

Legislation/Respect Life

Hyde Amendment: In a late-night move on August 13th, during consideration of a budget resolution, senators approved in a 50-49 vote an amendment by Sen. James Lankford, R-Oklahoma, that bars federal funds from being used to pay for abortions. The amendment also blocks funding for government programs that discriminate against individual health care professionals or institutions

that object to abortion. Pro-life groups are praising the U.S. Senate for expressing support for this amendment.

Government spending millions of tax dollars to harvest organs from live babies: On August 6th, Life News.com reported that documents obtained by the Center for Medical Progress showed that the government paid millions of dollars to the University of Pittsburgh so it could harvest tissue from "elective" abortions for research. The organs were harvested before the babies were killed and divided up and shipped to other research facilities like the University of Pittsburgh.

Pro-Life student expelled from University of Louisville Medical School: Because he opposes abortion, Austin Clark, a 4th year medical student who was set to graduate in May 2021, the medical school cut his dream of becoming a doctor short by dismissing him on July 20, 2020. According to a lawsuit filed and amended in August 2021, this is not the first abortion controversy related to this School of Medicine. CONEWAGO

Our four parishes (St. Francis Xavier, St. Vincent de Paul, St. Joseph the Worker, and Immaculate Heart of Mary) in the Conewago District are getting back into the swing of things.

Due to an extensive donated Christmas collection, St. Francis Xavier PCCW held a Christmas in July Sale which was very well received and was able to add \$530.00 to their Council's treasury. The first Annual Our Lady of Good Council award was presented by Bishop Gainer to Mary Ellen Good at St. Vincent de Paul parish on August 8th. St. Francis Xavier parish on that same weekend held a Water for Life Collection for Catholic Relief Services.

Going forward, our parishes plan to participate in the Boxes of Joy program, hold our Annual Conewago District Annual Mass and Dinner, participate in parish Coffee and Donuts after Mass at St. Vincent DePaul parish on October 3rd, Council Sunday on October 10th at St. Francis Xavier, distribution of White Ribbons and Prayer Cards on WRAP Sunday, and Gift Fair and Holiday Bazaars.
