The St. Augustine events pre-date, by more than 100 years, Boston, Massachusetts's claim to the first St. Patrick's celebration in 1737 and New York City's first St. Patrick's Day parade in 1762

The St. Patrick Parade, produced by Romanza-St. Augustine, Inc., returns on Saturday, March 12 at 10 am starting at Francis Field and follows a three-mile Augustine, which was Spain's capital in La Florida. The Sisters opened The O'Reilly House, known officially known as the Father Miguel O'Reilly House

Museum as a museum and fundraising site at 32 Aviles Street. On October 15, 1974, the House was added to the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.

During the day he goes from home to home in search of food, which neighbors are happy to share with him. In return, Rob eats from their hands and allows granddaughters to pick him up. That didn't sound like Mr Roo who is very wary of people and can only be picked up when he is very dozy at night roosting in a small tree in my son's yard. To save his neighbor's sleep and nerves, my son has been putting Mr Roo under a tub in his shed overnight. Mr Roo has slept well, and the neighbor hasn't complained. Perhaps Rob had been traumatized by his journey from St Augustine South? But no! Rob had been seen back in gardens around the intersection in St Augustine South on the day I went calling there. Rob is a very much beloved St Augustine South neighborhood rooster with Mr Roo, his doppelganger, now very beloved in my son's back yard! As no owner has come forward despite widespread advertising in "Pets Lost and Found" and "St Augustine News" on Facebook, Mr Roo now has a new coop with a low roof to deter him from crowing while inside, and to keep him safe from local raccoons and other predators.

Public Service Announcement

Some residents came to the February SASIA Board Meeting and complained about pedestrians walking the streets after dark without lights. Some walk dogs, some have small children with them, others are jogging; very many do not wear light, reflecting clothes; some are walking with their backs to the vehicular traffic. For your own safety, when walking at dusk or after dark, make yourself easily visible to traffic. Carry a light, wear light-colored clothes, and always walk towards oncoming traffic. Florida Law 316.130 (4) states that when there is no sidewalk, pedestrians must walk on the shoulder of the road on the left side, against the flow of the traffic. And please, can drivers slow down on neighborhood roads -- there are often pedestrians and we do not want a tragedy.

City of St. Augustine Commission to hear first reading of Mobility Plan Ordinance Mobility Fee

On Monday, February 14, during the regularly scheduled City Commission meeting, Planning and Building Director Amy Skinner will present a proposed ordinance that, once approved, would go into effect on May 17, 2022, implementing the current Mobility Plan and establishing a Mobility Fee as defined in the Transportation and Mobility Element of the Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning and Zoning Board (PZB) held three special meetings in 2021 and 2022 to review the ordinance, ensuring that funds could be collected and spent citywide, that there was an appeals process established in the ordinance, and that the process for developers to provide mobility infrastructure was transparent. This culminated in PZB approving the final ordinance that was carried to the City Commission for consideration.

The Mobility Plan consists of four distinct plans that include parking and shuttle alternatives, pedestrian and bicycle improvements that will aid in the reduction of vehicular traffic and congestion in the downtown area, and complete street design recommendations to improve quality of life and livability conditions for residents. The Plan recognizes both citywide and regional mobility alternatives.

The Mobility Fee will be a one-time fee imposed for any new residential or non-residential development and redevelopment activity that requires a building permit, results in increased use of the existing property, and impacts the City's transportation infrastructure.

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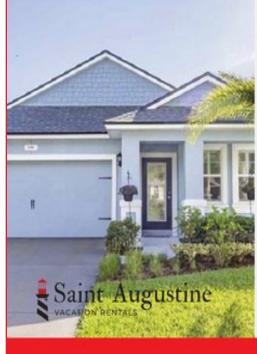

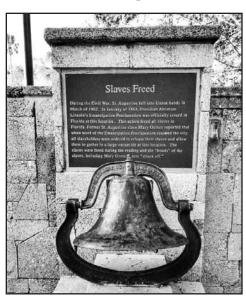

In March of 1862 during the Civil War, Union soldiers had occupied St. Augustine. In January of 1863, military authorities received the first version of President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation and ordered that all slaves in the area be released to congregate to a vacant lot on St. George Street.

The Proclamation was read, freeing all slaves in the state of Florida and making St. Augustine one of the first in the South to break the bonds of slavery by executive

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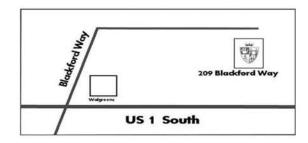
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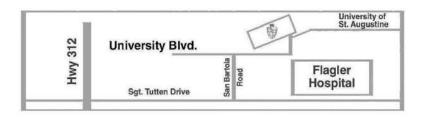
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"I'm afraid if I move it will hurt

I have recently seen several patients referred to physical therapy because of decreased strength, endurance, loss of balance or pain due to decreased activity during covid. Many have come in asking, 'Is it okay to move when it hurts?" I have to tell them the answer lies in the cause of the pain and whether it is what some call 'good pain' or 'bad pain'. The follow-up question to that is, Can pain be good? The emotional response is a resounding 'NO'. The sensory response is 'sometimes'. Herein lies the discussion of this column.

How can pain be good? It's certainly not pleasant. In fact the International Association for the Study of Pain defined pain as "an unpleasant sensory and emotional experience associated with actual or potential damage, or described in terms of such damage.

Simply put it means pain has two components, 1) sensory and 2) emotional, which are triggered by actual or potential damage. Actual damage is hammer + Potential damage causes one to put hands in the pockets when any hammer is in sight.

So, can pain be good? YES, but keep reading. Pain can protect instantaneously, especially if we touch something hot. It is pain that causes the withdrawal, hopefully minimizing the damage. Pain can protect us over the long haul. If I slip and fall on a wet surface, the pain will cause be to proceed with caution next time as to avoid another painful experience. If swelling is a result of the fall, I will move cautiously so the tissues have a chance to heal, but I should move.

Therefore, is all pain good? The answer is no. Pain can be bad when it is not understood and life changing. By polarizing, I mean it causes one not to move, producing changes in function. In all the examples provided above the cause of the pain is understood and therefore

not polarizing. The longer one is in pain or worse, not understood, it becomes 'neuropathic'. Neuropathic pain is a result of changes in the nervous system. Neuropathic pain does not require tissue damage and can be quite debilitating.

How can you tell the difference?

Acute pain, that which is a result of a mechanical, chemical or temperature stimulus should be immediate, protective and proportional. It should also be short in duration. Sub-acute pain may last hours to days, is protective and usually resolved with tissue recovery. Chronic or neuropathic pain is persistent and may be experienced in the absence of tissue damage. Because no mechanical explanation can be given, fear of movement becomes a proponent.

The explanation provided is not meant to be exhaustive but may help you better understand your pain. It is always advisable to consult your MD, PT or OT. They can help determine whether the pain experience is 'normal', 'neuropathic' or something else. Age is not necessary a cause of pain but we'll leave that for another column.

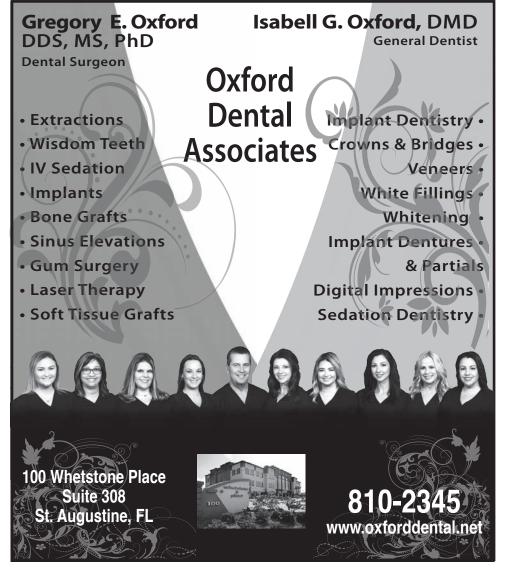

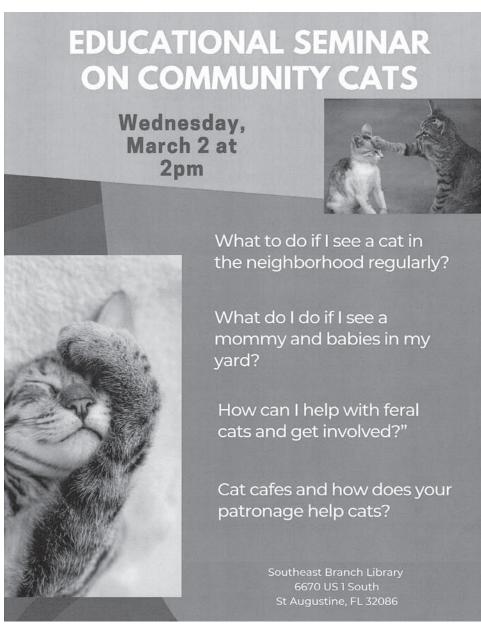

Computer Corner

Quickly Search Everywhere



Have you ever saved a document and been unable to find where it got saved to? Many times, we can be in a rush and forget to ensure that we save a file where we want it to be. This can make it difficult to find later.

In Windows all you need to do is hit the Windows Logo key (two keys to the left of the spacebar) and start typing the name of the file. If it is a text document (not a picture), you can even search using words that you know are inside of the document. Sorry, Windows can't find words in a picture, yet. What sorts of things will a Windows Search find?

Files located on your Local hard drive and also on Microsoft OneDrive (Microsoft's Cloud storage system) Typically these are files or documents that you have created or downloaded.

Applications (installed or available to be installed) can be quickly found using this search technique. Sometimes Windows updates will remove the icons on the desktop or taskbar, so Search is a great way to find them again.

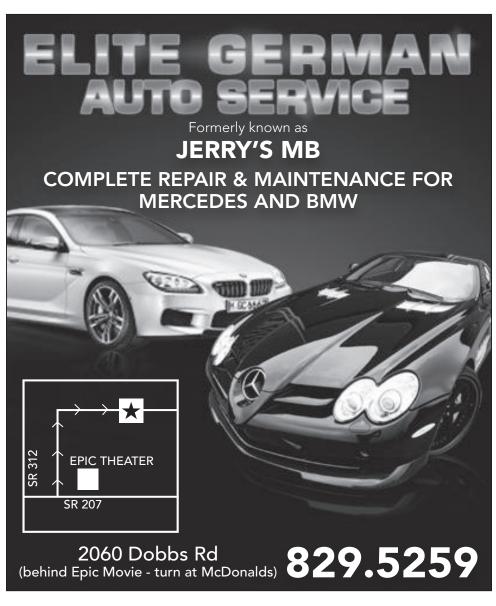
Windows Settings items like volume control, backup settings, etc. can be found very quickly by using this search method. If you want to change the brightness of your screen, simply search Brightness, and voila! you'll see a link to take you straight to that setting.

Web Search results also show in the results. So, if you search for an application like Solitaire, you'll also see webpage results about Solitaire.

Having a plan for where you keep certain documents and files help as well. I like to create folders in Documents and Pictures so that I can keep my files grouped up and accessible by Subject.

In my Business folder, I have an Articles folder, which is where this article will be found. I also have an Advertising folder, where the ad (just below) will be found. So, when I hit Save on this article, I am going to make sure I save it into the correct folder inside of my business folder. A little planning may prevent the need for Windows Search, but it is nice to know it is there.
