National Council of Catholic Women began in the late 1960's when, as a young mother, I became a member of the Parish Council of Catholic Women at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish, Abbottstown. After serving several positions there, I became president and therefore a member of the Conewago District Council of Catholic Women. I stayed involved and eventually became president at the district level; thus making me a member of the Harrisburg Diocesan Council of Catholic Women (HDCCW).

The HDCCW board meetings were held guarterly on a Sunday from 2-4 PM in the employee dining room of the original building. We would have a break during the meeting, when an assigned district would provide snacks. Our board consisted of officers, life members/advisory committee, commission chairmen, and district presidents. The commissions included: Church Communities, Retreats, Family Affairs, Pro Life, Community Affairs, Migrant Ministries, International Affairs, Organization Services, Legislation, Special Diocesan Activities, Public Relations, Parliamentarian, and Historian. Our spiritual moderator was Rev. Paul Miller, my brother-in-law. Our directory was fondly called the Blue Book.

After serving two years as district president, I was asked to serve as Family Affairs Commission Chairman at the Diocesan level. I then served as Vice President for two years. I remember the day I received a telephone call from Marian Sneeringer who asked me to serve as President of the Harrisburg Diocesan Board. I was so honored and humbled! Of course, I said "yes." I remember at the convention Mass celebrated by Bishop William Keeler, we sang the hymn "Here I am, Lord." I sang it with much sincerity, particularly the words, "I will hold your people in my heart." It brought tears to my eyes, realizing that I would now hold the ladies of the HDCCW in my heart.

Speaking of the HDCCW conventions, we held them on a Monday. Each district was assigned to host the convention. Most districts chose the Penn Harris Hotel in Camp Hill as the site for the convention since it would accommodate the 500 to 800 participants. We were able to assume all the duties in the Conewago District, as we had all nine parishes affiliated.

The Board meeting was held Sunday afternoon, followed by a break and then the Board dinner attended by board members and guests. As my gift to the board, I gave each one a ceramic statue

The closing banquet was held at 6:00 PM. Of course, all the ladies wore their beautiful hats. Most of us stayed over for a second night. We still had our hospitality room available, so we spent time together (partied) again. It was a lot of fun. We made many friendships.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the four National CCW Conventions that I was privileged to attend. The first one was when I was president of the Conewago DCCW. It was held in San Antonio, Texas. It was the first flight that I ever experienced, and I found out later that we flew over a tropical storm to get there. It was not a very good experience for me, and I swore that if I wasn't so far away, I would walk home. I was really glad to be there, though, with women from all over the United States. It helped me see the enormity of the National Council of Catholic Women and all that thev do.

The ladies from Texas treated us like royalty. We went to John Connelly's ranch and met him and his wife along with their Angus cattle. We also traveled to Mexico and attended one of the markets. I still have some of the items that I purchased. This was an experience I would never have had if it was not for CCW.

My mother's family was a group of strong believers who attended services regularly and sent me to Catholic school.

What aspect of your parish faith community inspires you?

The parishioners are a welcoming, warmhearted family. They are generous in giving of their time, talent, and money to support and meet the needs of the Church.

Do you have a favorite saint? Why does their faith journey inspire you?

From her earliest youth, Mary had a passionate desire to please God. Quietly, she did all the ordinary activities of a wife and mother with extraordinary love and devotion. The Blessed Mother is an inspiration to me because she trusted all days in every possible way.

Do you have a favorite gospel parable? Why does it speak to you?

My favorite passage is the Prodigal Son. It speaks to me of the unlimited Mercy of God. It pronounces that God **waits** for us lovingly and anxiously to return to Him after we have stumbled and fallen into sin.

We continue the article from Issue #1 submitted by Dauphin District's Linda Melenchek where she interviewed **Tina Kowalski**, founder of the faith and fitness exercise ministry called SHINE.

Was your faith formation influenced by your family when you were younger?

My parents Cheryl and Vince, married 53 years, have been a great influence on my faith formation. I can remember attending Sunday morning Mass, Holy Days of Obligation, and Stations of the Cross during Lent. We participated in parish events like summer festival and flea markets. I have three siblings, and we would gather on Sunday nights to pray the rosary with my parents. I can remember my mom teaching me the rosary and telling me to slow down, pray it slow and think about the mysteries. As I grew, my parents continued to reinforce my faith. The foundation they created really helped to draw me back and keep me active.

What aspect of your parish faith community inspires you?

There was a day I looked around my parish and realized that I knew very few people. That was before my healing and getting involved in the parish and ministries. I look around my parish now and know a majority of the people. It's a beautiful gift to have a parish family.

Do you have a favorite saint? Why does their faith journey inspire you?

I have grown a great devotion to The Divine Mercy Chaplet from my time in Adoration. Two favorites are Saint Pope John Paul II and Saint Faustina Kowalska, the Mercy saints associated with it. I admire their devotion to Eucharistic Adoration and the way in which they served the Lord, committing themselves to spreading the message of Divine Mercy.

I also love Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta. I love her simple, but powerful, messages of love, smiles, and being nonjudgmental. Talk to someone as though they were the only person to exist. When people question your motives or kindness, do it anyway! I work at the Hospital in Catholic Services and visit Catholic patients. I pray at the tabernacle before visiting them, and invite Mother Teresa to enter the rooms with me.

Do you have a favorite gospel parable? Why does it speak to you?

The Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15: 11 - 32) is one favorite. I am captivated by the reunion of father and his son.

That incredible moment of love, forgiveness, and welcome just fills me up!

Thanking God for the

healing embrace and graces He has given

me, I want to bring

that message of



acceptance, love, kindness, compassion and joy into all ministries, classes, and hospital interactions I'm involved in.

How can we enhance our devotion to Our Blessed Mother?

After my healing, one of the first programs I participated in at our Parish was 33 Days to Morning Glory. It was fantastic, and I recommend it to anyone who wants to grow in their devotion to the Blessed Mother. After this program, I began praying the rosary more frequently and seeking her counsel. I have a beautiful rosary booklet with meditations on the mysteries and gorgeous pictures.

If you have limited time, go for quality of prayer, over quantity. Slow down and listen to what Jesus wants to share with you through Our Blessed Mother.


